#### T. B. Rate Is Down

ay Me

Last year for the first time since Texas State Department of Health began keeping records of cause of death, tuberculosis did not appear in the list giving the ten leading causes of death. Dr. Henry A. Holle, Commissioner of Health reports that tuberculosis dropped from tenth place to eleventh and diabetes, a newcomer iin the first ten, was in ninth place.

Fifty years ago first as a cause of death in Texas. It was sometimes called "Captain of the Men of Death" and the great White Plague." A concerted program for the elimination of this disease has been carried out over the years by official and hon-offi-cial agencies with the help of the medical profession. Since 1940, the drop in deaths from this disease has been most rapid.


Dr. Holle warns the public not to become complacent about situa-tion, as 816 Texans died of this disease last year. The State Health Department carries on an extensive mass X-ray survey program to de-tect the disease in its early curable stage. These mass surveys not only discover tuberculosis but certain heart conditions, cancer and other abnormalities in the chest other abnormanties in the character area. Advancement in methods of treatment, surgery and antibiotics all hale contributed to lowering the death rate and returning the victims of tuberculosis to useful

occupations. Diabetes claimed 896 lives This is a disease for which there is no known cure. When it is discovered early and kept under close medical supervision, diabetes need not interfere with its victims regular way of life. The disease can be kept under control by diet, insulin injections or a combination of these as decided by the doctor. as decided by the doctor.

It also works for a patient struggling to breathe following a heart attack or bad spell of asthma, breathing for the patient until nature can take over. The breathing machine saves newborn babies who don't breath spontaneously; it is used against polio and pneumonia and serves other purposes as in sur




