Turkey Meeting On 15th

Much Interest Honor Roll

At a meeting Thursday night at the school auditorium farmers will hear information on commercial raising of turkeys and caged hens. Several poultry men will be present to explain the crop and to answer questions.

On the Thanksgiving market, turkey producers made a profit of \$1.80 per bird on the average according to Glenn Clark. In 1954 the estimated profit per bird is \$1.00. As is true of all modern farming, money is made only by a volume of production and broiler farming is a good example of the economic law of increasing returns. A big advance of turkey farming is the fact that the feed firms hatch and brood the poults and the farmer keeps the bird for only 4 months and there is little capital expense other than fencing and shelter. One word of warning: Mr. Turkey is like a woman — you never know what he will do — and he can do many crazy things.

Texans lose 170 million dollars every year on account of rats. They destroy and waste large quantities of food and are responsible for the spread of certain diseases to humans. "There is just one thing to do about rats," declares Dr. Henry Hoile, Commissioner of Health, "and that is get rid of them."

Rats have been found to spread infectious (jaundice), rabies, typhus fever, rat bite fever, dysentery and other diseases. More eggs chickens and small game are destroyed by rats than by all other animals. Sometimes they start destructive fires by naxing wires and short circuiting them.

Exterminating rats is an endless process, if your building is not soundly protected against additional invasions. New buildings should be made rat-proof, and old ones can be made so at reasonable expense. Building rats out is a whole lot cheaper than having them around. Solid concrete or heavy metal are about the only materials that keep rats from entering a building, and unless foundations extend about two feet under ground, rats can burrow underneath. You certainly cannot trust to luck -- the rat is too clever and aggressive for that.

Red Squill is one of the poisons commonly used to kill rats, but this poison is not only death on rats, it is deadly for humans too. Warfarin is a comparatively new poison designed for killing rats -- but it, too, is equally dangerous to humans. Both these poisons must be handled very carefully, and put out where neither children nor pets can get near them. Any kind of such poison must be stored in very safe places too.

If rats were starved out, by rat-proof construction, and with complete sanitation in our communities -- around our homes and places of business, and all wastes and trash were properly disposed of in sanitary land-fills -- we would make an enormous economic saving and eliminate a real threat to health.

Q. Is social security protection extended to clergymen by the 1954 Amendments to the law?
A. Clergymen and Christian Science practitioners may now provide for their own retirement by voluntarily coming under the Federal social security program. Recent amendments to the Social Security Law permits ministers and members of religious orders who have not taken vows of poverty and Christian Science practitioners to get social security protection for themselves and their families. The choice of coverage is on an individual basis and does not apply to earnings before 1955. Coverage will be extended only to those individuals who file an affidavit expressing their desire to come under social security. Each minister who elects coverage is considered self-employed, and if his net earnings from the practice of his ministry is \$400 a year, he must pay the social security tax.

No. 1 Killer

Heart disease is the number one killer in Texas and last year there were 20,191 deaths from diseases of the heart, said Dr. Henry A. Holle, Commissioner of Health.

What kind of heart have you? The periodic checkup with your physician will tell you. The Tuberculosis Survey in the state conducted by the Texas State Department of Health has brought to light many non-tuberculosis abnormalities, some of these have been heart conditions.

Three frequent types of heart trouble are: coronary heart disease, hypertensive heart disease, and rheumatic heart disease.

Coronary heart disease is the chief killer and is a disease of the arteries which supply the heart muscle itself with blood. A majority of persons survive the first attack, and with good medical care, rest and common sense precautions, may even live a normal life span.

Another major cause of heart trouble is high blood pressure or hypertension. This is the most common heart disease of middle age. There is a great deal that is not known about this disease, but we do know that it is most common in people who are overweight, and that it is associated with long, continuous nervous strain, high tension and constant worry. Medical treatment of high blood pressure is fairly successful in many cases.

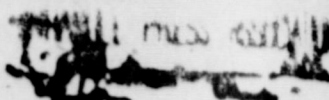
Rheumatic heart disease, the most common type of early life, occurs as the result of one or more attacks by the streptococcus germ. It is a public health problem for which much can be done in light of recent knowledge. Prophylactic use of penicillin when streptococcal infections are present will prevent heart involvement. Syphilitic heart disease can be prevented by early and adequate care of the patient with syphilis. This problem has been simplified by the use of penicillin.

Research in the medical sciences is constantly improving the outlook for the cardiac patient, yet each individual must assume the responsibility for obtaining the benefits of this knowledge from his physician for himself and family.

VA Quiz

Q -- I am planning to take on-the-job training under the Korean GI Bill. How many hours a week is considered to be full-time training?

A -- Full-time training is considered to be the standard work-week of the firm where you are taking your training, but it generally may not be less than 25 hours a week.

Q -- I applied for Korean GI Bill schooling shortly before my three-year starting deadline. Before I actually could begin class, I became ill. My deadline passed while I still was in bed, unable to go to school. Now that I am well again, will I be allowed to start under the Korean GI Bill?

A -- No. The law requires that you actually must have started your GI training within three years from the date of your separation from service. There are no exceptions to this provision of the law.

Q -- I am a world war II veteran with a service connected disability. I am in need of outpatient medical treatment for my ailment. Can I just go to my own doctor and ask him to send the bill to VA?

A -- No. You must get prior authorization from VA in order to obtain outpatient medical care. Also, you must go to a doctor authorized to provide this treatment at Government expense.
