It is important to act as promptly as possible. This is recommended in order to allow time for medical treatment or corrections.

As most parents know, vaccination against smallpox is necessary. Those who receive this immunization in infancy should be vaccinated again in order to assure a high degree of

immunity, and those who have never received this protection should be vaccinated with out delay.

Dr. Holle urges parents whose children have not received Salk poliomyelitis vaccine to have this administered before entering school. The safety and efficiency of this prevention has been proven and all children should be protected against this crippling disease.

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



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
