

Motorists Can Save Time Ordering New License Plates by Mail

AUSTIN — Owner of some 8.4 million motor vehicles in Texas will have some important mail coming their way early in January.

Registration renewal application will be put in the mail shortly after the holiday season by the Motor Vehicle Division of the Texas Highway Department.

The same quick and easy method made possible by modern computer technology will be in effect this year as it has been in the last few years.

Vehicle owners can save time that used to be spent waiting in long lines at county tax offices throughout the state by ordering their 1974 license plates by mail.

All that must be done is to send the entire three-part application by mail to the county tax assessor collector in the owner's home county, enclosing the registration fee plus \$1 for each vehicle to cover handling and mailing.

There are three things to remember:

1. Leave the three-part form intact. Don't separate the three

parts.
2. Mail it to the county tax office in your home county. (Mailing it to the Highway Department will only delay getting your 1974 license plates.)
3. Be sure to include the registration fee, plus \$1 for each vehicle for postage and handling.

You may apply for license plates by mail after January 1. However, county tax offices won't mail plates until after February 1. Owners should allow at least 30 days from the time they apply for the license plates to be returned.

In-person registrations will begin at county tax offices and, in some counties, at substations on February 1. Even though the automated registration application procedures have speeded up the process, waiting line will grow progressively longer as the April 1 deadline approaches.

County Junior Livestock Show Starts Friday in Cross Plains

CROSS PLAINS — The annual Callahan County Junior Livestock Show will open Friday, Jan. 11 at 10 a. m. in the Callahan County Junior Livestock Show barn, north of Cross Plains. The two day event will include judging of over 200 separate entries from the county 4-H Clubs and the four local FFA Chapters.

There will be 65 entries in beef cattle, 12 in dairy cattle,

50 swine 30 poultry, 30 rabbits, 10 goats and 35 entries in the sheep division.

The rabbit division will be the first classes to be judged beginning Friday at 10 a. m. Byron Wilson, Abilene rabbit breeder will judge the divisions. Poultry judging will begin at 10:30 with J. I. Moore doing the judging.

Also to begin at 10:30 will be the judging of breeding sheep and goat division followed by fat lambs. Bill Scott, Vocational Agriculture teacher from Abilene High School will judge these classes.

Swine judging will start at 1:30 p. m. with Bill Scott of Abilene doing the judging.

Saturday, Jan. 12, judging of dairy cattle will start at 10:30 a. m. followed by the beef heifers. Bobby Lemmons, Vice-President of the City National Bank in Colorado City, will judge the dairy cattle and beef cattle.

Steer judging will get underway at 1:30 p. m. Saturday, with Lemmons as judge.

The County Horse Show, sponsored by the Junior Livestock Show Association, will be held in May.

C. Lee Smith, Clyde area rancher and farmer, is general superintendent and chairman of the Show Association which is sponsoring this event. Other officers include: Vice Chairman, Lloyd Barr Jr. of Eula; Treasurer, Doug Ford, Clyde; and Secretary, Greg Gerngross of Baird.

Vocational Agriculture teachers supervising chapter activities are: O. B. Edmondson of Cross Plains, James Trammell and Tim Stone of Clyde, Dick Vestal of Baird and Claude Rock of Eula. Greg Gerngross, County Extension Agent, supervises the County 4-H activities.

All 4-H and FFA exhibitors are asked to have their entries in place no later than 9:30 a. m. on the day they are to be shown. They will be released at 4 p. m. on that day.

