No. 1 Killer

Heart disease is the number one killer in Texas and last year there were 29,191 deaths from diseases of the heart, said Dr. Henry A. Holle, Commissioner of Health.

What kind of heart have you? The periodic checkup with your physician will tell you. The Tuberculosis Survey in the state conducted by the Texas State Department of Health has brought to light many non-tuberculous abnormalities, some of these have been heart conditions.

Three frequent types of heart trouble are: coronary heart disease, hypertensive heart disease, and rheumatic heart disease.

Coronary heart disease is the chief killer and is a disease of the arteries which supply the heart muscle itself with blood. A majority of persons survive the first attack, and with good medical care, rest and common sense precautions, may even live a normal life span.

Another major cause of heart trouble is high blood pressure or hypertension. This is the most common heart disease of middle age. There is a great deal that is not known about this disease, but we do know that it is most common in people who are overweight, and that it is associated with long, continuous nervous strain, high tension and constant worry. Medical treatment of high blood pressure is fairly successful in many cases.

Rheumatic heart disease, the most common type of early life, occurs as the result of one or more attacks by the streptococcus germ. It is a public health problem for which much can be done in light of recent knowledge. Prophylactic use of penicillin when streptococcal infections are present will prevent heart involvement.

Syphilitic heart disease can be prevented by early and adequate care of the patient with syphilis. This problem has been simplified by the use of penicillin.

Research in the medical sciences is constantly improving the outlook for the cardiac patient, yet each individual must assume the responsibility for obtaining the benefits of this knowledge from his physician for himself and family.

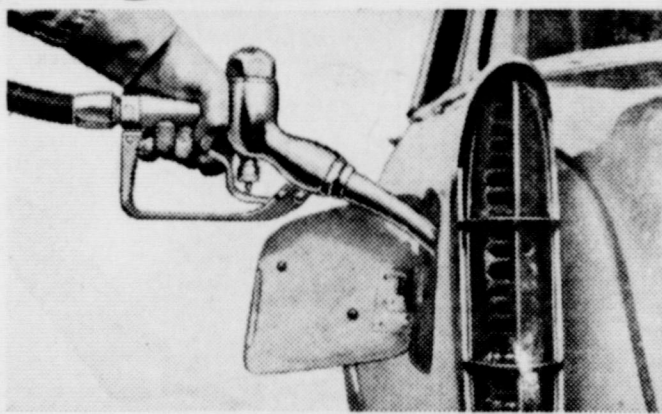

Automation and YOU



Incorporating many aids of modern day science to plant construction and operation, Aldens, one of the nation's big four mail order companies, soon will move into a huge new streamlined 2-story building that will centralize its middle west headquarters in Chicago. Automation is the theme of the 650,000 square feet of space that will expedite handling of needs of shop-by-mail customers throughout the country. Sketched above are some of the steps taken to provide improved service at lower cost.

CHICAGO—Designed throughout with the customer always in mind, the new headquarters building of Aldens will house the administrative offices, the Chicago buying offices of the mail order and retail divisions, the advertising and sales promotion division and the financial, operating and industrial relations divisions. Hours of time-consuming operation have been eliminated as Aldens' engineers and the architects combined their talents to streamline and mechanize the big mail order operation, with extensive use of automation. Operating costs will be cut, because a larger volume of business will be handled by their present personnel.

Features of the new building include relocation of executives to provide easy access and ready supervision of the thousands of employees. Daylight and artificial light are combined to provide constant lighting to reduce fatigue. Acoustical ceilings will reduce distracting indoor sounds, while color dynamics reach their full height in the interior decoration.

