The Home Town Of the World—Paris, France

WASHINGTON, D.C.—Students of French politics, and those who have read Dickens' "Tale Of Two Cities," know that Parisian paving blocks have at time been riot weapons and barricade material. Few know, however, that these same blocks can keep a baby warm.

That discovery was made by a French friend of Donald William Dresden, author of an article "Paris, Home Town of the World," in a national magazine.

Dresden writes of his friend's desperation during a cold winter. Conventional fuel was expensive and the young father was not rich. Around the corner from his apartment, the street was paved with wood block.

Policemen not Gendarmes

One night he stealthily filled a sack with the blocks, only to have a policeman catch him. The fuel gatherer protested his baby was cold. The policeman looked the other way.

"Let us hope she will be warm, monsieur," he said. "I have three of my own."

Paris policemen, it is explained, are not gendarmes, as is widely believed. The men with the picturesque stiff blue capes and white clubs are agents de police. Gendarmes keep order in rural areas.

Dresden writes feelingly of the many attractions that Paris has for the outsider as well as for the Parisian, and of the inescapable impression the visitor feels that he is at home in the French capital.

He describes life in an apartment on the left bank — the Quai St. Michel, near the Rue du Chat Qui Peche — the "Street of the Cat Who Fishes" — immortalized by Elliot Paul in "The Last Time I Saw Paris."

Not far from the apartment is St. Germain des Pres and its cafes, the Flore, the Deux Magots and others, where students, American as well as European, settle the grave affairs of the world at sidewalk tables.

Contrast Without Conflict

Paris' contrast without conflict in architecture and design is emphasized by comparison of the vast gothic cathedral of Notre Dame de Paris with the lacy spire of the Eiffel Tower and the classic beauty of Les Invalides, housing the tomb of Napoleon.

Dresden tells of enrollment in the Cordon Bleu, Paris' world famous cooking school, after he tasted the disastrous efforts of his maid to prepare a dinner.

Aureomycin Becoming Less Costly to Sick

PEARL RIVER, N.Y.—One of the antibiotic "wonder drugs," which is used widely for many human and animal diseases, is becoming less expensive for the patient. Since discovery of aureomycin in 1949, there have been several direct price reductions.

Now laboratories are marketing the drug under a new low-dosage recommendation which is about half that for similar wide-range antibiotics. This lower dosage will mean substantial savings for the patient.

The new recommendation calls for only four 250 mg. aureomycin capsules per day for an adult, as compared with the old recommendation of eight to 10 per day, for serious bacterial infections.

Two years ago, our scientists, realizing that lower dosages of the drug would be effective, set in motion an extensive research program in our laboratories and in hospitals throughout the country, to gain evidence. Meanwhile, independent reports from all over the world proved conclusively that a lower dosage is in order, a fact which has been recognized and approved by responsible authorities.

Aureomycin, which must be prescribed by a doctor, is indicated in the treatment of over 60 diseases which beset man, including "strep" throat, boils and carbuncles, "virus" pneumonia, tonsillitis, and a number of skin infections.

Saturday Night Bath Now Thing of Past

NEW YORK—The Saturday night bath is becoming as outmoded as the horse and buggy despite the fact that most people are keener than ever about personal hygiene.

The Gas Appliance Manufacturers association, which makes a study of such things, says that the once-a-week dunking is going down the drain in favor of the daily shower or dip in the tub.



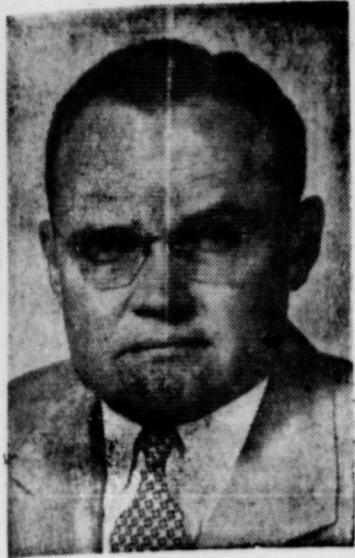

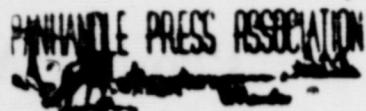

Music Seeds Are Sown Throughout Midwest

CAMDEN, N.J. - A musical Johnny Applesseed who toured the Midwest 43 years ago sowing the seeds of music appreciation today sees her work bearing fruit all over America.

Ninety-two-year-old Dr. Frances Elliott Clark, director emerita of RCA Victor, recalled the day in 1909 when she heard a phonograph recording for the first time and was inspired to launch a movement which has brought the knowledge and understanding of good music to millions of public school children.

