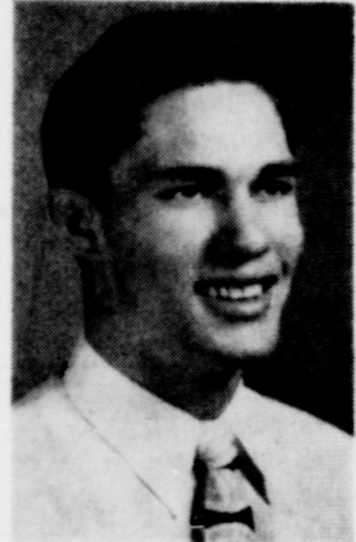

CERTIFIED MAIL SERVICE GOES INTO EFFECT

Postmaster General Summerfield this week has launched the new certified mail service as a regular part of postal operations.

Certified mail is a simplified form of registered mail. It will provide "proof of delivery" service for



items not having actual monetary value. Hal Singleton, 3rd, Acting Postmaster here said.

For 15c, plus regular postage, the Post Office keeps a record of certified mail delivery at the local post office for six months in the event the sender should need to establish that the item was actually delivered. Under full registration, the minimum charge was 30c per item.

WIRE WORMS HIT LOCAL CROPS

County Agent Bill Griffin said Monday that wire worms were eating up a lot of cotton seed and sprouted plants causing a poor stand or killing the cotton after it has reached a stand. These pests will also feed on grain sorghum seed. Treatment for cottonseed is 2 oz. of lindane or BHC 25 percent wettable powder per bushel. For grain only one oz. of lindane or BHC is recommended.

Arol Moore said that he received less wire worm damage on his irrigated cotton than on his dry land cotton. Wire worms seem to be a dry weather pest. Also, Mr. Moore said he seems to find more wire worms in land where last year he raised grain.

LEGAL NOTICE

On June 13, 1955 the Commissioners Court of Lynn County passed an order requesting all land owners in Lynn County to refrain from drilling any water well or irrigation well closer than sixty feet from the original section line.

Previously, on February 8, 1954 an order was passed by the Commissioners' Court of Lynn County requesting High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1 not to permit any wells to be drilled closer than sixty feet from the original section line in Lynn County.

It is the opinion of the Court that compliance with this request will aid the County very much in its road work. It might also be advantageous to the land owner to comply with this request if in the future the State should require right-of-way for Farm to Market road.

AMENDMENT MADE TO S. S. LAWS

1954 amendments to the Social Security Act provide that a worker's earnings can be "frozen" if he becomes totally disabled.

Jack G. Hutton, manager of the Social Security office in Lubbock, said this does not mean payments will be made to the disabled person before he is 65 years of age. It means that when he is 65, or in the case of death, the period of his proven disability will not be counted against him in computing the amount of his own or his survivor's payments.

In some cases it can mean an increase in payments already being received by retired workers and their families.

SUMMER DISEASES ARE SERIOUS FOR CHILDREN

Austin. -- The summer season always brings an increase in the incidence of dysentery, diarrhea and enteritis, all of which are major menaces to the lives of small children, annually causing the death or illness of hundreds of Texas youngsters.

Dr. Henry Holle, Commissioner of Health, declares that the chief cause of these intestinal diseases are contaminated milk, water or food, allowing the child to get over heated or exhausted; excessive sugar in the infant's formula and foods that have been improperly refrigerated.

All foods should be clean and

fresh and all leftovers should be refrigerated so as to avoid spoilage. The utmost care should be used in preparing the infant's formula which should, of course, be prescribed by a physician and his recommendations as to sanitation precautions and correct refrigeration should be implicitly followed.

The Commissioner of Health warned parents especially of the disease transmission by flies. Children in any home that is not free from flies are in danger of contracting dysentery or other intestinal diseases which may be fatal.

If dysentery or diarrhea symptoms appear in your child, call your doctor immediately. His treatment of the disease is your best insurance against fatal results, since such diseases are really a very serious threat to the child's life.

