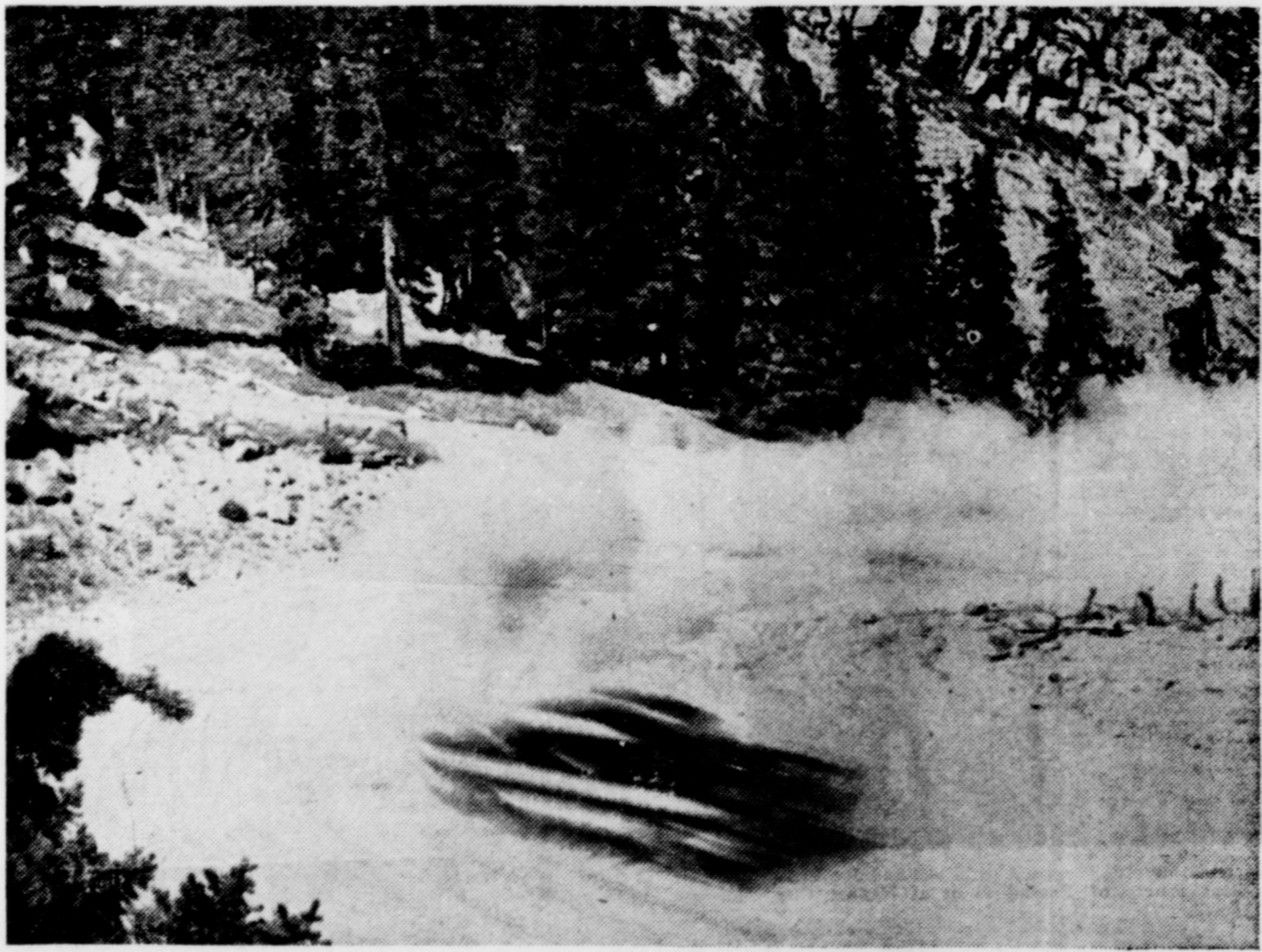

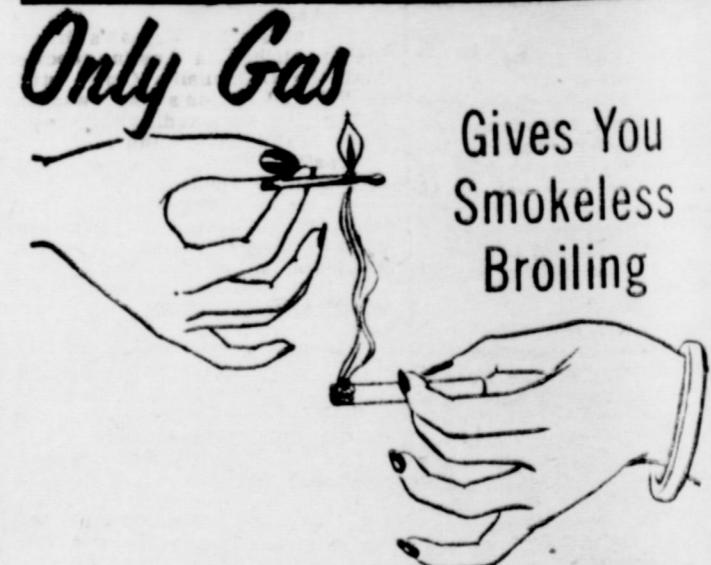

A Clean Community

Every Texas family needs the assurance that it is living in a clean and healthy community, according to Dr. Henry A. Holle, Commissioner of Health. The family needs the assurance that when disease threatens, there will be a local health agency ready to combat it on a community-wide basis. Texas now has 47 full time city and county health units covering 57 counties. These 57 counties have 62 percent of the state's population.

An adequately staffed and financed local health department provides six basic services to the citizens of the town or county. It keeps public health statistics, controls communicable diseases, promotes maternal and child health, enforces environmental sanitation and operates a public health laboratory and works to educate the community for better health. Each local health department will of necessity differ from others and the most effective public health program must be "tailor made" to fit the particular health needs and problems of its own community.

At present 197 counties in Texas do not have full time health protection. Dr. Holle has as one of his goals complete health protection in every county of the state. Some counties now have a large enough population to provide this service but for counties having sparse population, two or more could pool their resources and have the advantage of up to date public health methods.

Dr. Holle points out that giving full time health service to the entire state will require a substantial increase in the expenditure of funds for public health purposes. In his opinion this is the best investment any community can make. Although great strides have been made in maternal and infant health and in disease prevention, Texans cannot be content with less than complete eradication of preventable deaths. A state in which local health services are available everywhere is an important step toward this goal.

