Breckenridge All-Stars Take District Tournament Crown

BAIRD — In the District Little League Tournament which was held in Baird last week, Breckenridge won the District Title, in Friday nights championship game by defeating Cisco by a score of 3-0.

In Wednesday nights action, Mike Funderburg's base-clearing double highlighted a seven-run, second inning to win over Baird 11-2.

Jerry Slemmons rapped out a home run, a single and a double to drive in three runs for Breckenridge. The homer was his ninth of the season.

Zane Wright homered in the first inning to give Baird a 1-0 short-lived lead and in the third he walked and later scored the other run. Wright and Manuel Cerda each had two hits for Baird, while Bob McCormick had a single.

Thursday nights play, catcher, Barton Philpott drove in four runs with a homer and a single to lead Cisco to a 9-2 victory over Clyde.

Philpott hit his third home run of the season in the first to stake Cisco to a 2-0 lead and his two-run single came in the four run second when Cisco broke the game wide open.

Gregg Qualls singled in a run in the second and closed out the Cisco scoring in the fifth with a two-run homer, his second of the year.

Forest Star also had two hits for Cisco.

Larry Young hit a two-run

homer for Clyde in the first inning to temporarily tie the score. It was his ninth homer of the year.

Clyde managed only six hits off Ronnie Eudy and no one had more than one hit.

Jerry Don Slemmons pitched a no-hitter for the Breckenridge All-Stars Friday night as they took the district crown downing Cisco 3-0.

Slemmons walked five batters and struck out 12 while not giving up a hit. Six base runners reached base on the five walks and an error by Mike Funderburg, but none of the runners reached home.

In the first game of Friday nights double header, Baird was defeated by Clyde 14-0 to take third place in the district tournament.

Clyde erupted for six runs in the first two innings and went on to crush Baird 14-0. Winning pitcher Larry Young didn't give up a hit after the first inning and struck out 11.

In addition, he slapped out two singles and a triple and drove in two runs. Rex Walker, Ernest Hall and Jay Tucker each drove in two runs for Clyde.

free, to help offset the expense of moving to another source of water; everyone responded well to the request and \$950 has been collected to pay on the expense. The City will probably also have to buy a new pump, unless someone knows where we could borrow or rent one. We also need a storage tank, if anyone has one we could use. If you happen to know where we could get a pump or a storage tank, please contact the City Office or Mr. Isnhower.

Hunting, Fishing Regulations Listed For Callahan County

BAIRD — Hunting as you know it today may well depend upon your conduct as sportsmen in the field.

This is important not only from a safety standpoint, but in order to maintain an image of respectability in the eyes of those who fail to recognize hunting as a cherished tradition as well as a valuable means of game management.

All persons engaging in hunting of one kind or another, should by all means obtain a hunting license. Regardless of month the license is issued, they are valid only during the period September 1 through Aug. 31 of the following year, except sport fishing and those issued for a specific number of days.

All tags and permits, other than those contained as part of the regular hunting license, are issued to landowners by local officials of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

All tags and permits must be attached to animals immediately upon possession and remain attached until the carcass has been finally processed. Recommended procedure is to fasten tags and permits to antlers or forelegs with string or tape.

Any deer or portion of a deer shall be considered as legally tagged if all necessary tags and permits are attached, or if either a receipt from a taxidermist for the head is attached or if a legible document signed by the person who killed the deer, stating his name, address, date of kill, hunting license number and name and county of the ranch where the deer was killed is attached. The antlers from a buck deer or other such proof of legal kill shall remain attached to the deer or part of deer until it arrives at the residence of the person who is in possession or at a commercial processing facility. All tags and permits must be filled out completely.

Callahan County is designated as a "Regulatory" county which is governed by regulations established by action of the Texas

Parks and Wildlife Commission. Local or special county regulations and exceptions to the general hunting or general fishing regulations for Callahan County are listed below:

DEER - Archery only, Oct. 1 - Oct. 31; regular, Nov. 16 - Jan. 1; 2 bucks.

SQUIRREL - No closed season; 10 per day, 20 poss.

QUAIL - Dec. 1 - Feb. 16; 12 per day, 36 poss.

TURKEY - Archery only, Oct. 1 - Oct. 31; regular, Nov. 16 - Jan. 1; 2 gobblers or bearded hens; special spring season, April 26 - May 4, 1 additional gobbler.

FISH - Limit 100 hooks on all devices combined, limit 2 trotlines not to exceed 50 hooks ea.

Information on game and fish laws for coming season is contained in the new "Guide to Hunting and Freshwater Fishing Regulations, 1974-75" soon to be available wherever hunting and fishing licenses are sold.

Cisco Junior College Sets New Enrollment Record for Summer

CISCO — Cisco Junior College has set another enrollment record—this time for the second summer term. Currently there are nearly 400 students taking one or more courses at CJC and its satellite extension programs in Clyde, Coleman, Graham, and Dyess Air Force Base.

The head-count figures were released by Carroll Scott, Dean of Admissions for the Cisco College. A break-down of the enrollees show 142 students on the college's main campus in Cisco, 68 in Clyde, 55 in Coleman, 38 at Graham, and 28 at Dyess AFB, for a total of 331 academic students compared to the first summer term enrollment of 277. Scott said that under usual circumstances in the past there has been a decline rather than growth from the first summer term to the second.