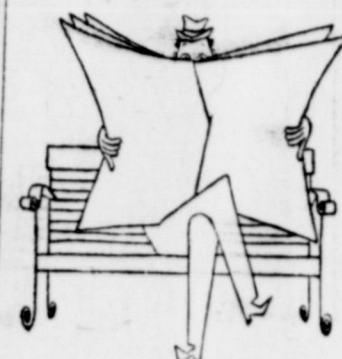

Cotton Babies Throng In Goldsmith, Ind.

GOLDSMITH, Ind.—Dr. S. M. Cotton was given a big day recently in this town of 300 population. He celebrated his 50th year as a "country doctor" with the aid of more than 3,000 persons.

Fifteen hundred of the celebrators wore cards on their lapels proudly proclaiming "I Am a Cotton Baby."

The slender, blue-eyed doctor thought he must have delivered "between four and five thousand" babies. Tipton county records show Cotton's name on 4,467 birth certificates.

Cotton was honored at a big dinner in the Methodist Church. Afterwards, the Jefferson Township band led a parade down Main St. to the Old Settlers' Grounds, where the doctor, his sandy hair shot with gray, presided over a picnic.

Small Town Anything But Slow and Quiet

FARMINGDALE, N.Y. — Some people can't reconcile the idea of a small town with the idea of speed. But when they visit Farmingdale, their conception of a small town as a place of horse-and-buggy slowness is likely to be blasted from their heads by the roar of man's latest symbol of speed—the jet airplane. This is the home of the Thunderjet.

And as the home of the Thunderjet, the community must keep pace with the speed of progress that is being made in jet plane performance.

Less than 10 years ago the first American-built jet got off the ground, and a 15-minute jet flight was quite a performance. But now Thunderjets are racking up records of more than a thousand combat hours in Korea, they are spanning the Atlantic and Pacific and making double coast-to-coast flights non-stop, carrying heavy loads.

Today's single-engine, single-seat Thunderjet can fly faster and farther than many of the multi-engine, multi-manned light bombers of World War II, and they pack as heavy a wallop.

That is the symbol of speed this home town, often confused as small towns are in public thinking with places of drowsy tranquility, must live up to.

Army Adopts Formula To Stop Fungus Pest

BALBOA, Canal Zone—The army will defeat a costly tropical disease due to its civilian-military cooperation program in the Caribbean command.

It is estimated that adoption and perfection of a new-type fungus control compound ultimately will save thousands of dollars worth of army instruments. The compound's formula was submitted to the United States army in the Caribbean's suggestion committee by a civilian.

Donald F. Scott, chief of the instrument repair branch of the Inter-American geodetic survey, Balboa, Canal Zone, and a veteran of 20 years experience with precision instruments, developed the formula after a long series of experimentation.

The formula, consisting of seven parts beeswax, two parts vaseline and one part mercury (poison), prevented fungus growth on instruments during nine months of testing during the rainy season in the Panama jungles. Instruments not treated with the compound showed signs of fungus within 90 days.

