WASHINGTON, D. C .- Women At War Week, opening Nov. 22, during which women will seek to sell the greatest single week's volume of War Bonds and Stamps will serve to put the spotlight on the mighty contribution women generally are making toward financing the war. Six million women are on War Savings payroll plans. Their monthly deduc-

tions total \$70,000.000. The customers of 300,000 newspaper

boys who have sold more than \$50,000,-000 in War Bonds and Stamps are mostly women.

Volunteer saleswomen run nearly all the Bond booths in theatres from Maine to California. They also are sparking the War Bond sales in retail stores.

Ralph G. Engelsman, Associate Field Director of the payroll savings section of the War Savings Staff, readily adnits that without the support of women he phenomenal record of payroll savings enrollments would not have been chieved Payroll savings plans are now in operation in 148,000 businesses and factories. Employees of twentyive thousand of these firms are converting at least 10 percent of gross payolls into War Bonds every payday.

Associate Field Director Engelsman says that women have contributed directly and indirectly toward this record. When a man devoted 10 or more percent of his pay envelope to War Bonds, the woman at home has had a powerful voice in the decision. Here's a recipe forcranberry sauce: 1 quart (1 lb.) cranberries. 11/2 cups water.

2 cups sugar (or 1 cup sugar and cup corn syrup or mild honey.)

Pick over the berries and discard all that are withered or pecked Bring the sugar and water to boil add berries, and cook quickly for bout 10 minutes, or until the skins reak. Chill before serving.



Cold sliced turkey is a "natural" for the day after Thanksgiving. Perhaps you'll use some for turkey sandwiches, if you're packing lunches for war workers. But the day comes when there just isn't much that can be cleaned from those bones. Not a very inspiring sight. However, there are the makings of a grand soup in those bones and bits of skin and meat. So into the soup kettle goes the carcass. And bere's the recipe **HARRIS** Remove meat and scraps from the carcass and set aside. Crack the bones and place in the soup kettle. Add the skin, several stalks of celery, a carrot, an onion, 6 peppercorns, the tip of a bay leaf, 4 cloves and cold water to cover.

For each quart of stock, melt 2 tbsp. butter in a skillet and add

2 tbsp. flour. Cook, stirring constantly to blend and brown slightly—

To Serve With Turkey Soup

Turkey soup is rich and filling. It's a meal in itself. Sliced and toasted rolls left from Thanksgiving dinner are good with turkey soup. Or just some crisp crackers, or crusty bread such as Vienna bread. For dessert you might reheat some of your Thanksgiving pudding. Or, if your Thanksgiving pudding was pie, try this delicious Steamed Chocolate Pudding with Creamy Sauce, or Whipped Cream.

Simmer gently for about 2 hours. Cool slightly, strain and add the diced meat scraps to the soup. Chill thoroughly, if the turkey is a fat one, so that the fat may be removed as a hardened layer from the top.

For Each Quart of Stock

STEAMED CHOCOLATE PUDDING 3 thsp. shortening 2¼ cups sifted all purpose flour 1½ tsp. baking powder

½ tsp. salt 1 cup milk

2½ sq. unsweetened chocolate (2½ oz.), melted

Creamy Sauce

Creamy shortening, add sugar gradually, and cream thoroughly. Blend in well beaten egg. Sift flour, baking powder and salt together and add to creamed mixture alternately with the milk. Blend in melted chocolate. Fill well greased pudding molds 3/2 full (using two 1 lb. molds or cans or 1 tube-center pudding mold 8 inches in diameter). Cover with waxed paper, tying it loosely in place with a string. Place in steamer over water already boiling. The steam must surround the mold. Cover steamer tightly, and steam 2 hours without lifting cover. (Have enough water in lower kettle to last through steaming, as lifting lid before pudding is cooked will make it fall.) Remove from steamer, remove waxed paper, and let stand a minute before turning pudding out on hot serving platter. Serve immediately with Creamy Sauce. NOTE: This pudding may be reheated very successfully by re-steaming.

Creamy Sauce

1½ cups sifted confectioners' sugar. Mix well. Blend in 1 cup whipping cream (½ pt.), which has been beaten stiff. Add 1 tsp. vanilla.