Additionally, 62 students are

in adult education classes at CJC—51 in vocational nursing and 11 in cosmetology, or beauty school. The grand total count is 393, an all-time high for the last half of summer school.

College officials are anticipating a record enrollment for the fall semester, along with a continued expansion of offering at extension locations and a more extensive program of occupational and continuing education courses.

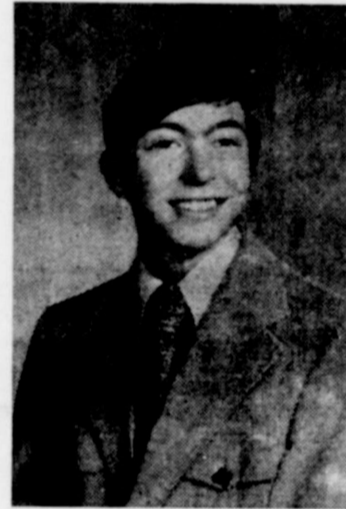

**An Ordinance Establishing The

 Within 600 Feet From Any Occu-
 pied Residence, A Public Health
 Hazard, Providing For The
 Establishment Of Minimum
 Distances In Relation To The
 Maintenance Of Certain Ani-
 mals; Providing For A Penalty
 By Fine Not To Exceed \$200.00
 And Providing For An Emer-
 gency.**

WHEREAS, It has been deem-
 ed by the CITY COUNCIL, of the
 CITY OF BAIRD, that the main-
 tenance of horses, mules,
 jacks, jennies, cows, cattle, hogs,
 sheep or goats within 600 feet
 of an occupied residence, is a
 health hazard thereby.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE
 CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY
 OF BAIRD, Baird, Texas:

SECTION 1. That it shall here-
 after be unlawful for any per-
 son, firm, partnership or cor-
 poration to maintain or keep
 within 600 feet of an occupied
 residence, any horses, mules,
 jacks, jennies, cows, cattle, hogs,
 sheep or goats.

SECTION 2. That the Chief
 of Police or any Police Officer
 shall take up or cause to be
 removed any such animal or
 animals listed above, when
 found, being maintained or im-
 pound within a distance of
 600 feet of an occupied resi-
 dence.

SECTION 3. Any Person, Firm,
 Partnership or Corporation
 found guilty of violating any
 of the provisions of this Ord-
 nance shall be subject to a fine
 of not less than \$10.00 or more
 than \$200.00, together with the
 cost of such prosecution.

SECTION 4. Each day during
 which violation continues shall

be a separate offense.

SECTION 5. Nothing in this
 Ordinance hereby adopted shall
 be construed to affect any suit
 or proceeding now pending in
 any Court, or in any rights ac-
 quired or liability incurred, nor
 any cause or causes of any ac-
 tion accrued or existing under
 any Act or Ordinance repealed
 hereby, nor shall any right or
 remedy of any character be
 lost, impaired or affected by
 this Ordinance.

SECTION 6: The invalidity of
 any section or provision of this
 Ordinance shall not invalidate
 other sections or provisions
 thereof.

SECTION 7: Any Ordinance,
 or part of Ordinance conflict-

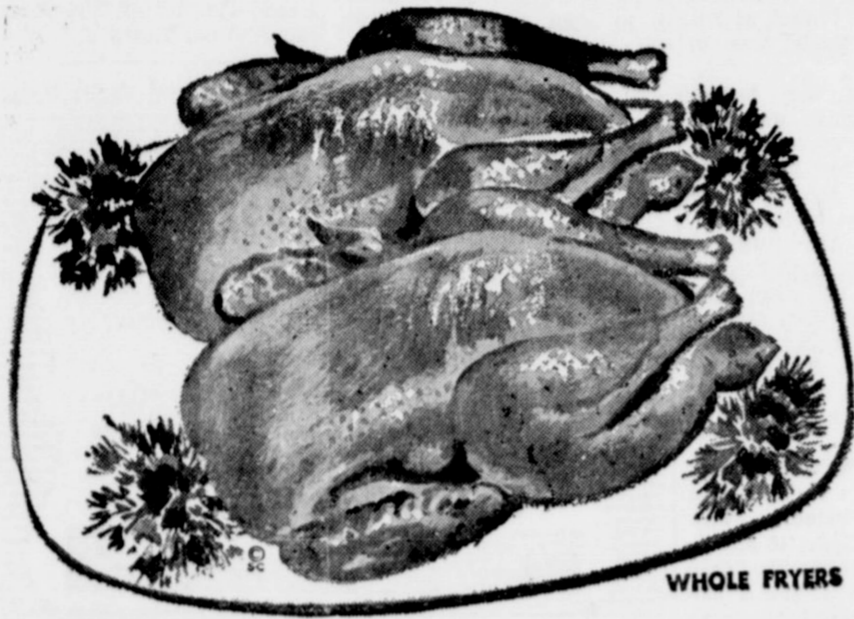

Mary Driggers Breath of Life Campaign Chr.

Current research funded by the National Cystic Fibrosis Research Foundation is seeking a practical test to identify these carriers.