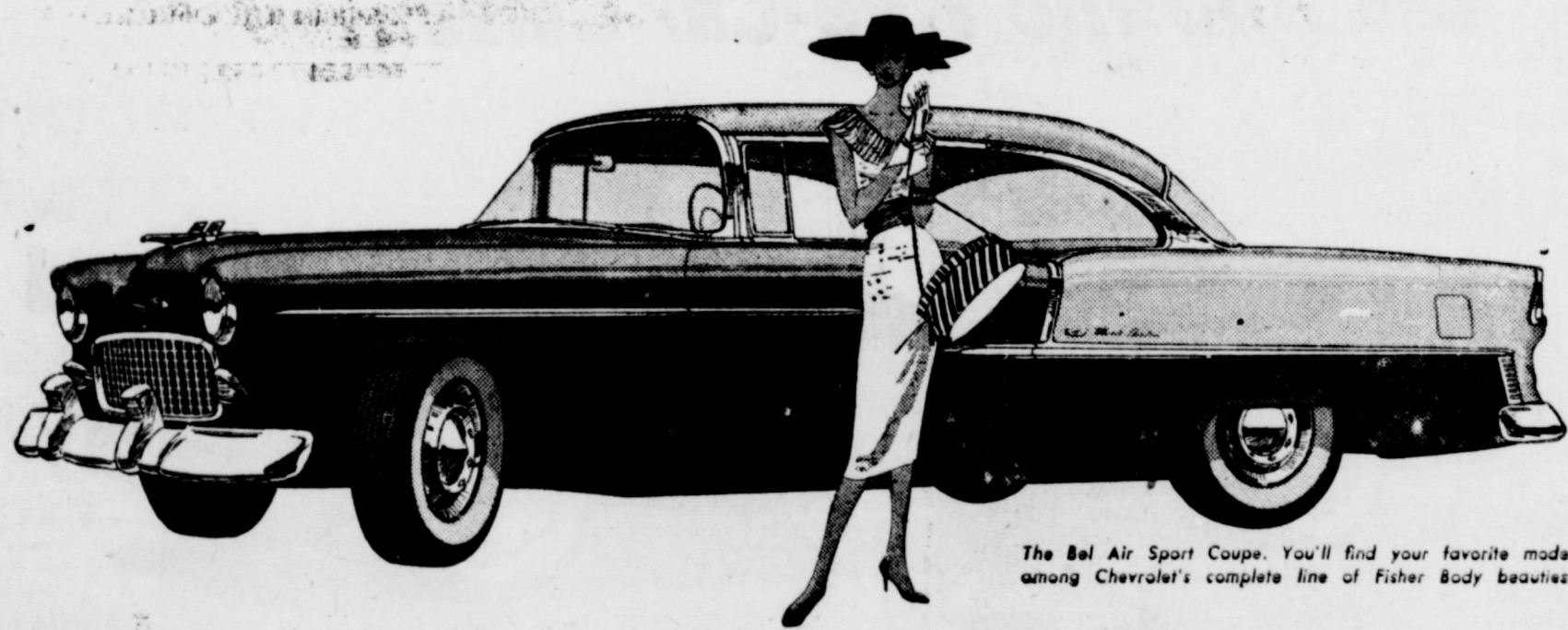

Builds Own Home; Beats Housing Shortage
 BERLIN, N.H.—One way to beat the housing shortage—if you have the time and talent, backbone and brawn—is to go out in the woods and start building your own house with your own hands.

That's what Bob Hughes, Berlin artist and high school art instructor, decided to do about two years ago, and if all goes well, he hopes to move in with his wife and two children before long.

The 36-year-old jack-of-all-trades has been building the new house almost single-handed during summers, weekends, and any spare time he can find.

The front door will have 15 panels of thick pine, recessed and carved by the gifted young artist-teacher-marionette maker into the 12 signs of the zodiac, with three panels for another design. The front hall will be paneled in pine, some a foot and a half wide. The stairs are huge solid oak blocks.

Bob Hughes is his own architect, designing the house himself and working from his own set of blue-prints. It is a combination of modern and traditional. The living room has a large picture window, composed of twelve panes which saves the expense of a single sheet of plate glass, and has the advantage of individuality.

The kitchen will be done in white ash, and has a laundry shoot down into the basement.

Looking tanned and rugged, with a crew cut, dungarees and G.I. shoes, Bob didn't think he was doing anything particularly remarkable in building his own house. Although he was aboard the first landing craft to hit the coast of Normandy on D-Day, he knows he is not the first amateur to build a home for his family in this area. And he pointed out that he didn't dig the cellar-hole and has no intention of installing the furnace and plumbing.

