Superintendent Bill K. Ford announced Saturday that with the hiring of two teachers and a high school principal, the faculty is now complete for the coming term.

Austin Webb, 32, of Henrietta has been hired as the high school principal. For the past four years he has been teaching in Ohio.

He holds a Bachelor of Arts degree from ACC with majors in history and biology and a Masters degree from North Texas in administration.

He is married and has four children.

Mrs. Blain Odom of Baird will teach language arts in the sixth, seventh and eighth grades during the coming year.

The third addition to the faculty is Fred Alexander, a graduate student at ACC who will be band director.

The schools will open on Sept. 2.


Budget Hearing

4-H'ers Strive For Good Citizenship

Good citizenship is emphasized in all 4-H Club work, while just about every project or activity requires a certain amount of talking and demonstrating before Club members and other groups. Many 4-H'ers also are invited to appear on local radio and TV programs.

To encourage personal development in these two activities, the Cooperative Extension Service directs the 4-H Citizenship and Public Speaking programs. In many states, urban as well as rural boys and girls between the ages of 10 and 21 participate.

Incentive awards are offered in both programs. In citizenship, certificates of honor will go to the best qualified boy and girl in the state who then becomes eligible to try for national \$400 college scholarships.

Club members competing for public speaking awards will qualify for county, state, and national honors. All awards are for one boy and one girl in each classification. County winners receive medals. The top boy in the state will get a handsome 19-jewel wrist watch and the girl a beautiful set of silverware. Both will then be eligible to compete for national awards which are \$400 college scholarships and expense-paid trips to the National 4-H Club Congress in Chicago.

Donor of public speaking awards is the Pure Oil Company. Awards in the citizenship program are given in honor of Thos. E. Wilson, a pioneer in aid to 4-H youth. Both programs are arranged by the National Committee on Boys and Girls Club Work.

S. S. McIntosh, Clyde Barber 48 Years

Congratulations to S. S. McIntosh on the 48th anniversary of his career as a barber in Clyde.

Mr. McIntosh, a native of Collin County, moved to Clyde with his parents in 1902, "took up the trade" of barbering there, and became partner in a shop by the time he was 21. He has been at it ever since, except on the days he takes his foxhounds out for a run, when he turns the business over to his younger helper, Bob Roberts. But Mr. Mac still manages to "cut a lot of hair" in spite of his years.

Like every other service institution the barbershop has undergone a lot of changes in recent decades, but in spite of the occasional incursions of women it is still a man's refuge — one of the last he can call his own, if he doesn't make the claim too loudly. Everything was hand-powered in Mr. McIntosh's shop in the early days, from the clippers to the fan that kept the customers from melting down. This fan consisted of palmleaf fans attached to a board swung from the ceiling and the motive power was a small boy. (In India it was called a punkah).

A town barbershop in those days was a favorite loafing place for the menfolk, some of whom dared to take a hasty peek at the Police Gazette or some other racy literature of the day. Few of the individual shaving mugs which reposed in their special shelves, many lettered in gold, belonged to the loafers, for a shaving mug was a mark of distinction and commercial success, and their owners were too busy to laze around. They showed up only when they needed a 15c shave or a 25c haircut. Well anyway — happy hunting, Mr. Mac!

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DPS Needs 100 Men

"Young men interested in becoming an enforcement officer for the Texas Department of Public Safety have an excellent opportunity if they can qualify," E. Speir today said Major Wilson. The College, which offers two complete years of courses, will begin pre-registration August 4. Official registration will be September 8 and 9 with classes beginning September 12, Mr. Hogue said. Anyone interested in enrolling may do so at the college office any day after August 4.

Dormitories are available for both boys and girls. A new girls dormitory is now under construction, adding rooms for some 50 additional students. The new building also houses class rooms, a student union and a book store. Work is scheduled to be completed early in September.

Cisco Junior College will offer extension classes at Dyess Air Force Base and at Clyde again this year, Mr. Hogue said. Tuition will be \$50 per semester or \$100 for the entire school year.

Mr. Hogue pointed out that Cisco Junior College is fully accredited and work done by its students is accepted by senior colleges and universities. The college offers all courses of the first two years leading to BS and BA degrees as well as pre-med and pre-law. In addition, it has an outstanding music department and offers courses in agriculture.

Texas International Trade Fair at Dallas

The Texas International Trade Fair, an annual exhibition of major proportions in its field, will be inaugurated this fall as an important feature of the 1958 State Fair of Texas, Oct. 4 through 19.

The trade fair concept will be utilized in expanding the exposition's popular International Center of exhibits from foreign nations, which has been a State Fair attraction for the past 3 years.

An estimated 20 nations from all over the world will be represented in the International Trade Fair. The foreign exhibits area will be expanded to occupy two bays of the General Exhibits Building.

