**Health and Home**

**CAMPING AND PROBLEM OF FOOD**

There is no healthier sport than camping. During the warm and balmy spring and summer days, it is real recreation. To get out in the fresh air and sunshine, free from worry and care, enhances the health of anyone, be he office man, salesman or what not.

But due to the entirely inadequate means of food preservation and refrigeration found in the majority of camps, there is the ever-present danger of sickness from infected foods. The utmost care must be taken in order that this may be avoided. Butter and eggs should be bought only as used. The milk is a problem in itself. Perhaps the solution lies in the use of a milk other than market milk, in order that purity and sterility may be assured. For such use, evaporated milk is ideal. Many people are wont to confuse evaporated and condensed milk but there is no similarity between the two. Condensed milk is a combination of sugar and milk and can be used only when both of these substances are desired. Evaporated milk is merely pure, fresh milk with about sixty per cent of the water removed and the nutrient content left intact. It is absolutely sterile and pure, having been sterilized before leaving the factory. The water, removed by evaporation, may be replaced very easily and the milk returned to its original volume. Evaporated milk may be obtained in small cans, containing six ounces or in larger ones containing sixteen and can be taken to the camp in quantities sufficient for the needs of the entire period, thus assuring a constant supply of pure, fresh milk without the worry or the danger attached to the use of the market product.

Following are recipes for a few dishes that are best adapted for camp consumption because of ease of preparation, purity and food value.

**Tomato Soup.**

1 pint tomato pulp or canned tomato soup  
1 1/2 cups water  
Salt and pepper to taste  
1/2 cup evaporated milk  
1/2 tsp. soda

Bring tomato pulp or soup to the boil, add the seasonings and soda. Heat the milk and water and combine slowly with the tomato mixture.

**Stirred Eggs.**

1/2 cup evaporated milk  
1/2 cup water  
1/4 tsp. pepper  
1/4 tsp. paprika  
6 eggs  
2 tbsp. fat  
Grated cheese

Beat the eggs, add the milk, water and seasonings. Melt the fat in a frying pan. Add the egg mixture and stir until the mixture is creamy. When almost done, sprinkle with grated cheese. Serve on slices of bread, toast or crackers.

**Famous Delhi Gardens**

**Laid Out by Monarch**

The Kudsia Bagh or the Kudsia gardens in Delhi, India, where tennis tournaments are held, were originally laid out in 1748 by Quack Bengam, the mother of Ahmed Shah, emperor of Delhi.

They have been well looked after, and although they cannot compare with the more ambitious pleasure grounds of the earlier Mughals, are well worth a visit. No wall adorned with serrated battlements encircles the grounds, nor is there any imposing entrance gateway which is a great feature of the larger pleasantries.

In the center of the gardens, however, there is an old gateway. Now but a picturesque ruin, it was, a writer in the Montreal Family Herald understands, the gateway to Qudsi Begam's palace, of which nothing now remains. To the southeast of this gateway there is another picturesque ruin—an old mosque which, though attached to the palace, was not included in it. In many ways the mosque is the more interesting of the two structures which give the gardens an air of bygone times.

**Important Japanese Feast**

The "Feast of the Banners" as celebrated in Japan is a holiday in honor of male children, celebrated on the fifth day of the fifth month, which is now May 5. On every house that can boast of a male child is affixed a pole of bamboo, and floating therefrom are one or more gaudy fish made of paper. The exact number is determined by the number of boys in the household. The wind, blowing into the mouths of the fish, inflates them and makes them writhe and wriggle with a curiously lifelike motion. The fish are supposed to be carp, which in Japan are recognized symbols of health and long life. Other staffs support pennants of every color while banners blazoned with heraldic devices float in the wind. Boys of all ages appear in the street in gala attire, some having little sabers in their belts, some bearing on their shoulders huge swords of wood, gayly painted and decorated, and others carrying miniature banners.

**County Commissioners' Court Meets**

The commissioners court this week took steps to determine definitely the east line of the county. This line has long been in dispute. An order was passed Wednesday authorizing a survey of this line. Garza county will be served with a notice of this action and asked to join in the matter of establishing definitely the locus of the boundary line between the two counties.

