A. - No. Veterans whose service connected noncompensable dental conditions or disabilities resulted from service injuries may apply at any time and receive as many treat ments as are needed.

Q - I am a Korea veteran going to school part time under the GI Bill. To help me plan my school pro-gram to get in courses I need for graduation credits, please tell me how long a time I have to complete my training.

A --- You have eight years from the date of your discharge to com-plete training under the Korean G I bill. But you may not train beyond Jan. 31, 1965.

Q- Because of financial difficul tits I am finding it hard to make the payments on my World War 2 perm-anent plan GI life insurance. Could I change to some permanent plan

with a lower premium? A — Yes. That is possible. For example, if you are now paying on a 20 year endowment policy you could change to ordinary life.