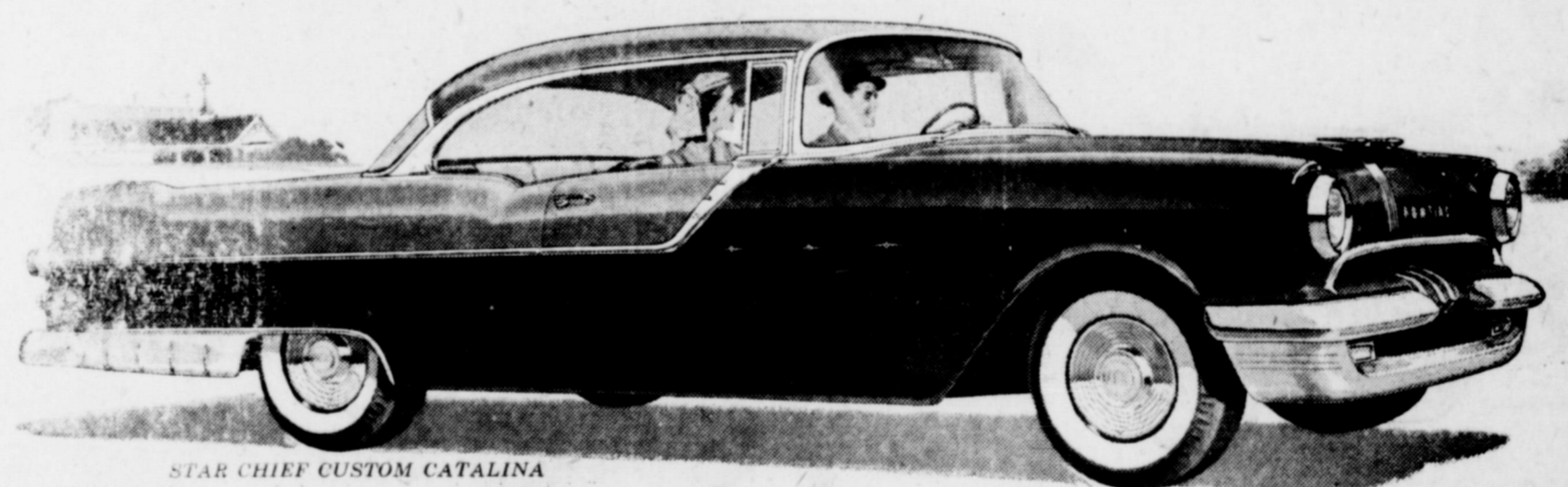

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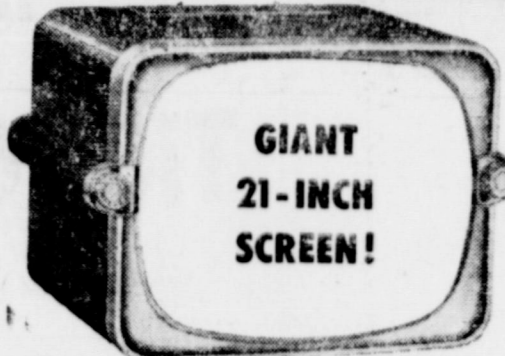