The commissioners fixed the tax rate of the county at 82 cents, which is two cents, lower than last year. They reduced the court house and jail fund rate from 25 to 10 cents, but owing to

the fact that the rate for the bonds and warrants fund had to be increased 13 cents. Since the state rate has been increased two cents, the total state and county rate will be exactly the same as it was last year.—Lynn County News

### Tractor and Implement Dealers Aiding Farmers

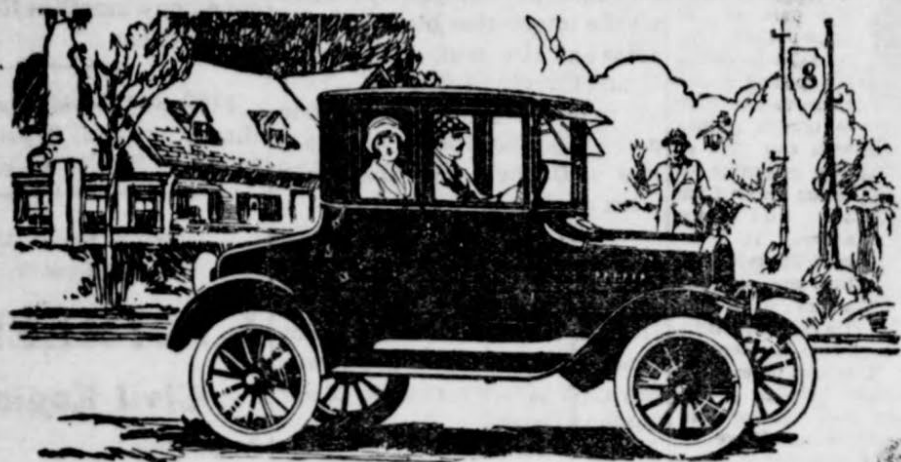

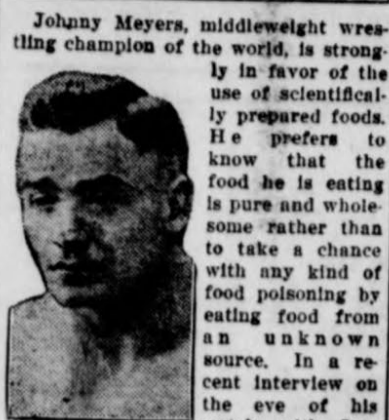

**Champion Wrestler  
Tells What to Eat**



Johnny Meyers, middleweight wrestling champion of the world, is strongly in favor of the use of scientifically prepared foods. He prefers to know that the food he is eating is pure and wholesome rather than to take a chance with any kind of food poisoning by eating food from an unknown source. In a recent interview on the eve of his match with Lou Talaber, from whom he won his

crown, he said: "I expect to win the crown from Talaber. He is a fine wrestler and uses more science than any man of the mat today. However, I feel sure that my superior physical condition will prevail and that I will emerge victorious and the champion of my division. Diet is a very important part of my program in training for a match. The system that I use is really very simple, involving only good judgment and caution in the selection of food. I prefer to eat scientifically prepared foods whenever possible and I never eat anything to which is attached the slightest doubt of its purity. I eat a great deal of canned foods because I am sure that they are pure and will have no ill effects on my digestive system. Take just as an example of what food can do for the body—milk. It is the greatest of body builders and a very important part of any man's diet. But is sometimes impure or contaminated and may be the source of illness if used. Because of this fact, I use evaporated milk entirely and find it very satisfactory. I know that it is pure and that I will not suffer from its use. I know that it is a great body builder because the concentration of it gives it such food value. I know that it is easily digested, more so than market milk, in fact, because I drink it before going to bed and feel no effects of it in the morning. This is usually hard to do with ordinary market milk. This plan, in substance, is the same one that I use regarding other foods. If there is any chance or suspicion of impurity or low food value, I use something else.

