Drouth Relief Fund
Finances Road Program

A statement released Sunday to the Avalanche Journal and to residents in this area for this date by Guy R. Johnston, State Highway Department engineer for this district, outlined a gigantic highway construction program which is expected to bring thousands of dollars into South Plains counties.

Mr. Johnston stated that \$8,900,000, in addition to the approximate \$24,000,000 allotted from PWA funds has been appropriated for relief in drought-stricken areas. Ten such counties are in Mr. Johnston's district, and will receive their pro rata share of the appropriation.

These counties are Dawson, Lynn, Terry, Andrews, Gaines, Yoakum, Cochran, Hockley, Castro, and Bailey.

Construction Projects
Reach \$15,000,000

Austin, Dec. 12.—Texas' \$24,250,000 NRA road building program, swinging past the half way mark, will approach \$15,000,000 in construction projects actually under way by Christmas, the Texas Good Roads Association announced today from highway department figures.

More than 25,000 Texas breadwinners already have been given jobs from this highway program, according to calculations of the United States Bureau of Public Roads—8,500 directly on the jobs and twice that number in contributory pursuits such as manufacture and transportation of materials.

Fire Started By
Terrific Explosion

Fire almost completely destroyed all that was inflammable of the Sinclair Service Station at about 3 o'clock last Thursday morning. Other businesses which were conducted in the building and which were also destroyed were Boots Swan Garage and Massey's Casino. Winter Knight, the agent for the Sinclair Oil Company, also had his office in the station. Most of the fixtures and equipment of Massey's Casino were saved. Not only the building but all of the fixtures and stock of tires and other merchandise of the service station were saved. The station was being operated by J. C. Christopher. The building was owned by George Shelley of Austin.

The fire resulted evidently from a terrific explosion which shattered the plate glass on the north side of the building and scattered it all over the adjacent street. Many large slivers of glass struck the Phillips Service Station on the opposite side of the street and in some shattered the glass in a door. The noise of the explosion awakened people several blocks away. J. C. Christopher, owner of the Sinclair Station, says that he has no idea what could have caused the explosion. Many advance the theory that it must have been an explosion of natural gas.

State Health Officer
Warns Against Carelessness in Diseases

Austin, December 14.—"It is a great mistake to treat even light cases of measles, chickenpox, mumps, scarlet fever, or any other of the communicable diseases of childhood as though they did not amount to much," said Dr. John W. Brown, State Health Officer. "Treatment of that sort makes it possible for these diseases to spread and cause serious outbreaks among children whose impaired resistance makes them easy victims to any form of infection."

"Some of the most serious outbreaks we have had of scarlet fever, as well as of other diseases in different parts of the State, have been traced to mild cases—that is to cases too light for the doctor to be called. In some instances the children have carelessly handled mild cases. They have returned to school and have scattered these germs around among their school mates. Eventually a group of cases—sometimes very serious ones—have developed from this careless handling of mild cases. The result was another epidemic that could have been prevented."

"There are several things worth remembering in connection with children's diseases. Nearly all of these diseases begin with a digestive upset or with symptoms closely resembling those of the common cold. Accordingly it is a wise thing for mothers to regard every digestive upset and every common cold with suspicion until you are sure that it is not the beginning of something more serious."

Lynn County Farmers
To Receive \$237,000

Lynn county ranks second among the counties of the South Plains in amount due farmers in cotton options signed last summer. Checks for the first four cents per pound are due to be in the hands of these farmers by the last of this week, according to statements made recently by Dr. Bradford Knapp, when he was in Washington. Cotton administration officials gave him to understand that they were making preparations to issue these checks within the next few days.

Information on which the checks will be issued has been in Washington for several months, and the mechanical task of writing them will not be as great as it was for the cotton pool up campaign.

Crosby county had the largest number of bales optioned on the South Plains, there being 11,950 optioned. Lynn county had 11,850 bales.

New Events To Be
Included in County
Meet This Spring

Playground ball for boys and girls, tennis in four divisions, volleyball, junior track and field events and the regular track and field meet for Class B and Class A high schools, as well as the Rural Pentathlon, are all to be included in the athletic program for the interscholastic league meet next spring, according to Mr. Fletcher Johnson, recently elected director of athletics for the League in this county.

"Here is a plan," he said, "which offers physical development as well as wholesome recreation for every boy and girl in the public schools. The matter of winning should be stressed but not stressed too much. If you don't win this year, you are getting good training for winning next year or the next. Make a beginning by getting in the game, and then see what happens."

"The new issue of the Constitution and the Rules is being distributed from the state office of the League, and the schools expecting to participate should get a copy of it. All of the contests are described therein and rules given in great detail. Also, the eligibility rules, some of which have been changed, should be studied carefully."

