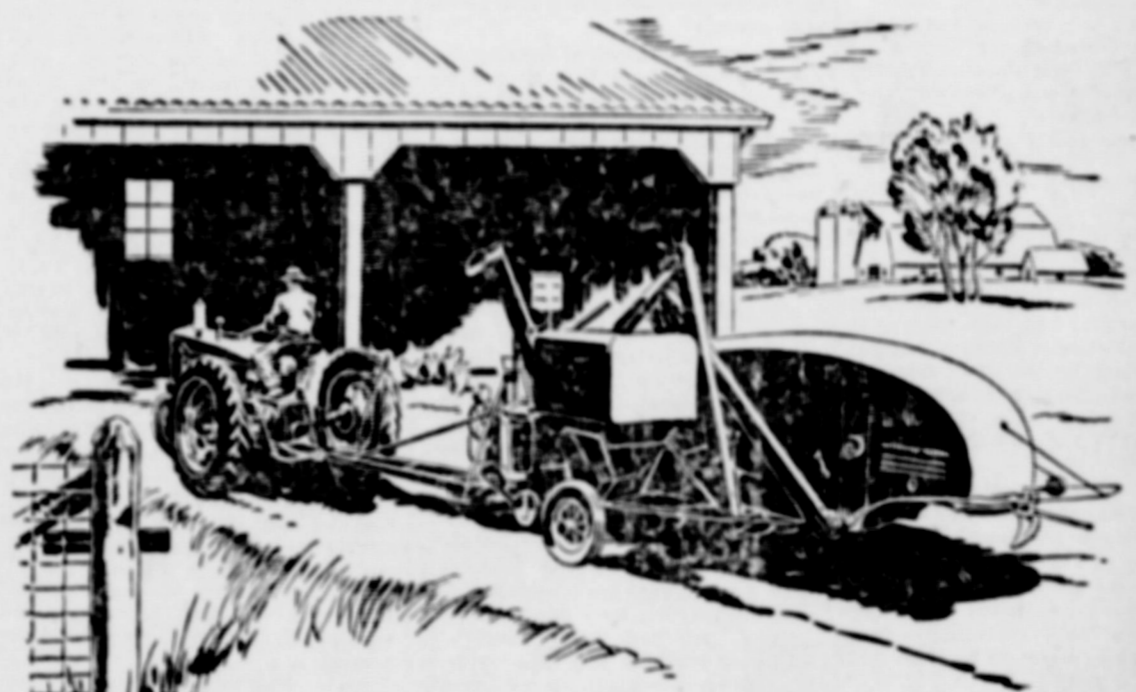

Austin -- Sleep is a necessity of life and health, according to Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, and habitual loss of sleep will tend to retard the body's recovery from the fatigue of the day's activities.  
 "We may go without sleep for a night or two but too little sleep for a prolonged length of time will undermine the health of a rugged person and turn a cheerful individual into a cross irritable one. When good health can be protected to such a large extent merely by sleeping, and thus allowing overtaxed bodies and minds to secure the proper rest it is hard to understand why so many persons are heedless of this important measure.  
 Some individuals require more sleep than others. How well we sleep is as important as how long we sleep. A good night's rest means a sufficient number of hours spent in sleep to enable each individual to feel well, do efficient work, and to keep in a cheerful humor the next day.  
 Some outdoor exercise each day, a comfortable bed, and fresh air in our sleeping quarters, Dr. Cox said, will help us to sleep soundly at night. Do not mull over your problems and ideas after you have gone to bed. Make your plans early in the evening for a good night's rest by slowing down from the physical and mental work of your daily life. When you arise each morning, rested and with a feeling of general well-being, you will be amply repaid for your thought in planning a good night's sleep.
