Proposes Plan For Prison System

AUSTIN, March 1.—Adoption of plans whereby the Texas Prison System would be made self-supporting—saving the State a million and a half dollars a year—was proposed to the Legislature by Governor W. Lee O'Daniel on Thursday, February 27.

The Governor's program calls also for the enactment of laws to strengthen the management of the

Prison System along lines suggested by the Prison Board.

Further industrial development at the Prison was proposed as a result of a survey recently made by Texas A. & M. College, at the Governor's request.

The Governor suggested that the adoption of more scientific methods in industrial and farm activities in the Prison System would be of great help in developing the rehabilitation program for the prisoners, and would "help improve the morale and state of mind and health and hopes of those men, and serve to make them better men after they have paid the price for

their mistakes and are returned to the society of free men." He suggested, among other things, that the school textbooks of the State—for which one and one-half million dollars each year is now being spent—could well be printed at the Prison System.

Deputy State Superintendent of Schools, E. E. Day expressed himself as being much pleased with the O'Donnell Public School System Thursday when he paid an official visit, checking standardization and

affiliation requirements.

"Shrubs should be selected for hardiness, suitability for soil, for height, flowers, fruit, and foliage. In order to have a variety of plants cuttings may be grown. Some of the plants, which root easily are the Althea, Coleus, Forsythia, Bush Honeyuckle, Anemone, and Agasturus privets, Van Houtti Cypripis, and Tamarrak."

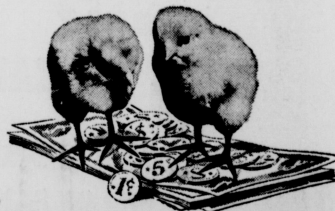