"There is nothing which makes school more attractive to children than participation in healthful games and sports. We need not only one hundred per cent membership in the League, but one hundred per cent participation."

"Mail Packages Early"
Pleads Postal Official

This week and part of next is expected to be the busiest season of the year at the local postoffice, said Hal Singleton, postmaster, and every postmaster is asking the cooperation of those sending packages or greetings through the mail.

Suggestions for mailing are as follows: All parcels must be securely wrapped and padded; use strong paper and heavy twine.

"Packages with fragile contents should be so marked; all should be packed in heavy or corrugated cardboard; use padding, and use newspaper tissue paper to prevent moisture; sharp pointed instruments, or edged instruments, should be protected to prevent injuries to clerks; and drawings, paintings, and maps should be wrapped around a wooden core or placed in a tube.

Articles easily broken should be securely wrapped, crated, or boxed; glassware must be packed so that exposure to particles or pieces if broken in transit is impossible.

Addresses must be typed or printed on all packages, with return address. If a card or tag is used, this information should be on the package also. Christmas cards should not be mailed in red, green, or other dark colored envelopes.

Postage must be prepaid. Weight limit is 70 pounds, with 100 inch limit in length and girth combined. Special delivery for packages to be delivered Christmas Day should be used where articles should be mailed. The special service is in addition to regular postage.

Valuable parcels should be insured or registered. Coin, currency, jewelry and other articles of considerable value should be mailed first class.

Liquor Tax to Aid "Dry" Texans

Houston, Dec. 14.—Although Texas remains dry, prohibition repeal will bestow upon motorists of the Lone Star state a New Year's gift of \$3,500,000 yearly, the Texas Good Roads Association pointed out today.

The special federal gasoline tax of one-half cent per gallon, levied by Congress this year as a revenue provision of the National Recovery Act, will be voided automatically on January 1.

The act, which raised the federal levy on motor fuel from one cent to one and one-half cents, stipulated that it would be returned to one cent "as of the first day of the calendar year following repeal of the 18th amendment." Liquor tax income will make up the difference.

Thus, twice during 1933, the much harried consumer of motor fuel has regained a little of the ground he lost

of recent years, in his battles against heavy special taxation.

The first "break" for more than a million Texas motorists came last March when the state legislature hit a hefty blow at gas tax evaders with the new felony law against motor fuel "hoaxleggers", Comptroller Shepard, by hard work, is recovering millions in stolen revenues yearly, half of which go to improve state highways.

Taxes on motor fuel in Texas, as 1934 begins, will remain at five cents per gallon, one cent federal and four cents state. Yet only two cents of this total goes directly to the basic purpose for which the tax was conceived, construction and maintenance of highways.

The average Texas motorist pockets \$2.78 a year from the reduction in annual motor fuel tax bill dropwise from \$30.58 to \$27.80 for average consumption of 550 gallons of gasoline, the road association estimates.

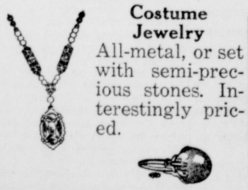

In February**

Lubbock, Texas, Dec. 12.—Work is expected to start on two large dormitories for Texas Technological College by February 1, following announcement that \$650,000 had been granted by the Public Works Administration at Washington for the purpose.

Each building will house 300 students, one being for girls and one for boys. The structures will be three stories high and have basements. They will be built in style and material to conform to the general architectural plan of other college buildings. The dormitories will be handsome and commodious and will embody the latest and most approved designs suitable for students' housing.

The exact location of the buildings has not been decided, but they are expected to be placed on either side of the double driveway leading into the campus from Broadway; the girls on the south side and the boys on the north side.

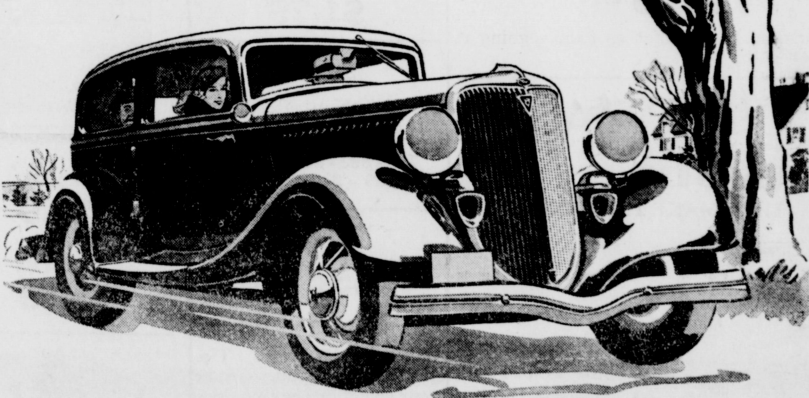