"And if a man is so situated that it is impossible for him to get the proper amount of exercise, he must be doubly cautious not to partake of any but the purest food. On the whole, if a man eats with wisdom and observes the fundamental rules for good health, there is no reason why he should ever have a sick or uncomfortable day."

## Health and Home

### PROPER FOOD FOR SCHOOL CHILDREN

The age during which children are attending school may aptly be called "The Dangerous Age." It is the period of rapid growth and every care should be taken to insure the child of a normal and healthy body. The idea of eating only fit and wholesome foods should be early impressed on the younger members of every family in order to protect them against later ill health and its accompanying unhappiness. If the utmost care is not taken in the diet that is used by children, cases of food poisoning, indigestion and kindred ailments may result.

And milk, being the chief item in the diets of most children, should be carefully guarded. It is, because of its nature, prone to infection if exposed to germs and may soon become unfit for use. Wherever there is the slightest reason for doubt as to its purity and food value, steps should be taken to insure the sterility and the fitness of milk intended for consumption by children. Many mothers have adopted the excellent practice of using milk that is absolutely pure and sterile and free from any germs or bacteria. The most satisfactory, as well as the safest milk used in preparing food for the growing child is evaporated milk.

It is sterile, and therefore safe. It is more digestible than market milk. Its uniformity, convenience and cost are qualities that recommend it.

The following dishes are well suited to the needs of the growing child; they are easily digested and very nourishing:

#### Caramel Custard.

1 cup evaporated milk diluted with 1 cup water  
3 eggs  
1/4 cup sugar (caramelized)  
2 tsp. sugar  
1/4 tsp. salt  
1/2 tsp. vanilla

Scald the diluted milk. Caramelize the sugar and add to milk to dissolve. Beat eggs slightly, add sugar, salt, and flavoring and combine with scalded milk. Pour into custard cups and set in a pan of hot water and cook in a moderate oven. When done, a knife blade run in the center will come out clean.

#### Fish Chowder.

1 pint raw fish cut in 1-inch dice  
5 small potatoes, sliced  
2 onions chopped fine  
1/2 pound fat salt pork, sliced  
3 cups boiling water  
1 cup evaporated milk diluted with 1 cup water  
6 crackers

Fry out the salt pork. When brown, remove pieces of pork and put fish, potatoes, and onions in kettle. Cover with boiling water. Simmer until potatoes are tender. Add the milk and cook 5 minutes longer. Season with salt and pepper. Just before serving add the crackers.

#### Royal State Coach

The English royal state coach, which is still in use on ceremonial occasions, is a magnificent vehicle of its kind, and, according to Horace Walpole, cost nearly \$38,000. The use of coaches is a comparatively recent innovation, for as late as the reign of Queen Elizabeth the English royal family had to be content with a wagon which was a sort of cart without springs, the body resting solidly on the axle. Before the invention of the coach the most aristocratic ladies were accustomed to ride on pillion fixed on the horse, usually behind some relative or servant.

#### Tribute to a Painter

Millais (the painter) told me of a real and graceful compliment paid him by an American who bred horses. When Millais had finished the American's portrait, he was allowed to see it for the first time. There was a long silence while he gazed at the picture—so long, indeed, that the painter got anxious. At last the man said, "I breed horses, and it is my habit every morning after breakfast to stand at a certain window in my house, and the fillies come galloping up at the sight of me and feed from my hand. When I get that picture home, I shall stand it at that window, and I am very sure the fillies will come galloping up."—Sir Johnson Forbes Robertson in the Sunday Times, London.

#### Hopi and Apache Dolls

The bureau of American ethnology says that the dolls of the Hopi Indians are never made of clay, but are manufactured from the subterranean branch of the cottonwood tree. They are not necessarily rain gods, although the need of rain is so omnipresent and these images are copies of certain idols which appear on rain altars, that they are sometimes called rain gods. They are, however, not gods, but dolls, and are made by the parents and given to the children as playthings. The dolls of the Apache, as well as certain other tribes, are often made of adobe, and are probably used in much the same way as the Hopi dolls.
