Cage-egg Production Is Planned For Area

this week that The Plains Egg Produc-ers of Littlefield would be interest buying cage-laid eggs produced in this area. This is good news to the cage-egg farmer as it will assure him a definite market with a top market price. In a meeting here last week with L. G. Clark, the local Paymaster Feeds dealer, sev eral poultry men including Bob Mayfield of Bryan, C. V. Hatch of Lubbock, and Claud Ash of Abilene plans were laid for getting a cage layer project started here. Currently

ing eggs for commercial use is not a new thing. It has been in operat-ion in California for 25 years as well as Georgia. It started in Texas on a commercial basis 5 years ago. The expansion of the egg business in West Texas prompted the form-ation of the Plains Egg Producers Inc. at Littlefield.

The egg producing business is NOT an easy business — no more than farm row crops is easy. It is NOT a get rich plan nor is any other farming operation. But it IS a business and should be handled as a business if a person is to b successful,

A few facts of the industry -

Two sq. ft. per hen is required if the cage houses are either 24 or 32 feet wide. A 24 ft. wide house will take 3 double rows of cages and a 32 foot wide house will take double rows of cages. These figur-es are based on 2 hens per 12 inch cage, Housing cost varies from 65c to 75c per sq. ft. The approximate cost of producing a pullet to lay-ing age varies from \$1.65 to \$2.20

A caged hen eats about 1-4th lb. of feed per day. A producer should maintain a production average of 70 percent.

Replacement of hens depends on management but runs about 5 per cent per month. Replacements are started every two months.

It is recommended that the pro-ducer has not less than 1,000 1.000 hens. F. H. A. financing is available for construction of the house much on the order of the current broiler project. The local bank will finance the equipment of the house and the feed companies will finance

the cost of the hens and the feed. It is to be stressed that all the above depends in part on the financial statement of the person enter-ing the project. If the drouth continues and causes a skipped crop, emergency money is expected to be available to finance the project as well as cattle, hog, etc. projects to keep the farmer on the farm re-gardless of length of drouth. At any time Mr. Clark or any other feed man will be glad to figure with you.
