

Mrs. Noble Enters Representative Race

Mrs. Margaret Garland Noble of Lynn County this week formally announced her candidacy for State representative of the 99th Legislative District comprising the counties of Andrews, Dawson, Gaines and Lynn.

Mrs. Noble was born in Lamesa, 44 years of age, and lived in Lamesa until 1933 when she moved to O'Donnell where she has resided since. She is the daughter of Mrs. J. E. Garland and the late Judge J. E. Garland, who was late Judge of Lynn County and a pioneer of government and history, student of J. M. Noble, for 17 years postmaster at O'Donnell and who is now a rural route carrier.

Mrs. Noble attended high school in Lamesa, attended college at West Texas S. T. C. and Texas Tech. She was a teacher for several years in the O'Donnell High School and is currently a substitute teacher in the school. She has been a member of the Methodist Church since childhood and is a former president of the O'Donnell P. T. A. Until her entrance into the teaching profession, Mrs. Noble was an active member of the O'Donnell Study Club and also for many years has been an official election judge in the O'Donnell area.

Lynn Does Good Retail Business

Receipts of 55 service establishments enumerated in Lynn County in the 1954 Census of Business amounted to about \$464,000, according to a preliminary report covering service trades, published by the Bureau of the Census, U. S. Department of Commerce. The combined yearly payroll of the county's service establishments was \$76,000. They reported 46 employees of whom 43 worked fulltime in the pay period ending nearest November 15. Proprietors actively employed in the operation of unincorporated business numbered 52. Establishments providing personal services numbered 20 and reported receipts of \$150,000. Establishments primarily engaged in automotive repair, parking and other automotive services numbered 9 and had receipts of \$50,000. Establishments listed as "all other services" in the preliminary report numbered 26 and had receipts of \$264,000.

Cage-egg Production Is Planned For Area

FOUR FARMERS ALREADY HAVE THE PROJECT

Announcement was made this week that The Plains Egg Producers of Littlefield would be interested in buying cage-laid eggs produced in this area. This is good news to the cage-egg farmer as it will assure him a definite market with a top market price. In a meeting here last week with L. G. Clark, the local Paymaster Feeds dealer, several poultry men including Bob Mayfield of Bryan, C. V. Hatch of Lubbock, and Claude Ash of Abilene plans were laid for getting a cage layer project started here. Currently there are four cage layer houses in production in the area now. The owners are Glenn Clark, Bill Snellgrove, Ralph Gary and Bertice Askew. J. C. Swinney is also a producer.

The cage layer system of producing eggs for commercial use is not a new thing. It has been in operation in California for 25 years as well as Georgia. It started in Texas on a commercial basis 5 years ago. The expansion of the egg business in West Texas prompted the formation of The Plains Egg Producers Inc. at Littlefield.

The egg producing business is NOT an easy business — no more than farm row crops is easy. It is NOT a get rich plan nor is any other farming operation. But it IS a business and should be handled as a business if a person is to be successful.

A few facts of the industry — Two sq. ft. per hen is required if the cage houses are either 24 or 32 feet wide. A 24 ft. wide house will take 3 double rows of cages and a 32 foot wide house will take 4 double rows of cages. These figures are based on 2 hens per 12 inch cage. Housing cost varies from 65c to 75c per sq. ft. The approximate cost of producing a pullet to laying age varies from \$1.65 to \$2.20. A caged hen eats about 1-4th lb. of feed per day. A producer should maintain a production average of 70 percent.

Replacement of hens depends on management but runs about 5 percent per month. Replacements are started every two months.

It is recommended that the producer has not less than 1,000 hens. F. H. A. financing is available for construction of the house much on the order of the current broiler project. The local bank will finance the equipment of the house and the feed companies will finance the cost of the hens and the feed.

It is to be stressed that all the above depends in part on the financial statement of the person entering the project. If the drought continues and causes a skipped crop, emergency money is expected to be available to finance the project as well as cattle, hog, etc. projects to keep the farmer on the farm regardless of length of drought.

At any time Mr. Clark or any other feed man will be glad to figure with you.

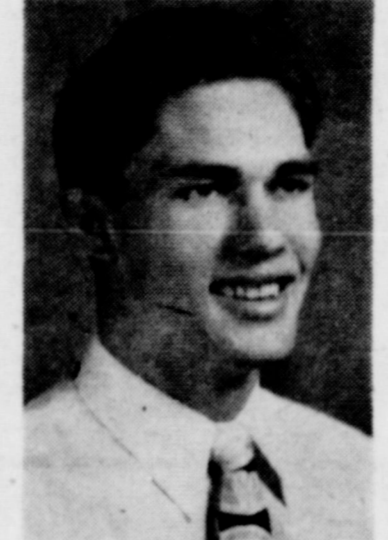
NEXT WEDNESDAY IS BUSINESS HOLIDAY

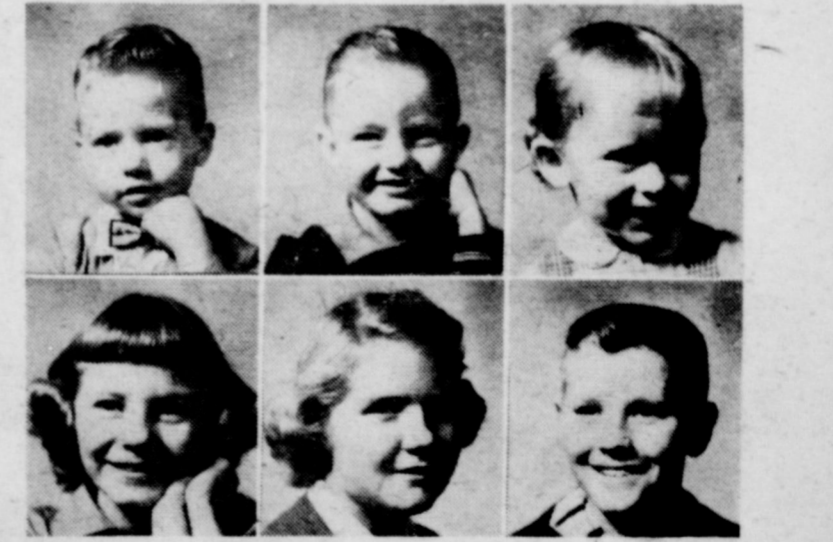
Methodist Bible School Is Next Week
