

Town Gabriel Wakes Village Every Morning

BAXTER, Tenn.-This Tennessee town offers little opportunity for alarm clock salesmen. It has its own alarm clock in the person of Charlie Hughes, bugler, who awakens residents around here each morning at 4:30 with Reveille and "Barbara Allen." He climbs to the top of a sawed-off telephone pole and turns loose on the bugle, even before the neighborhood roosters wake up to begin crowing.

With the town of Baxter (pop. 858) officially awakened, Charlie climbs down, walks to the house and puts the bugle back in the cardboard box.

Daily Routine

That's Charlie Hughes' daily routine, and he's been following it

Time was when Charlie did his bugling at 5:30 a.m. But since he got a job as mail handler at the post office, he's been sounding off exactly at 4:30, half an hour before he reports to work.

What started Charlie bugling? "It all happened about 'eighteen-and-ninety-eight,' " Charlie recalls. "It was back in Denton when I was 10 or 11. There was a bugler goin' along the road blowin' his bugle to let the ladies know he was comin' by with groceries.

"I just stood there a-listenin'. Oh, I sure liked the sound of it. I sort of fell in love with the bugle.

"When I asked Dad to get me one, he just laughed. There wasn't any bugles around in those days, but I kept thinkin' about the idea for years.'

that the same shall never become a charge against the State of Texas, nor shall any direct appropriation ever be made by the Legislature for the construction, maintenance or improvement of the said hospital or hospitals. Should the Legislature enact laws in anticipation of the adoption of this amendment, such Acts shall not be invalid because of

their anticipatory character."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified property taxpaying voters of this State at the General Election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1954, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon:


