Copyright Law Is Important

America has led the way in protecting the fruit of man's mind. Our literature, drama, scholarship, and vast media of public information prosper because of our copyright law.

Are you an author? An artist? A playwright? Or are you thinking of going into such work? If so, find out about copyright law. It protects you—against copying, but not against independent reproduction of a similar work.

A copyright enables you to sue him if federal courts for damages and collect — if someone copies your work or any substantial part of it without permission.

The most important single thing about copyrights is this: Do not publish anything until you find out what kind of a copyright notice you need. If you publish without proper notice, you lose all rights in the work.

As long as your book is not published, you own the script. The common law protects your rights in it the same as in any other property. For an unpublished book you need no added legal safeguard. You cannot register its copyright.

But you may copyright such work as a play, lecture, sermon, or artwork, though it has not been published.

A book's copyright may be registered in the author's name or any one he selects, such as the publisher, who can better guard the copyright, or grant proper consent to quote the book, under a contract between himself and his publisher.

Here are some other kinds of work you can copyright: Poems, newspapers, maps, photographs, dramatic and musical compositions. A copyright is good for 28 years. You may renew it once so as to keep it in effect for a total of 56 years.

Proper Fertilization Is Important



Proper fertilization is necessary for efficient use of irrigation water, research by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station at Substation No. 8 in Lubbock reveals. Harvey Walker, assistant agronomist, above, exhibits results or studies in the influence of fertilizer on root development of cotton plants.

These plants were grown under hot house conditions in sandy soil from the Brownfield area. The plant on the left received no fertilizer, while the one on the right was treated with the equivalent of 240 pounds of nitrogen, 200 pounds of phosphate and 200 pounds of potash per acre. "This rate of application was much heavier than normal recommendations and was for experimental purposes only," Walker explained. The fertilizer was applied in bands about 6 inches below and 10 inches to each side of the seed level.

While plant leaves, with the aid of sunlight, perform the vital function of processing plant food, a sturdy root system is essential to obtain sufficient raw material—water and plant nutrients—from the soil. The role of fertilizer in root development is evident from this test, as the above photo illustrates.

In other tests with grain sorghums, greater returns per acre-inch of irrigation water were obtained when the crop was properly fertilized. In 10 different fertilizer trials, yields varied although the same amount of irrigation water was applied in each case. An increase of 76 pounds of grain for each acre-inch of water was obtained with proper fertilization. "The important conclusion to be drawn from the fact is that soil fertility must be balanced in order for growing plants to efficiently utilize water applied," Walker said.

Many questions on the use of commercial fertilizers are still to be answered according to Charles E. Fisher, Superintendent of Substation No. 8. "Facilities at the Texas Agricultural Extension Service's soil testing laboratory here in Lubbock will permit us to increase on research efforts," Fisher said.

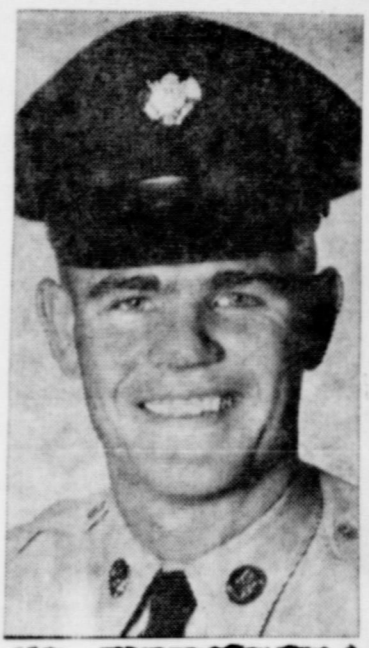

Oyster Farming Is Big Business

Take a look at the calendar. There's an "R" in every month between now and April, and you know what that's supposed to mean. It's the oyster season again. More millions of the succulent shellfish are destined for harvest in the next months from the many reefs in land bay waters of Texas.

A stupendous total of 45 million individual Texas - grown oysters were sold on the retail market last year. More than 90 percent of the passed through plants on which the Texas State Department of Health had put its stamp of approval covering plant sanitation.

Last year's harvest was put up 154,000 one-gallon cans, with 300 medium sized oysters per can. A very high percentage of them were consumed right here at home.

Since oysters are often eaten raw it stands to reason they would be capable of carrying disease. In the past they did, of course, but today to nowhere near the extent that would if they were not for a little-known program of plant certification and water pollution investigations conducted by the Texas State Department of Health.

The certification program was started back in 1937. It is voluntary in that there is no law compelling plant operators to seek certification. But in order to sell their oysters in cities which have local shellfish ordinances, plants must be certified by the state health agency. Most major Texas cities have such ordinances.
