A Leading Citizen ---

G. C. Aten Dies

Grover Cleveland Aten, 71, former Commissioner of Precinct 2, Dawson County in late 1940's, died at about 8:30 Saturday morning at his home about 7 miles southeast of here. Mr. Aten was a farmer for most of his life.

He was born Nov. 9, 1885 in Blanco County, Texas and moved to the Grassland Community, Lynn County, in 1915 where he opened a grocery store and engaged in farming. He moved to O'Donnell area in 1923 buying a farm about 7 miles southeast. He joined the Methodist Church in 1898 and has been a member of that church since.

Survivors include his wife, Mrs. G. C. Aten, two daughters, Mrs. Jimmie Jones, Oakland, Calif., and Mrs. Kinny McDonald, El Monte, Calif., one son, Pat Aten of St. Louis Mo., two step-daughters, Mrs. L. T. Steward, Austin and Mrs. A. E. Jackson, Farmington, N. M., one sister, Mrs. N. R. McLendon, Johnson City, Tenn. A son, Buford, was killed in the Feb. 19th, 1945 invasion of Iwo Jima. He was stationed with the 5th Marine Division.

Also 8 grandchildren, 5 great grandchildren and a brother, Arch Aten of Sacramento, Calif.

Funeral services were read Tuesday afternoon at 2 p. m. at the Methodist Church.

Officiating at the service were the Rev. Marvin Fisher, pastor of O'Donnell Methodist Church and the Rev. Ed Crandell of Lubbock. Burial followed in Grassland Cemetery under direction of Higginbotham Funeral Home.

ENROLLMENT HERE DROPS

Supt. Weldon Skinner said Tuesday morning that 544 children had enrolled in school as of Monday. This compares with 550 last year on same date. By divisions this year's enrollment is ---

Junior High 161, Grade School 245 and High School 138.

Mr. Skinner said that average daily attendance this year must be 565 or the school would lose one teacher next year.

Trade Day Planned Here

Last week some 25 local business firms entered into an agreement with the National Trades Day Association of Weatherford to conduct a weekly trades day here beginning in about three weeks. Banker E. J. Smith and John Ellis are local workers on the project.

Drawings for a jackpot will probably begin in about three weeks after a pamphlet containing the rules and a list of merchants is printed, Mr. Smith said. The drawings, to be held weekly, will probably be on each Saturday afternoon at about 3 or 4. The merchants in the program will distribute the tickets-like trading—stamps as a bonus.

For the past several years of the drought, the Saturday crowds have fallen off to near the vanishing point and many Saturdays here there have been fewer folks in town than on some week days. Merchants hope this small token of appreciation will bring their friends of former years back to town. By Christmas the appreciation fund is expected to be not less than \$500. Health Exam. Urged For School Children

"Children are not really ready to enter school until they have had a complete physical examination." Dr. Henry Holle, Commissioner of Health reminds parents. All boys and girls enrolling in the kindergarten or first grade classes of Texas schools should be taken to their physicians or to a public health clinic for a physical checkup if they have not had such an examination in recent months.

It is important to act as promptly as possible. This is recommended in order to allow time for medical treatment or corrections.

As most parents know, vaccination against smallpox is necessary. Those who receive this immunization in infancy should be vaccinated again in order to assure a high degree of immunity, and those who have never received this protection should be vaccinated with out delay.

Dr. Holle urges parents whose children have not received Salk poliomyelitis vaccine to have this administered before entering school. The safety and efficiency of this prevention has been proven and all children should be protected against this crippling disease.

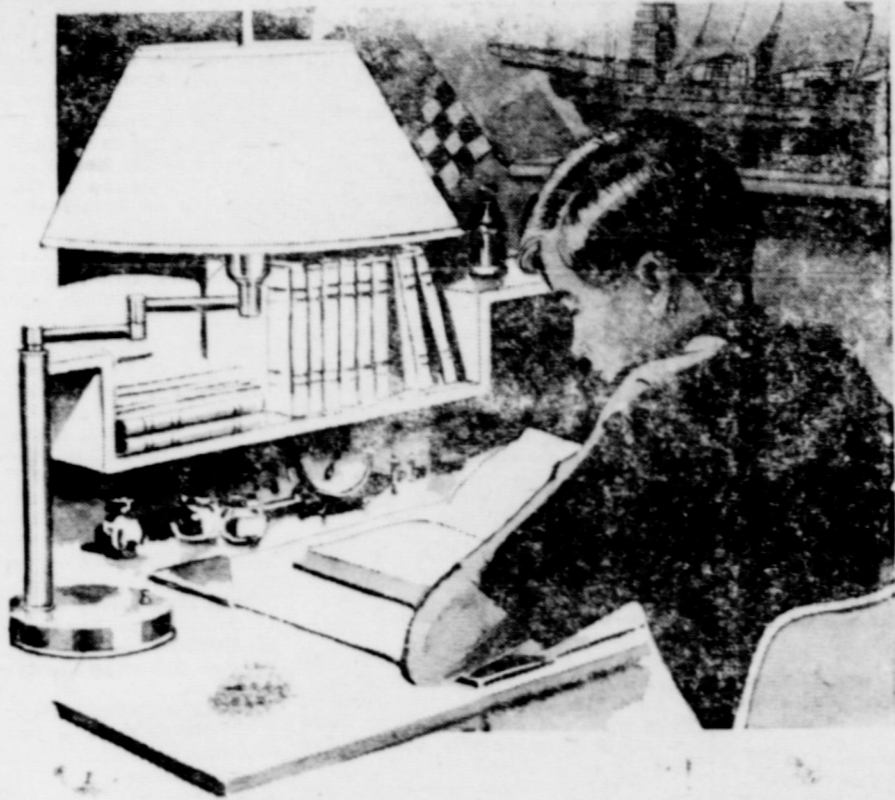

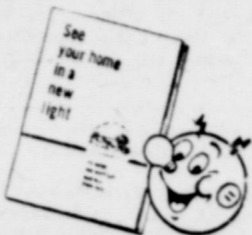

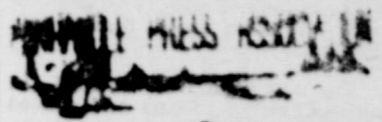

NOW DROUTH RELIEF PLAN
OPERATION

The new drouth relief plan... help farmers and ranchers... roughage for livestock is in operation. Walter McKay, state director of the Farmers Home Administration said that county FHA offices were ready to accept applications for hay and other roughage. Applicants should go to the nearest FHA office to file their applications. Each local FHA committee will determine each applicant's eligibility and issue a certificate for \$7.50 per ton on roughage for a supply to October 1, 1956. The applicant then applies for a certificate on the purchase price of roughage from any dealer chooses. The dealer endorses the certificate and draws a draft on the state emergency drouth committee's account.

Roughage includes all types of hay, cotton seed hulls, peanut hulls, corncocks, sorghum bundles and silage.
