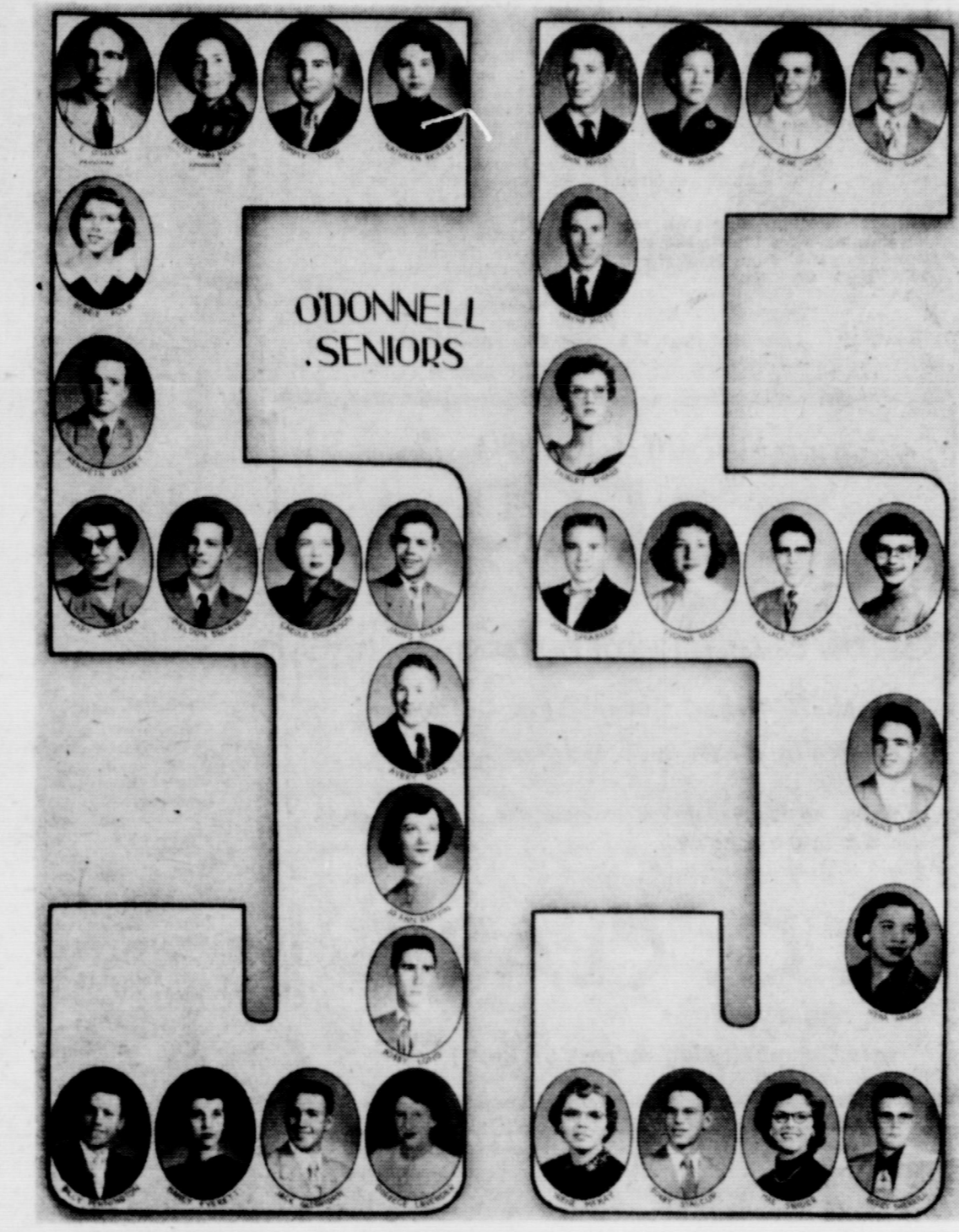

Veterans News

Four important tips to the 200,000 veterans who have approximately 2 billion of the new post-Korea GI insurance were released today by the Veterans Administration.

First, VA said, don't send cash through the mail when paying premiums. Use a check or money order payable to Veterans Administration. Your canceled check or money order stub will serve as a receipt for your records. If you send cash, it may be lost or stolen and you thus will run the risk of lapsing your policy.

Second, get into the habit of paying premiums when they are due. Although the law allows a "grace period" of 31 days during which the policy remains in effect, even if a premium due is not paid, you should consider this provision an emergency privilege and should use it only for emergencies.

Third, be sure you have named the beneficiary or beneficiaries to whom you want your policy paid in event of death and in what manner. This information should be recorded with VA.

Fourth, if you are paying premiums monthly, you should check the advantage of paying your premiums quarterly, semi-annually, or annually.

Wind Storm Hits Area

A line-squall thunderstorm here Sunday afternoon at 6 netted 28-100ths inches of rain, according to Weatherman Ben Moore. Rains of one tenth inch each last Tuesday, Thursday, and Friday brought the total rainfall for past 15 days to 1.88 inches. New Moore and vicinity is the only area lacking a safe amount of planting moisture. Planting is in full swing locally.

Wind And Hail

The storm of Sunday coming in out of the south, carried quite a bit of wind and hail. At Mesquite lightning from the storm hit the Bill Stephens home but the family was at home and the resulting fire was quickly put out. Rain was very heavy from Berry Flat westward to edge of O'Donnell. Out buildings at the Eddie Smith place in Harmony, and out buildings at Isaac Ledbetter home near Berry Flat were damaged. Hail and wind hit west of town. The aluminum door on the barn of C. W. Holcomb farm was blown away and wind did damage to outbuildings at Tom Moore, F. M. Page, Goddard and other farms west of town. A tenement house on Calvin Dorman farm was damaged. The Sunday wind was a line squall and had no relation to a twister.