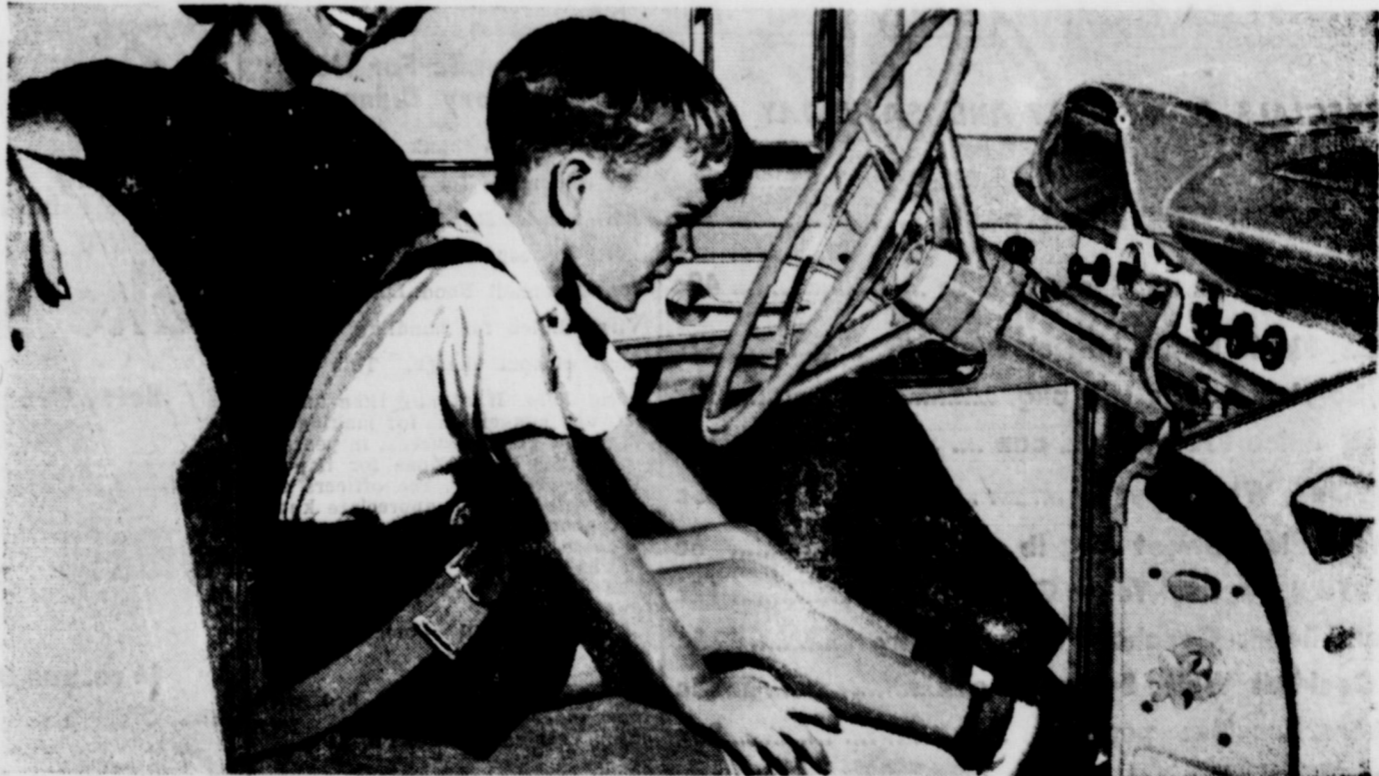
Executive offices include movable partitions providing a flexible arrangement to meet changing needs. All windows are canopied so as to prevent glare and reduce heat in the summer.

VA Quiz

Q -- I am planning to take on-the-job training under the Korean GI Bill. How many hours a week is considered to be full-time training?

A -- Full-time training is considered to be the standard work-week of the firm where you are taking your training, but it generally may not be less than 36 hours a week.

Q -- I applied for Korean GI Bill schooling shortly before my three-year starting deadline. Before I actually could begin class, I became ill. My deadline passed while I still was in bed, unable to go to school. Now that I am well again, will I be allowed to start under the Korean GI Bill?

A -- No. The law requires that you actually must have started your GI training within three years from the date of your separation from service. There are no exceptions to this provision of the law.

Q -- I am a world war II veteran with a service connected disability. I am in need of outpatient medical treatment for my ailment. Can I just go to my own doctor and ask him to send the bill to VA?

A -- No. You must get prior authorization from VA in order to obtain outpatient medical care. Also, you must go to a doctor authorized to provide this treatment at Government expense.