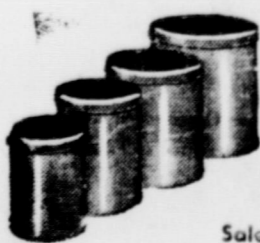

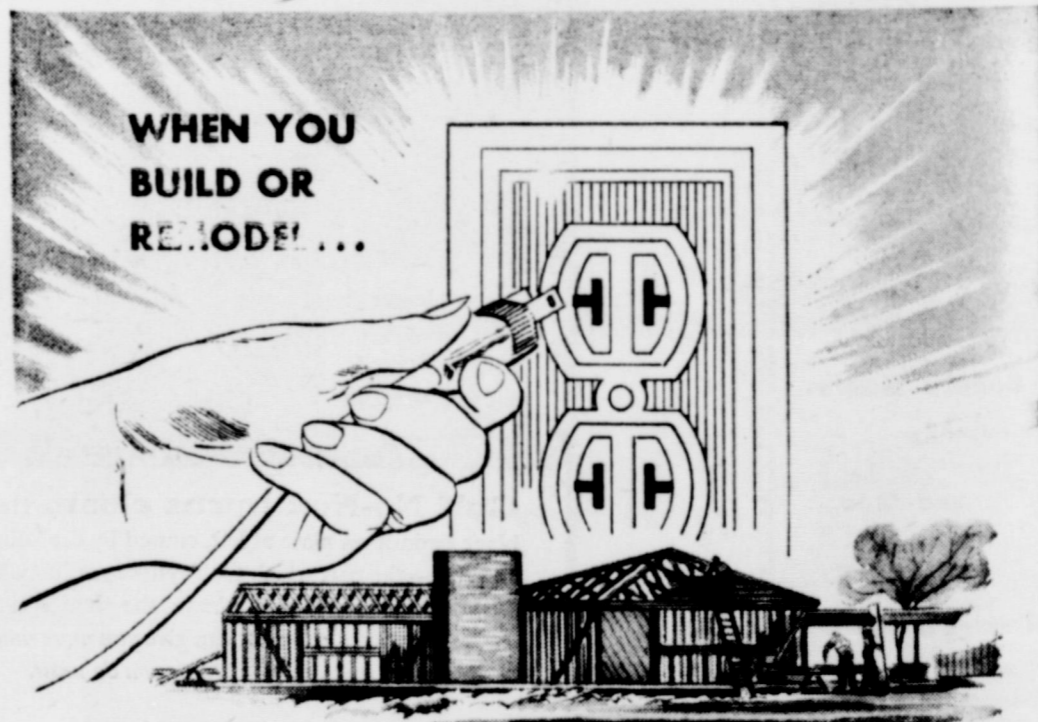

Vegetables Spark Lazy Appetites With Their Appeal

DON'T try to stuff your family with hearty meals all of the time! Right now with warm weather slowly making itself felt, they're apt to show a distinct lack of interest in meals.

Vegetable combinations make excellent main dishes if you add a protein food such as eggs or cheese to them. Besides, it's an excellent way to keep the food budget trim.

Green peppers stuffed with this corn mixture are a pretty as well as nourishing and interesting vegetable dish. You'll want to keep this recipe on file for the next several months:

- Corn-Pepper Bake**
(Serves 6)
- 6 large green peppers
 - 4 slices bacon
 - 1 egg
 - 1 tablespoon butter
 - 2 tablespoons finely diced onion
 - 2 tablespoons flour
 - 1 teaspoon sugar (optional)
 - 1/4 teaspoons salt
 - 1/4 cups milk, scalded
 - 2 cups cooked corn
 - 1/2 cup soft bread crumbs
- Wash peppers, cut a slice from the side of each and remove seeds and fibrous parts. Cover with boiling water and simmer 5 minutes. Meanwhile cook bacon, drain and dice. Beat egg slightly. Melt butter, add onion and cook until tender. Add flour, sugar, seasonings and blend. Add milk and cook

Add Life, Sparkle To Old Clothing With Simple Tricks

SLENDER budgets are the fashion these days, and few can put in a whole new wardrobe twice yearly. You've undoubtedly learned many new tricks on giving new life to old clothes, and here are others which have been tried successfully.

Looking over the suit from last year or probably the year before? If it's been worn a great deal, the skirt is shiny while the jacket is still good!

Here's what you can do: open all the seams very carefully, reverse the material and sew all back together again. It will be almost like new. The jacket could probably use new shoulder padding and buttons, and a new blouse will add that fresh sparkle so essential to suits.

Converting Clothes
Almost every household has some worn and frayed slacks, but fortunately the fraying is at the legs. This can be cut off to give some popular pedal pushers which are knee length, or they may be made like the fashionable toredor pants, knee-length, but lacing in place of cuffing or fitting as is done with pedal pushers.

Slacks might also be cut down and fitted to give a girl, or boy, a pair of shorts. Lighter colors and denim can be cuffed with a contrasting plaid for extra interest. The trimming might be made from an old plaid shirt or remnant.

Use Men's Shirts
Sleeves and collars on men's shirts wear out, but the front remains in good condition. Plan to use it! Much of the back of the shirt can be used for tiny tot's panties, but the lady of the house can have a good looking dicky from the shirt front for her suit. This is especially true when the front has some tucking.

Sleeveless blouses from good quality cottons such as are used in men's shirts are also another excellent idea. Many of these can be cut down without a pattern if you're handy. Otherwise, they're very simple to make from a pattern.

Employ Decorative Tricks
Some clothes need little extra than new trimming to revitalize them. Contrasting bands of material might be used for decoration on skirts. It can also be used to lengthen the skirt or to add some room to a too-tight skirt.