For two years, Dr. Clark traveled in the footsteps of the legendary "Johnny Applesseed," selling educators on using the phonograph records for teaching purposes. Then the Victor Talking Machine company heard about "that crazy education woman out west," and asked her to develop and direct an educational department for the young company.

Dr. Clark's "planting" in the fertile minds of school children became national in scope and when she retired in 1947 to Salt Lake City she had seen her plan adopted universally. She founded the music Educators' National Conference in Keokuk, Iowa in 1907, and recently delivered the keynote address to its 6,000 delegates meeting in Philadelphia.

Votemobile Begins Get-Out-the-Vote Tour in Oklahoma

OKLAHOMA CITY—Gov. Johnston Murray has launched a red, white and blue panel sedan labeled the **Votemobile** on a statewide get-out-the-vote campaign sponsored by the Oklahoma farm bureau.

The ceremony officially opened the good citizenship campaign of that farmers' organization, which will send the **Votemobile** to every county of the state, advertising the registration and election dates and urging adult Oklahomans to register and vote.

Due to appear on the program with the governor are Floyd Carrier of Carrier and Smith Roster of Purcell, state chairmen of the Republican and Democratic parties respectively. They will emphasize the non-partisan policy of farm bureau and the **Votemobile**, and will point out that both parties want a large, representative vote in every election. Mayor Allen Street of Oklahoma City welcomed the **Votemobile** and called on citizens of the capital city to take part in their government.

After the governor's talk, the **Votemobile** left on its three-week tour of all counties, where county farm bureaus will have receptions waiting in principal towns and cities. There the **Votemobile** will stop briefly, with mayors, civic leaders, county political leaders of both parties, and farm bureau members due to take part in short ceremonies.

"We are an organization of farmers; our first concern is to get out a large farm vote," John I. Taylor, OFB president, declared. "But at the same time, we can perform a service to all citizens by spotlighting the registration and election dates. We are urging that all adult Americans exercise their privilege of voting."

Motto of the campaign is "Your vote is your voice—let it be heard."

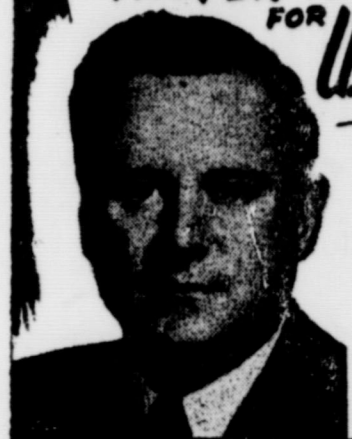

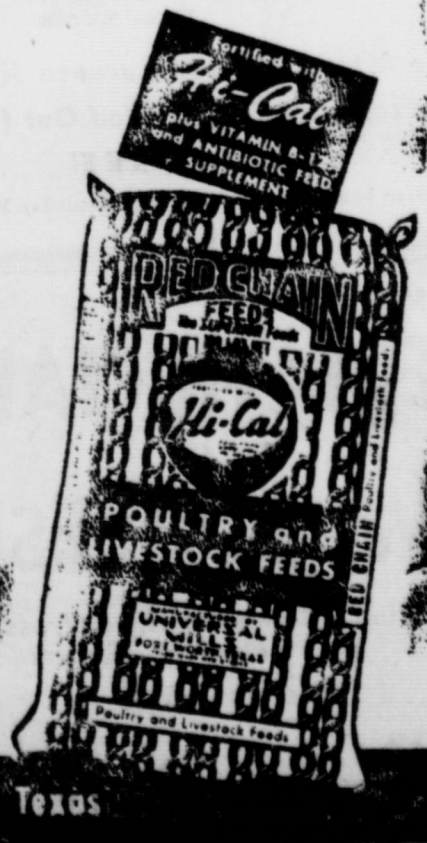

A man prayed: "Help us to remember that the rain-makers can't make rain unless it be Thy will." The storm which hit Waco after the prayer sessions lasted for an hour. In North Waco, residents reported, rain ran in the streets and gutters.

Efficient Grass Feeding Builds Profitable Herds

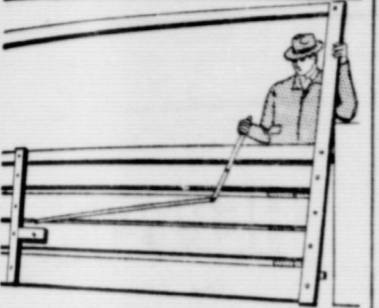
Grass-fed cattle going to market with a moderate finish may never top the market, but nine times out of 10 they make the stockman most for his investment. Grass-feeding is the natural way to grow cattle, livestock specialists believe.

