H. E. Baldrige, Col Founder Of Town, Dies

H. E. Baldrige, 85, died at his home in Abilene at 12:45 p. m. Friday. He had lived in Abilene for ten years. Before moving to Abilene, he resided in Lynn County for over 40 years. He was one of the first four commissioners of this county when it was organized. He was co-owner of the O'Donnell town site.

He is survived by his wife; one sister, Mrs. J. F. Matthews, Lubbock; two sons, T. E. of Clovis and H. E., Jr. of Rogers, Ark. and three daughters, Mrs. Ben Moore, Sr. of here, Mrs. H. D. Perry of Abilene and Mrs. Carl Taylor of Clovis. He is the brother of the late Joe Baldrige, who founded the Baldrige Bakery in Lubbock.

He had been in ill health for the past six years following a stroke of paralysis. He suffered a broken hip in a fall about 16 months ago, and had been seriously ill for about six days. He was born July 28, 1867 in Meridian. He was wed to Lizzie Preston 64 years ago at Buffalo Gap.

Funeral services were held at 2 p. m. Saturday at Elliott's chapel of Memories with Paul W. Witt, Church of Christ minister, officiating. Burial followed in Elmwood Memorial Park.

A partner with late C. H. Doak, he developed the townsite of O'Donnell and was one of the guiding figures in fashioning the town into the present modern small town. One of the main streets is named after him.

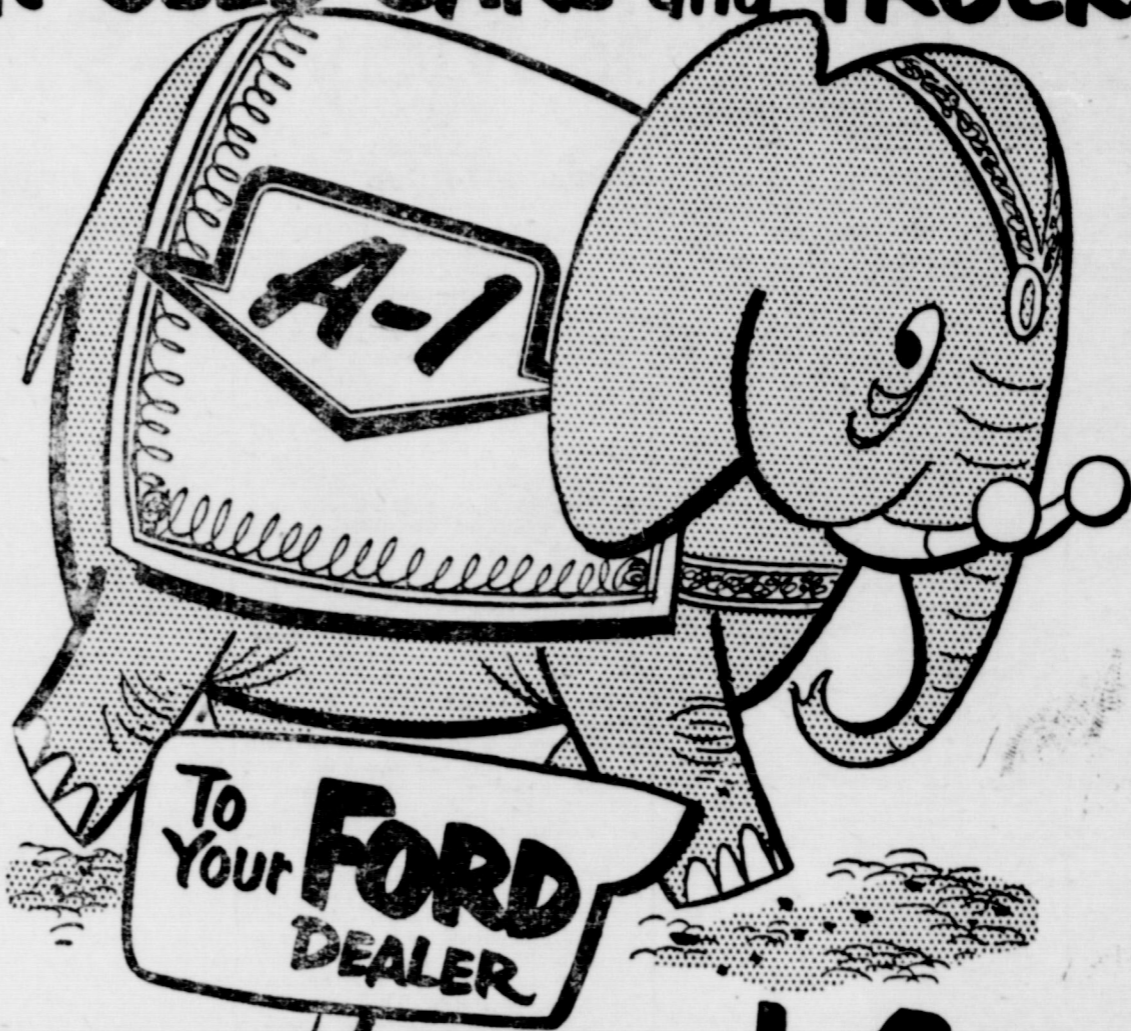

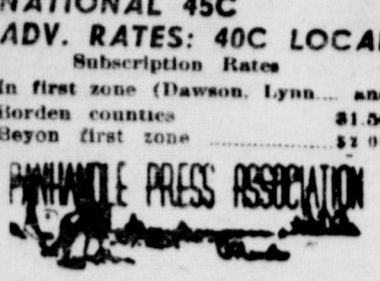