"The State Fair of Texas is considered to be one of the four great fairs of the world today," Kenneth W. Erickson, Trade Fair manager, said. "The other three are at Milan, Paris and Toronto."

"In combining the great public fair with the international trade fair concept, we will do what no other annual fair in the world has yet done," Mr. Erickson said.

The Texas International Trade Fair, as a featured attraction of the State Fair, will serve to bring the Texas exposition closer to the European-type fair while retaining all the qualities which make this the nation's largest annual exposition in terms of attendance, Mr. Erickson pointed out.

An exotic feature of the Trade Fair will be an International Bazaar where fairgoers can shop for a vast variety of foreign products and art objects.

Countries that have tentatively indicated interest in exhibiting at the 1958 Texas International Trade Fair include Australia, Belgium, Egypt, France, Germany, Great Britain, Greece, Guatemala, India, Indonesia, Israel, Italy, Japan, Korea, Sweden, Switzerland, Venezuela, and Yugoslavia.

An outstanding continental type restaurant will be operated in conjunction with the foreign exhibits area, Mr. Erickson said.

"It Won't Kill You To Be Careful"

"It won't kill you to be careful," is a familiar phrase to most Texans, yet it has failed to heed its words of wisdom.

This week, however, the pun is being re-emphasized by the Texas Safety Association and farmers entering the late summer stages of their work.

Records of the state indicate that there is still much cultivating to be done. Only in this case it is a matter of cultivating safety and weeding out hazards.

For example, there is the problem of falls, which are often caused by unnecessary cluttered steps, bars, lots, porches, garages, etc. In 1957, falls accounted for 13,600 accidental deaths in homes alone, in the United States. And, on the farm or ranch, falls were responsible for one-in-four fatal accidents — making falls second only to traffic in swelling fatality columns.

Falls aren't the only hazards either. There are garden tools left lying around when not in use, unlabelled poisons, poor wiring, exposed nails and other potential accidents looking for a victim.

Too, be wary of lifting heavy objects. Get help if your moving problem is very heavy or bulky. If you can manage the load yourself, lift correctly by kneeling, being sure to keep your spine straight, get a firm hold and use your legs (not your back) for lifting power.

Exercise special care if there is tree pruning to be done. Keep your head above your work if possible, or wear glasses, to keep falling twigs or bark from damaging sensitive eyes. If you must use a ladder, make certain it is well braced on firm ground.

After handling poisonous mixtures, remember to wash your hands and exposed parts of the body. Above all, keep poisons clearly labeled and stored in an out-of-reach spot, especially if there are small children about.

Dove Season Opens Sept. 1; Deer Nov. 16

Basic hunting regulations in Texas have been set by the Game and Fish Commission for the 1958 fall season. In general they will be very much the same as last season, according to the Executive Secretary of the Game and Fish Commission.

The regulations were approved by the Commission last week from recommendations made by biologists after they had studied conditions throughout the state, particularly in areas where regulatory authority has been granted to the Commission.

The hunting season will begin Sept. 1 for doves in the North zone. The season will extend through Oct. 20. In the South zone the season will be Oct. 1 through Nov. 19, except in the counties of the Rio Grande valley where it will be legal to shoot mourning doves for the two-day open white-winged dove season. Here the season will end Nov. 17 inclusive.

Dove hunters also get another break. The U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service has authorized the possession of 20 mourning doves, after the first day. The daily bag will continue at 10.

The white-winged season begins 2 p.m. daily on Sept. 14 and 18, only, and ends at sunset on each of the two days. The bag limit is 10 per day and 10 in possession.

A Short Story About Your Protection

Out of Africa comes a story about a cattle rancher who was plagued by lions. They raided his corral, broke down his fences and made off with his prize bullocks and heifers.

The rancher got himself the most powerful gun he could buy and kept it loaded at his bedside. But now, for one reason or another, no lions attacked.

After a time, the rancher put his rifle on the shelf. Then he took the cartridges out, and when the rainy season came the bore rusted.

One quiet summer night the lions came prowling again at his farm. He rushed for his gun but couldn't find the bullets, and when he did, the rifle was so rusty it wouldn't fire. The rancher suffered fearful losses.

This story parallels the history of the Salk vaccine. The American public contributed millions to the March of Dimes to find a preventative for polio paralysis. The Salk vaccine, developed on a March of Dimes grant, was the long-sought-for answer.

But now that we have this weapon, we allow it to spoil on warehouse shelves. Three out of seven polio susceptible persons have failed to get their shots. So alarmed are polio authorities like the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis that they warn against new polio epidemics this summer.

Nobody else's vaccination — not even your children's — will protect you. Each person has to get his own. Don't take a chance — take your polio shots.