A major line between the soil and man's food, grass can be grazed directly, made into hay or silage. It offers a year-around supply of forage or feed for your herd. Cattle are able to convert forage into beef most effectively if the producer manages his range wisely and efficiently.

Cattle are selective in their grazing, choosing the best smelling and tastiest grasses. Ideally, there should be a succession of new growth which will supply adequate amounts of desirable forage over a long grazing period. In many areas this can be done by growing pasture mixtures with cultivated grasses.

A cow can hold from 120 to 180 quarts in its four stomachs. To fill them she will eat 100 pounds or more of green grass each day when the pasture is good. She also requires from 10 to 15 gallons of water. The producer should keep these facts in mind to gain the best and most efficient use of his pasture.

New Type Gate



A new type gate that eliminates the problem of opening a gate when sheep crowd into a corner is illustrated above. The gate is 16 feet long. The height of the pole at the top is determined by the balance. The gate pivots near the center at both ends. It locks at both ends near the bottom and can be released with the one lever shown. The gate may be opened in either direction, is easy to operate and no lifting is required.

Parishioners List Major Sermon Topics

ST. LOUIS PARK, Minn.—"If you could hear only five sermons the rest of your life, what five topics would you like to hear discussed?"

The Rev. Roger C. Schmuck, rector of St. George's Episcopal church in this suburb of Minneapolis, asked this question of his parishioners.

The topics which got the most votes will form the basis for Mr. Schmuck's Sunday sermons. They are:

- (1) Immortality. Is there life after death? How can we be assured there is? Where can we find the key to the Pearly Gates?
- (2) How can we keep faith in the face of adversity? Is greater faith developed by adversity?
- (3) What can we do to secure and maintain world peace?
- (4) How can adults keep children from losing faith?
- (5) When all goes well with our lives, how can we keep from feeling self-sufficient and independent of God?

Mr. Schmuck went to his flock for the topics after he decided he wanted his series to meet their needs and to answer their questions on the Christian religion or spiritual life.

The Perfect Friend Is Infantile Ideal

CHICAGO—The man who keeps looking for "the perfect friend," "the perfect mate," "the perfect secretary" and who refuses to make any compromises in his relations with other human beings, isn't an idealist.

"He's childish," writes Rhoda W. Bacmeister, Director, Manhattanville Day Nursery, New York City, in a monthly magazine.

Mrs. Bacmeister, who has had plenty of opportunity to study her own and other children at first hand, observes:

"Children keep searching for the perfect companion. They are pals today and 'mad' tomorrow. They think in terms of good or bad, friend or foe. That's simpler than realizing that all of us are both good and bad; that almost any two persons can find ways in which they can cooperate as friends.

"We cannot save them the resulting disillusionment, when they are children. As adults who never grew up emotionally, their marriages as well as their friendships will be wrecked on the rock of 'all or nothing,' while once again, we stand by helplessly."

Trade Districts In Large Cities May Disappear

NEW HAVEN, Conn.—The "downtown" business districts of American cities may soon become "ghost towns", a Yale University traffic expert says.

"The central business districts of our cities are confronted with problems of transportation which threaten their very existence," warns Theodore M. Matson, director of Yale's bureau of highway traffic.

Matson says a city's business district is dependent on the number of people which can conveniently shop in that area.

"As traffic congestion increases, these business districts become harder and harder to get to," Matson adds.

In a speech on "Yale Interprets the News" over Station WTIC, Hartford, the Yale expert said that merchants in "downtown" areas are losing their customers to accessible suburban shopping centers.

Future Looks Dark

"Nationally-known brands, of course, are sold in all areas—in business centers as well as in the suburbs," Matson said. "But non-standardized and luxury items tend to remain in downtown shopping districts and for the moment, the central area serves an important function in a community's economy despite the inroads of suburban competition."

He warned, however, that the future looks dark for many of these downtown areas unless traffic congestion is decreased.

Matson said all cities exist largely because of their strategic location on routes of travel and that while transportation alone cannot make a city, a city cannot exist without it.

"Buses, street cars, taxis and subways are all vital to American cities," Matson said, "and when we add the fact that 70 percent of travel to business districts is made by private automobiles, we have genuine congestion."

Districts Must Change

Matson pointed out that congestion remedy is costly and local governments are reluctant to make any moves. He doubted, therefore, that really strong measures would be taken to relieve the congestion apparent in more and more downtown areas.

"Central business districts, if they are to survive, must change their functions to serve a growing population with an increasingly specialized line of goods and services," he said in offering one possible answer to the problems of the downtown business man.