Showmanship awards will be presented in all major divisions. 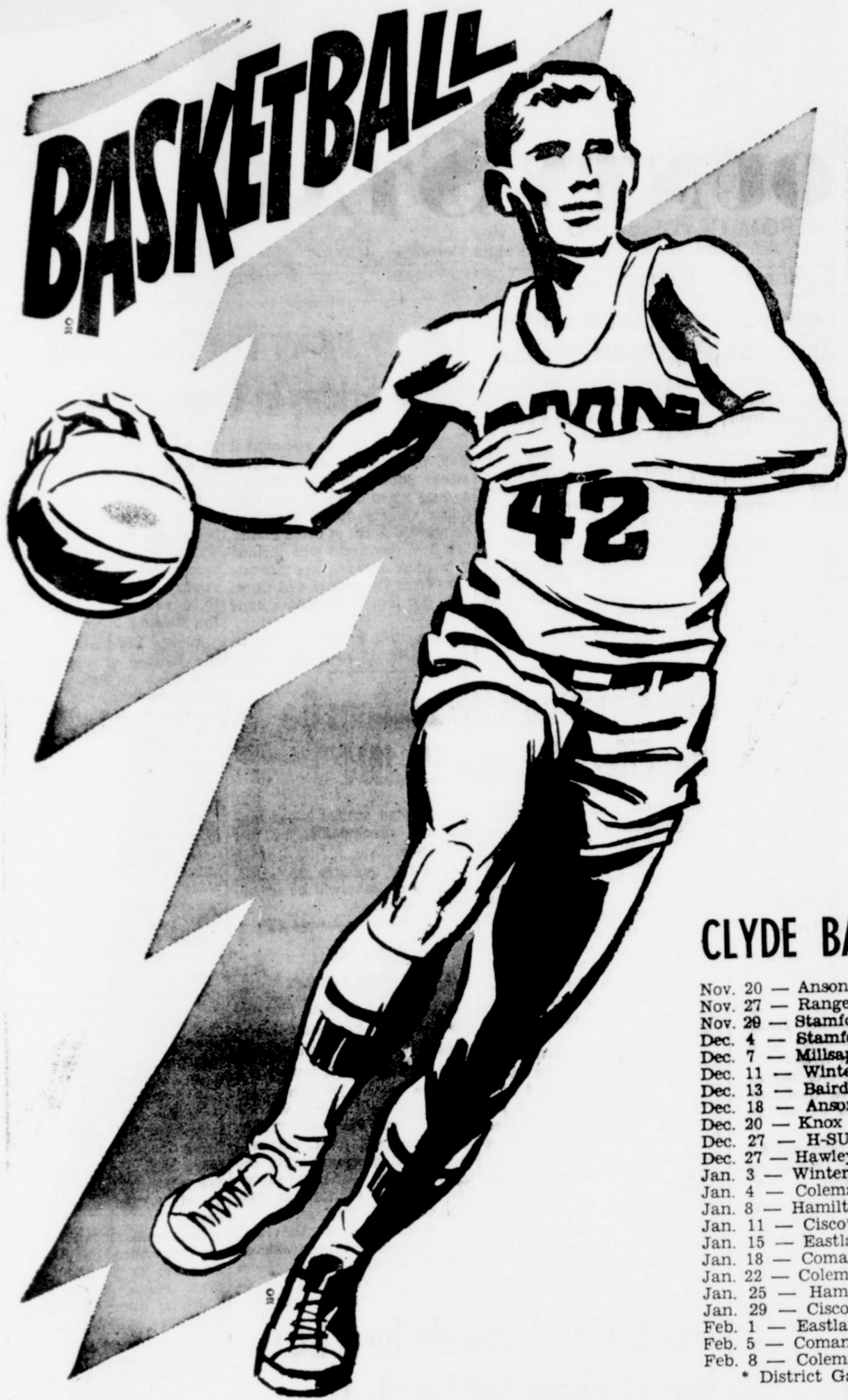
Baptist Church Sets Note-Burning Service

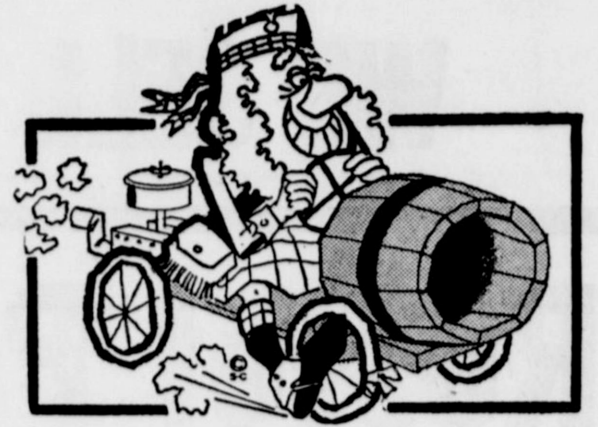
