Canadian River Bond Election Is 8th

Water Is Matter Of Life For The Town

Voting will be in nine member cities of the Canadian River Authority Tuesday, Nov. 8th on the proposal to build a dam on the Canadian river near Sanford to cost \$74,800,000 including pipelines, and to be financed by the issuance of revenue bonds secured by contracts to purchase water. Several years ago O'Donnell voted 100 per cent to enter the authority along with Lamesa, Tahoka, Stanton, Lubbock, Levelland, Brownfield, Plainview and Borger. O'Donnell was the only town that did not cast a "no" vote. O'Donnell also needs the water more urgently than the 8 other member towns.

Two local men, Ross Stark and S. M. Clayton, have carried the ball on the project for the past five or six years. Clayton is currently a director on the Board.

To Vote City Tax Office
Voting will be here at the City Tax office. Every resident of O'Donnell having property rendered for city taxes, and otherwise eligible to vote may, AND SHOULD,

VOTE. The election of next Tuesday is a general district election and does NOT bind O'Donnell until a later election to be held for a contract to purchase water from the authority. To date there is NO organized opposition to the project in any of the 9 cities and all newspapers are editorially for the project.

Sunday Fire Guts Theatre Here

Fire Loss Is Heavy

A Sunday morning fire at about 10:30 completely gutted a Latin American theatre housed in the Singleton Estate building. The theatre was the property of C. C. Caldwell of Lubbock. Two buildings adjoining to the east and occupied by Winans Hardware and the Bargain store were damaged by the dense smoke which drifted in thru the attic.

Damage Is Near \$35,000
Mr. Caldwell, who was in town Sunday afternoon, declined to estimate his loss, but said it was partly covered by insurance. He said the equipment in the theatre was rather old. Unofficial sources available Monday estimated the building loss at no less than \$30,000 and the theatre at \$6,000 to \$7,000. The theatre, for the past few years, has only been open during the harvest. Mr. Gardenhire, manager of the theatre, as well as the recently built Rex Theatre, said the fire apparently began on the stairway going up from the lobby to the projection room.

Firemen Did Fine Job
The local fire department headed by Chief F. M. Jones, got to the fire only seconds after the alarm but arrived to find the water off due to repairs being made in a water line in the alley in rear of Index office. Thru the prompt action of Water Supt. Bert Fritz and men on the job, water was cut back on in 3 or 4 minutes. A first water was used from the storage tank of the main fire truck. However, as the alarm sounded the fire looked to be only locally in extent but the minutes lost in getting water gave the fire an edge that was never countered. The fine work of the firemen in their Sunday clothes, save the other two buildings of the beautiful chain of buildings. This was the first major fire in midtown in 30 years.

The fire points up the fact that the City should have master gate valves so that only a small area of town would be without water during repair periods. Mr. Fritz said that the valves are below the ground many under paved streets, and all are rusted beyond being able to use.

Saturday morning and afternoon 275 farmers and others enjoyed the first annual field day of the new broiler industry in the grade school cafeteria. The program including a progress report of the industry to date was given in the morning with Ken Looper as the leader. A delicious barbecued chicken dinner was served which was prepared by L. D. Jackson. After the meal a field trip was made to the broiler plants of Joe Eaker, Bart Anderson, L. D. Jackson and Horace Brunett and Roy Line.

Wide and favorable publicity of the day will be given by KDUB-TV, KFYO, and several poultry magazines. The TV program will be this Sunday at 6 to 6:30 on the Plainsman program on KDUB-TV Ch. 13 and will feature film reports with Bart Anderson, Joe Eaker, and Lynn Birdwell at the broiler plants of Joe Eaker, Bart Anderson, L. D. Jackson and Horace Brunett and Roy Line.

A Progress Report

The broiler industry has come a long way since that May nite when two or three farmers acted on the proposal. Currently there are 31 houses built or being built with a total of 40 houses contracted for by Jan. 1st, according to Mr. Looper. The goal is 150 houses and then the project will level off. Already \$10,000 has been paid out in labor here and \$6,000 paid out in sale of broilers, all in 4 months and only 6 houses being sold. The goal of 150 houses in area with four crops per year will give \$288,000 NEW money in circulation each year. A hatchery and a processing plant are a surety within the next year or so. Mr. Looper said joyfully.

Mahon Presents Case For West Texas On Cotton

Congressman George Mahon advises that he has this week renewed his appeal to Department of Agriculture officials in Washington and Texas urging that West Texas be accorded a fair share of the state cotton acreage allotment for next year. In commenting on the controversy, Mahon said, "I am glad that farmers and farm groups are urging consideration of the proposed program. We recognize that there will be a small reduction in the entire state next year. Any reduction will work a hardship on most farmers, but to undertake to shift large acreage to Central and East Texas areas which have about abandoned cotton production is improper and out of keeping with the spirit of the program. The original proposal of the State Committee would have that effect. I am assured by Agriculture Department officials in Washington that some modification of the original plan can be expected. It is urgent that a reasonably fair plan be agreed upon. Any plan adopted will work some injustices. The best we can get will be none too good. We must remain on the alert until the problem is settled."

