Commencement Exercises Last Week

Thirty-four high school graduates and forty seventh grade graduates received diplomas last week when O'Donnell Public Schools closed the 1939-40 terms.

Seventh grade exercises were held in the high school auditorium Thursday evening when Rev. J. H. Crawford addressed the graduates. Value Buchanan and L. D. Frazier, honor students, said the salutatory and valedictory addresses, and the class sang "The Sunshine of Your Smile." Superintendent S. F. Johnson presented the diplomas to each graduate, as well as a number of additional awards to grade school students. At the close of the program the president of the class, Bert Mae DeBusk, presented their teacher, Mrs. Paul Gooch, with a beautiful pot plant as a farewell gift from the graduates.

On Friday evening commencement exercises for the high school were held at the auditorium. Elder R. P. Drennon delivered the address. Miss Paulita Middleton sang "When Day is Done," and she and Misses Katherine Teeter and Frettie Jo Eubanks sang "Another Perfect Day." Departing from customary procedure, the class of 1940 dispensed with salutatory and valedictory addresses, but the two honor students, Dale Burkett and Betty Lou Pierce Cook respectively, were recognized during the presentation of diplomas by Superintendent S. F. Johnson. Elbert Crawford received the Wilda Gene Campbell Memorial Award given annually to the best all-round student in the senior class, and which carried with it a scholarship to one of three business schools. LAST CHANCE FOR FREE MATTRESSES

Saturday, June 8, has been announced as the last day upon which farm families may sign up for the free mattresses, according to C. A. Lawrence of the Agriculture Adjustment Administration. He is urging that every family whose gross income in 1939 did not exceed \$400 come in and sign up at once, as no applications will be taken after Saturday.

Mr. Lawrence stated that those wishing to sign should see him or Miss Maurine McNair, home demonstration agent, at once.

Public Free Library Be Started In County

As a result of a move started recently by women's clubs of Lynn county a county library will be established soon in the court house for the benefit of all people of the county.

Lynn County Commissioners Court last Monday authorized establishment of the library in a room in the court house basement as soon as AAA offices are moved to the new agriculture building. The library will be sponsored by the women's clubs, service clubs, schools and others. The court also will aid the library financially, contributing \$80 now to aid in opening the same to the public. WPA will furnish a librarian. Mrs. McAskill, district supervisor of WPA library work, has promised.

Pig Contest For Lynn County Boys

The pig contest to be conducted in Lubbock, Hockley, Hale, Crosby and Lynn Counties, open to all 4-H and FFA boys has just been announced by Sears and Roebuck Co., sponsor of the contest. Eight pure bred registered gilts will be given to boys in each county and will be distributed, four to 4-H club members and four to FFA members.

In order to qualify for one of these gilts, the boy shall write an essay entitled, "Advantages of the Cow-Hog-Hen Plan of Farming." The gilts will be awarded on the basis of 50 per cent for best essay showing knowledge and information, the contestant's essay evidence, and 50 per cent for best essay upon his need, facilities and ability to successfully complete the project.

Entry blanks for the contest are now available and County Agent Don Teeter suggests that any 4-H club member interested in entering the contest, call by his office to obtain these blanks. The closing date for the contest is May 30.

Medical Attention More Available

Medical attention was made more readily available to 3,965 rural families in the five-state area served by Region XII of the Farm Security Administration through a medical care program sponsored by this agency in the last six months of 1939 according to Wilson Cowen, regional director.

This information was received yesterday by Wyman J. Welch, FSA, rehabilitation supervisor in Lynn County.

A survey, covering the period between July 1, and December 31, showed that by state the program made this service available to 5,535 low-income rural people in West Texas, 7,584 in New Mexico, 590 in Southeast Colorado and 6,490 in Western Kansas, at a cost within their ability to pay.

The Farm Security Administration, it was pointed out, does not assume any responsibility for the operation or administration of the medical care program except in making funds available to low-income borrower-families for participation in the plan.

Borrower-families pool their own funds and put them in charge of a bonded trustee. For services rendered the physicians submit monthly statements to the trustee. Bills are then received by a committee from the local medical society. If the monthly funds are sufficient, the bills are paid in full. If a balance remains, it is carried forward to the next month to the end of the period, and then used to complete paying bills for months in which funds are inadequate.

Operation of the plan and all administrative functions as its operation is handled by members of the medical profession.

Each family is given free choice in selecting its doctor from among the participating physicians and each physician is given the same privilege of accepting an individual case or family as is his usual custom.

The medical care program, Cowen explained, was stated to meet a definite need in rural areas.

"We discovered that many of our borrower-families were in the needy edge of rural people because of financial distress resulting from some past illness in the family," Cowen continued. "Their progress was retarded by ill-health and their reluctance to seek for medical attention for which they could not pay."

A. A. Glenn, regional FSA health service specialist, observed that the families owing bills to their physicians, who are participants in the plan are less embarrassed in requesting medical attention.

Doctors report that families do not go to their physicians more often under this plan, but that they do so more quickly, which aids the

physicians in treating the patient. The medical care program usually includes hospitalization in cases of emergency, and many hospitals report that because of the financial status of these patients, most cases would have been on a charity basis had it not been for the inclusion of hospitalization as part of the service.

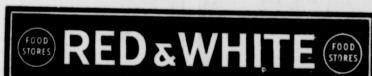
