Early Crop Seen Here

Cotton is Beautiful

Cotton showers last week netted 30-100ths inches of moisture and was again heavier to the west and east of town.

Cotton is in bloom and fruiting and in many dry land fields the crop is lapping in the middles. Old timers say that the prospects are as good as any since 1937. The crop is expected to be early with the first bale expected in the 3rd week of this month. An early crop means more money as the price usually goes down toward loan price as the harvesting advances. Some dry land should make up to a bale per acre. However not all farmers are so fortunate as dry spots are over the area and a general rain is badly needed to insure maximum production.

Feed is looking as good as the cotton but is in more urgent need of rain as its root system is far more shallow than cotton.

General cotton harvesting is expected by the first week in September.

Health Problem In Travel

Many Texans like to spend their vacation time with a extended trip to far away places. There are several health risks in travel to strange places, but knowledge teamed with common sense can make your trip both safe and pleasant, provided you take the trouble to follow a few simple rules.

Immunization requirements for foreign travel vary from country to country and should be determined in advance so that you have ample time to receive the proper immunizations.

By all means, you should be protected against typhoid, smallpox and polio. Your family doctor, local director of health or the State Department of Health can advise you on these recommendations.

While it is probably safe to drink water in the big tourist hotels and the big cities everywhere, the traveler who gets off the beaten path should, in most areas, be careful!

The only safe water should be filtered and treated in an approved manner and approved by the local health department.

Coffee and tea are not necessarily safe because of boiling, and carbonated or noncarbonated soft drinks from unfamiliar sources should be avoided. And don't forget that ice cubes from polluted water can contaminate any drink.

Unless you are sure that the local milk is absolutely safe, and that the custards, ice cream, etc., are made from safe milk, you had better steer clear of them.

A large number of local people are at Possum Kingdom lake for the dusting of the lake today to rid the lake of undesirable fish. Tons of fish will be harvested.

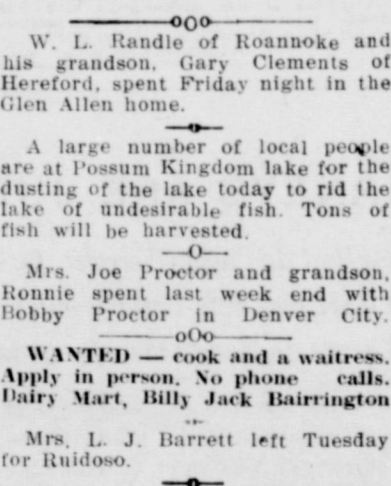

Watch Food Bacteria

Like other living things, bacteria need food, warmth, and moisture to grow in numbers. That's why, in the summer months, certain kinds of bacteria so often team up with heat and lack of refrigeration to spoil food.

That's why food poisoning is so much more common in warm weather—and why you need to be especially careful now about preparing food and storing it.

With proper safeguards of cleanliness and cooling, food poisoning can be avoided. Here are a few suggestions to help you make sure that the food you eat this summer will be safe to eat.

It is well to know which foods are most susceptible to bacterial growth as these are especially dangerous unless they are properly prepared, handled, and stored.

Egg and milk mixtures, including custards and mayonnaise type salad dressings, ham, turkey and chicken, either in salads or sandwiches, and potato salad - one of the popular picnic foods - are often quickly spoiled, when food infections occur in summer.

Ham sandwiches used to be considered safe because of the slow salt laden curing methods employed in the past. But, today, most hams are tenderized and are subject to spoilage without proper refrigeration.

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT THE GENERAL ELECTION ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958.
HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 11
Section 1. Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas, shall be amended by adding thereto a new section to be known as Section 64, to read as follows:
"Section 64. The Legislature shall have authority to provide for a system of retirement and disability pensions for certain retiring Texas Rangers and their widows, stating the maximum of such pension and the amount of such pension for each purpose shall be determined by the Legislature."

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT THE GENERAL ELECTION ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958.
SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 11
Section 1. That Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas be, and the same is hereby amended by adding thereto another section to be designated as Section 6, which shall read as follows:
"Section 6. (a) The Legislature may by law authorize the creation of two hospital districts, one to be coextensive with and have the same boundaries as the incorporated City of Amarillo, and the other to be coextensive with Wichita County.
"(b) If such district or districts are created, they may be authorized to levy a tax not to exceed Seventy-five Cents (75c) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) valuation of taxable property within the district, provided, however, no tax may be levied until approved by a majority vote of the participating resident qualified property taxpayers who have duly rendered their property for taxation. The maximum rate of tax may be changed at subsequent elections so long as obligations are not impaired, and not to exceed the maximum limit of Seventy-five Cents (75c) per One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) valuation, and no election shall be required by subsequent changes in the boundaries of the City of Amarillo.
"(c) If such tax is authorized, no political subdivision or municipality within the district may levy a tax for medical or hospital care for needy individuals, nor shall they maintain or erect hospital buildings or other structures for such purposes."

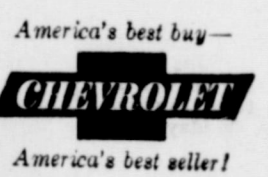

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958.
HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 12
Section 1. That Section 51a of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new subsection to be known as Subsection 51a-1, which shall read as follows:
"Subsection 51a-1. The Legislature shall have the power to provide by general Law and to make payment for same, under such limitations and restrictions as may be deemed by the Legislature expedient for direct or vendor payments for medical care on behalf of needy recipients of Aid to the Permanently and Totally Disabled as provided for in Section 51a of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas. The payments for such medical care on behalf of such recipients shall be in addition to the direct assistance to such recipients, and shall be paid out of State funds."

Q—As the widow of a veteran who died of a service-connected injury, I receive monthly survivor benefit payments from the VA, based on my husband's pay while in service. I understand my payments will increase somewhat, now that the pay for most military ranks has just gone up. When will my increase show up in my check?

A—It may take several months to adjust accounts of all widows entitled to the increase payments, since each case must be examined individually. Any increase will be paid automatically, and will be dated back to the first of June, the day the new military pay scale took over.

LEMON ICEBOX CAKE

- 1 pkg. lemon pudding and pie filling
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 2 cups water
- 1 egg
- 2 1/2 cup PET Evaporated Milk
- 7-oz. angel cake (6 cups)

Mix well in a 2-qt. saucepan the pudding and pie filling, sugar, 1/2 cup water and the egg. Stir in gradually the remaining 1 1/2 cups water. Cook and stir until mixture comes to a full, over-all boil and is thick, about 5 minutes. Take from heat. Cover and cool. Chill milk in ice tray until almost frozen around the edges. With fingers, tear angel cake into inch pieces. Put the ice-cold milk in a cold quart bowl. Whip with cold rotary beater or electric beater at high speed, until stiff. Then fold into cooled pudding. Fold cake into pudding mixture. Put into 8-inch square pan. Chill until firm, about 3 hours. Cut into squares to serve.