O'Donnell rainfall this year totals 2.97 inches of which total .42 fell in Jan., .17 in Feb., .50 in mid-March, none in April, and 1.88 to date in May. Subsoil moisture is fair.

Army Offers Many Good Opportunities

The 3rd Armored Division, now stationed at Fort Knox, Kentucky, has been named as the second U. S. Army division to replace overseas divisions under the Army's new and revolutionary "Operation Gyroscope," according to a release from T-Sgt. W. A. (Sam) Bass of the Lubbock U. S. Army Recruiting Station. Previously, the 19th Infantry Division, stationed at Fort Riley, Kansas, had been the only stateside division named to participate in the plan which has been dubbed "rotation with stability" because of its stabilization tours of 31 months in an overseas command followed by at least 33 months in the U. S. Like the 19th Infantry Division, the 3rd Armored will replace a unit now stationed in Europe.

Individuals enlisting for the 3rd Armored Division under "Operation Gyroscope" will be sent direct to Fort Knox for immediate assignment to the unit. These individuals will then take basic training, in the case of non-prior service men, with the 3rd Armored and become regular members of its organization. Prior service men will join their regular units as soon as practicable.

Prior service personnel enlisting in grade of E-5 or above and E-4 with seven or more years of service will be eligible to receive travel allowances and authority to move dependents and household goods from the recruiting station at which the man enlisted to Ft. Knox. Enlistments for the 3rd Armored Division will be accomplished in 3 increments with the first scheduled to begin on May 23rd and concurrent recruiting from then until Sept. 24. M. Sgt. Bass is in O'Donnell each 1st and 3rd Mondays at Post Office and Index office.

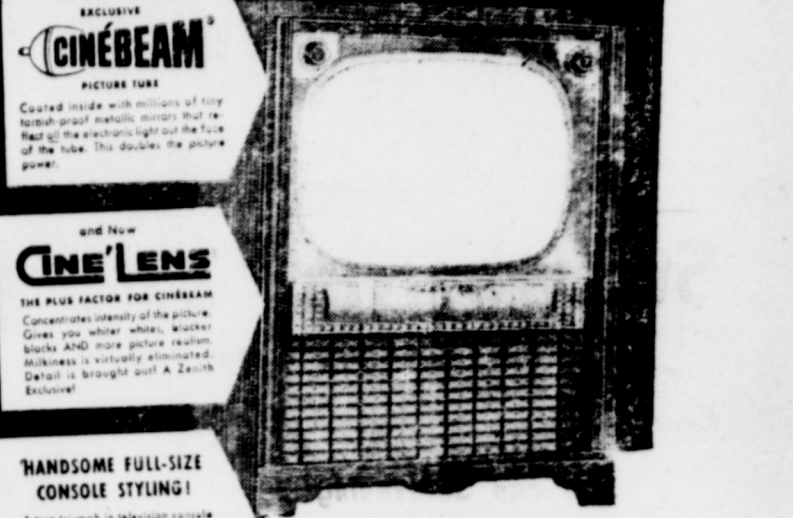
Mr. S. was attempting to change

Presence of Molecules Explains Expansion

SCHENECTADY, N. Y. — Why does heat make things expand?

Matter is made of molecules which are in constant motion, and the higher the temperature, the faster they move. If you have a volume of gas in a rubber balloon, the pressure of these molecules against the rubber is balanced by its pull. Warming the gas makes the molecules move faster, so they push harder against the rubber. It yields a little, and the gas expands.

With cooling, their motion is slowed, they exert less pressure, and the volume of gas gets smaller. Something similar occurs in a liquid, and also in a solid, although the molecules are held more tightly together. The amount which a solid expands for the same rise in temperature is considerably less than with a gas or liquid.

Q-A veteran friend of mine who had been getting a pension somehow failed to send VA his annual income questionnaire. As a result, his pension has been stopped. If he now sends the questionnaire to VA, and if his income is below the legal maximum, will the payments be resumed?

A-If he returns the questionnaire within one year from the date it was originally sent to him, he will receive his pension payments all the way back to the date they were cut off. If he waits longer

than one year, the payments will begin as of the date of receipt of the questionnaire or the date a new claim is filed. All this presupposes that the veteran's income is below the legal maximum for a pension.

VA Quiz

Q-I am taking on-the-job training under the GI Bill. Although I have not completed my training, my employer has increased my pay so that now I am receiving the beginning wages paid to a fully-trained worker. Does that mean my GI allowance will be cut off?

A-Not necessarily. Your GI allowance will not stop, so long as it is established that you are still a trainee in all respects except pay.

Q-Is it possible to collect GI unemployment pay at the same time I am enrolled in school under the Korean GI Bill? Since I am in school, I am not working.

A-No, it is not possible, under the law, to obtain GI unemployment allowances while you are enrolled in training under the Korean GI Bill. Although you may not be working you are drawing monthly GI training allowances from the Government.

Q-I am entitled to increased disability compensation pay by reason of my dependents. What does VA consider as the effective date of those increased payments?

A-The effective date of increased payments because of dependents is the date on which VA receives evidence establishing entitlement to the extra pay.