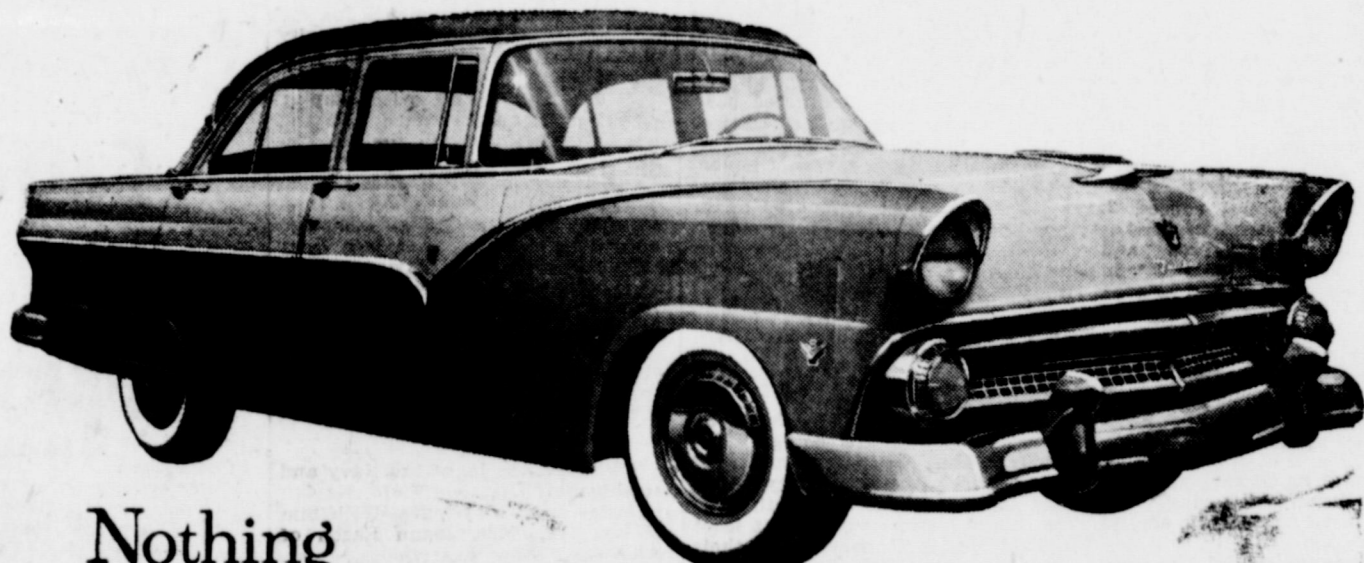

ACCIDENTS FOURTH IN CAUSE OF TEXAS DEATHS

Accidents rank fourth as a cause of death in Texas. According to Dr. Henry Holte, Commissioner of Health, 5,372 Texans died last year of this one cause, while thousands more were crippled. There are no figures available on the number of days lost because of accidents, there can be no doubt that it is tremendous. Automobiles caused 2,519 deaths or 47 percent of the total. The dangerous curves and intersections on the highways in Texas are well marked and drivers can assist greatly in reducing accidents by carefully observing them. Many accidents could be avoided if motorists would drive below the legal speed limits when tired, sleepy, in rainy weather and when other hazards exist. One should adhere closely to the law regarding the dimming of lights for approaching cars. It is an old saying, but true, that those who drink should not drive. Many deaths are caused by accidents in the home. A total of 650 deaths were caused last year by falls. In homes most of these fatal accidents occur on either outside

or inside stairways. Of course there are many other locations in the home where accidents can and do happen.

Disorderly housekeeping, poor furniture arrangement, slippery waxed floors, worn floor coverings, unanchored rugs, neglected repairs and dark or obstructed passageways are other fall hazards found in many homes. Short cuts and so-called time savers frequently lead to accidents. The time saved is insignificant compared to the cost and time lost from an accident. When everybody develops safety habits accidents will not be 4th as a cause of deaths.

CLAIM MUST BE FILED FOR SOCIAL SECURITY

Thousands of dollars in social security benefits are being lost yearly. John Hutton, manager of the Lubbock social security office said this week. According to Hutton, many persons who are at least age 72 and still operating their business are not aware of the provisions in the law which allow eligible persons age 72 or older to receive their benefits without retirement. Persons of this age who have

made profits in covered self-employment of over \$400 in at least two of the four years self-employment has been covered, undoubtedly have fulfilled the requirements for entitlement but the Social Security Administration cannot start your payments until a claim is filed.

"There are also many self-employed persons who are over age 65 and whose net earnings in their business is less than \$1200 per year which would permit them to receive benefits if they qualify even though still working. Persons between age 65 and 72 whose net earnings from self-employment are between \$1200 and \$2980 per year may draw benefits for some months of the year based on a scale of one month's deduction for each \$80 earned over and above the \$1200. One of the requirements for any benefit is to file a claim.

Q. — I am thinking of paying my GI insurance premiums once a year, in advance. If I pay my yearly premium, and suddenly need the money, would it be possible for me to get it back from VA?

A. — Yes. VA will refund you what ever amount has not been applied to monthly premiums.

Q. — I attended college for four years under the World War II GI bill and then went back on active duty. I have just been discharged from my second tour of service with a service connected disability. Would I be eligible for vocational training under Public Law 894 even though I already had received training under the GI bill?

A. — Only if you are in need of training to overcome the handicap of your disability. If you need the training you may train under Public Law 894 for as long as is necessary for you to achieve complete rehabilitation.