Facts Given On River Bond Election

1. What is the purpose of the November 8th Canadian River Authority Bond Election?

A. To authorize the Authority to issue \$74,800,000.00 in revenue bonds with which to construct the Canadian River Project. These will be bonds of the Authority and will in no way obligate any of the cities or tax payers.

Actually the Authority is an agency created in 1953 by the Texas Legislature to do a special job of developing a surface water supply under the management of a board of directors, each of whom has equal authority and is chosen from the member cities.

3. Who is eligible to vote at the bond election?

A. All those who reside in the territory which was in the corporate limits of a member city as those limits existed on May 27, 1953, and who have a current poll tax receipt or are exempt, and who own either real or personal taxable property within the aforementioned area and who have rendered same for taxation to the city. If either a husband or wife who has such property, the other is also qualified as regards the property ownership requirement.

4. Do we need the Canadian River Project?

A. Yes, in order to supplement and conserve the underground supply and thereby increasing the supplies necessary to supply the municipal and industrial needs.

5. What will the project consist of?

A. The construction of a dam near Sanford (Hutchinson County) to initially impound 961,600 acre feet of water (313,300,000,000 gallons), filtration facilities a water conduit to each of the Member Cities, and with pumping stations in order to furnish up to 47,000,000,000 gallons of municipal and industrial water annually to the Panhandle South Plains of Texas.

6. What is the estimated project cost?

A. \$74,800,000.00.

7. What will be the quality of the water? Will it be "Gypsy"?

A. The quality of project water will be equal to or better than that now obtained from underground sources. Exploratory drilling in the reservoir area have not revealed any serious gypsum deposit conditions.

8. Will the water be treated? Where?

A. Yes, - all project water will be treated at the dam site.

9. Is the flow of the Canadian River sufficient to maintain the project planned?

A. Records over a long period of time show that even in severe drought periods, a minimum annual dependable yield of 144,000 acre feet (128 million gallons per day) of water can be expected from the Sanford Reservoir drainage area of 12,655 square miles.

10. Can other cities be supplied with water?

A. YES - depending upon the economics involved and the ability to satisfy its prior commitments, the Board may at its discretion furnish water to additional cities along the line.

11. When will water be available to the cities?

A. Present plans call for delivery of water in 1960.

12. What is the plan of financing?

A. The Authority plans the sale of up to \$74,800,000 revenue bonds of the Authority to be paid solely from the sale of water. No property taxes can be levied by the Authority to pay principal or interest on such bonds.

13. Will the bonds be sold without further action by the voters of the member cities?

A. No. The bonds, being revenue supported, as distinguished from tax supported, cannot be sold un-

less the voters of the member cities at a subsequent election authorize their city government to contract with the Authority for water. A sufficient number of such contracts or contracts with others must be entered into to provide the funds required to service the bonds before they can be sold.

14. Why did the Authority choose private financing instead of Federal financing?

A. After a thorough study by the Board of Directors of the Authority and the City Official of the nine member cities concerned, it has been determined that Federal financing is less desirable because-

(1) it requires the cities to obligate their property taxing power,

(2) of the uncertainty if Federal funds,

(3) the price of water could be determined only upon the completion of the project, and

(4) the title to the reservoir and Dam would remain in the Federal Government even after the project has been paid for.

15. Would the Federal Government build the project free of charge to the member cities?

A. No.

16. What will be the average cost of water to each member city over the next 50 years?

A. After the bonds are paid off, water costs drop to approximately six cents (6) for 1,000 gallons resulting in an average cost of about fourteen (14) per 1,000 gallons over the first 50 year period.

17. Will the price of Canadian Water be the same to all member cities?

A. Yes.

VA Quiz

Q -- I am drawing monthly disability compensation payments from VA, and I also am paying monthly premiums on my GI insurance. Would there be any way for VA to deduct enough money out of my compensation to take care of my insurance premiums, so that I wouldn't have to bother with them every month?

A -- Yes. So long as your disability compensation checks are large enough to cover your GI insurance premiums, you may apply to VA to have the premiums taken out of your compensation.

Q -- I am a Korean veteran and I have just been discharged from service. I plan to apply for Korean GI term insurance within 120 days from my separation. Will I have to take a physical examination?

A -- No. A physical examination is not required. All you need do is file an application and pay your first premium -- within the 120 days after your separation.

Q -- If I buy a house with a GI loan, is the salesman's commission considered a part of the closing costs or a part of the purchase price of the house?

A -- The salesman's commission is considered as a part of the purchase price of the house. The sales price including the commission may not exceed the "reasonable value" as set by VA.

Q -- I understand a veteran's Korean GI training entitlement can be extended if it runs out when he is more than half-way through his semester at school. What about on-the-job training? Can entitlement be extended here too?

A -- No. GI training entitlement may not be extended for veterans taking on-the-job training.
