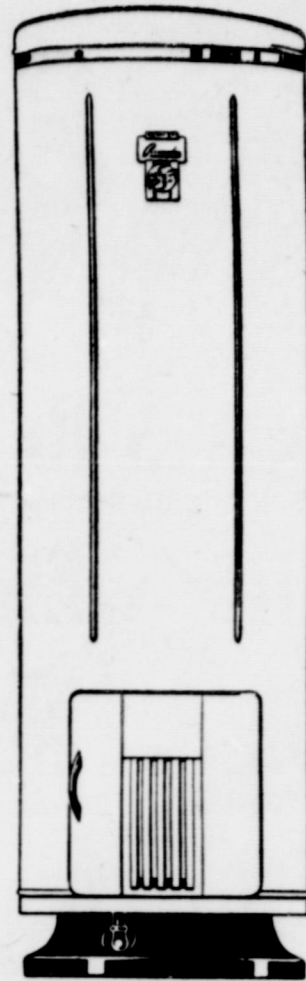

### DUST STORMS DIFFICULT FOR THE HOME MAKER

COLLEGE STATION — Dust storms h costly in many ways — have had Texas homemakers in a dither lately. Dust, for instance, allowed to collect on lampshades or diffusing bowls, can rob housewives of considerable amounts of light.

When electric bulbs, fluorescent tubes or diffusing bowls become greasy and collect a dust film, turn the switch off, remove the fixture and wash just like glass-ware, says Bernice Claytor, extension home management specialist.

Electric bulbs, however, should NOT be submerged in water but should be cleaned when cool with a damp, soapy cloth and then wiped dry. Make certain, she adds, that the fixture and your hands are dry before placing the clean bulb or bowl back into its outlet.

If bulbs appear darkened even after cleaning, replace them with new ones. Otherwise, the family may still not be getting full benefit from electric power consumed.

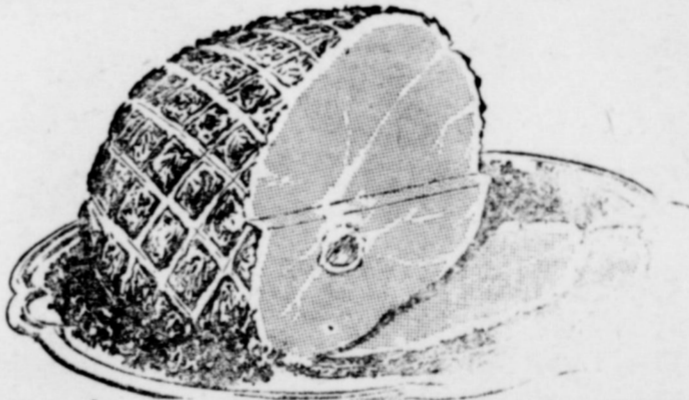