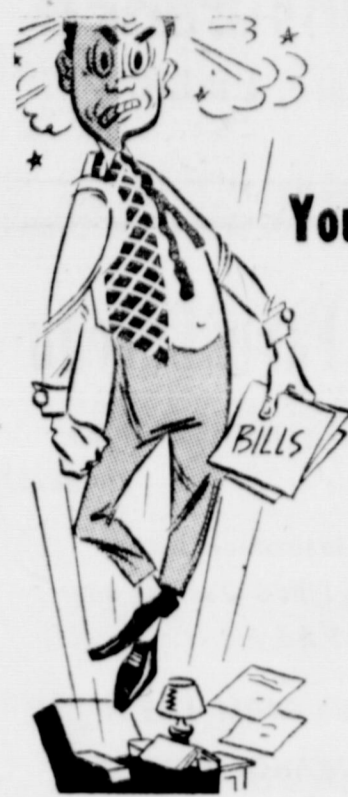

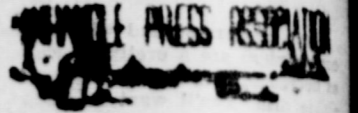

Coffee 'Sneak' Becomes 'Break' in Los Angeles

LOS ANGELES—The first municipal recognition of man's inalienable right to drink a cup of coffee during working hours on the bosses' time is working out fine for both the City of Los Angeles and its 15,000 employees, according to Samuel Leask, Jr., administrative officer.

Los Angeles became the first U.S. city to legalize coffee breaks for municipal workers when it passed an ordinance authorizing employees to take 15 minutes each morning and afternoon at no loss of pay or time to themselves. Previously, city workers had been permitted to take such breaks but the time was deducted from their lunch periods when—and if—employees reported it.

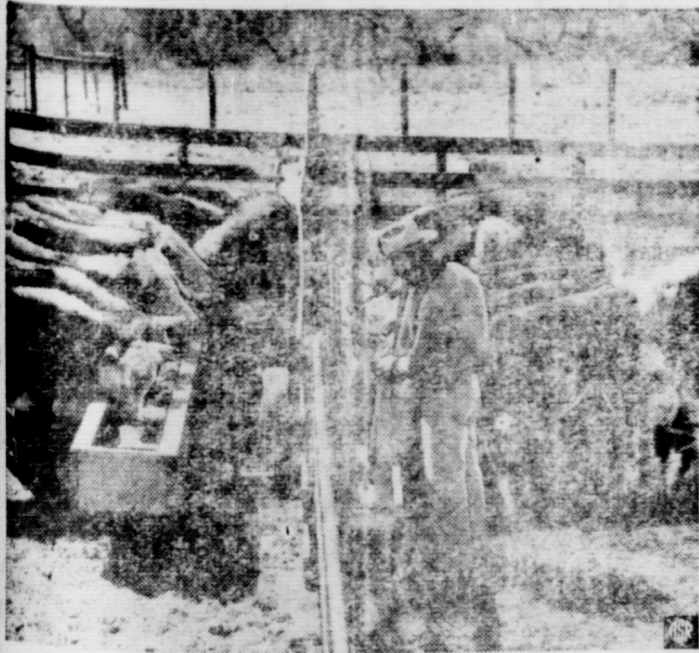
According to Leask, replacement of the coffee "sneak" with the regulated coffee break has been a decided "plus" operation for the city.

"The purpose of making the coffee breaks legal and regulated was to increase work output and thus promote efficiency and economy in the conduct of city business," he said. "After several months of observation, it certainly seems to be working out that way.

"Just like the coffee break in offices and factories, our city rest periods have ended time-wasting 'sneak outs' and other abuses which were costly to taxpayers."

Salted Meal Saves Labor And Dollars

Even cattle are taking up the modern idea—"do it yourself"—and saving American stockmen labor and dollars. Salted meal is the key: it keeps the cattle from making "pigs" of themselves and leads them into what might be called good "trough manners" which benefit the smaller and weaker animals.

Extensive research in control of supplementary protein feeding is being carried out under co-sponsorship of the Salt Institute at the USDA Southern Great Plains Field Station at Woodward, Oklahoma. E. H. McIvain, superintendent at Woodward, explains it this way:

Cattle will eat just so much salt in a day. By mixing salt with cottonseed or other meal, the amount of supplementary feed the animal will eat can be predetermined. The animal will eat until it reaches its salt saturation point and as the bigger animals move on to graze, supplementary feed becomes available to the weaker, more timid animals.

The greatest advantages and savings is accomplished since the feed may be put out for large numbers of cattle once a week. When placed in troughs mounted on wheels, it may be spaced over wide ranges. In this way, one man in one day can do most of the work formerly done by two men in a week.

This method has been found specially advantageous on western ranges where large numbers of cattle and wide rough or timbered grazing areas are present.

Salted meal in a mobile trough saves labor, facilitates less disturbance of grazing animals, more uniform consumption of protein, and better distribution of protein.

Detailed information on methods and feeding of salt-meal to beef cattle may be obtained from one of the Southern Great Plains Field Station, Woodward, Oklahoma.
