Monday afternoon friends and neighbors from this community and thruout West Texas paid a tribute of love and friendship to Ben Moore, sr., whose life in this town and trade area spanned 46 years from the sod dug-out of the first settlers to the modern day of atomic energy, T. V. and the other hundreds of modern "miracles" that filled Ben with wonder at the rapid progress of man.

The characteristic that set Ben apart from all others we have known was his very keen enjoyment of living. He never let the little mechanics of living cloud the real joy of just being alive. We hope to never forget this great lesson he taught us. He got joy from a beautiful sunset, the joy of fresh air on a summer's nite after thunderstorm, the beauty of the the supreme joy of fast walk on a beautiful day, the pleasure of conversation near a

lost art today. So much like Ben Franklin, our Ben drank deep of many occupations and hobbies in the 69 years he enjoyed.

Among many others he was a farmer, the town's first postmaster, ran a very good O'Donnell news paper for several years in the 30's. He once told us of being an early day photographer in Tahoka. He operated a printing office here until about 10 years ago. nuch of his residence here he was in the real estate and insurance business but this business did not keep him from selling fruit trees, pecan trees and other nursery to make his Plains We may be mistaken, beautiful. but we believed he once told us of owning a grocery store here. scores of years he was the local weather recorder. A Wide Range Of Interests

Mr. Moore was a keen observor of animal and plant life as well as the heavens. He once told us that three stratas of clouds traveling in different directions at different elevations was a very good sign of rain. And we have found it true. He was a recognized authority on prehistoric Indians of the Plains and his collection numbers many artifacts.

His greatest interest was that of writing informal historial sketches in which he was excellent. He has contributed many scores of articles to area newspapers, magazines and historial publications. His stories reminded us of the O. Henry style as he often used the "punch" end-ing. For many years he coverd the news stories of this area for daily newspapers and was a very good reporter.

In teaching Masonic work, there were none who could surpass him and he held many high lodge offic-

He was a past master of the cal lodge and a past deputy grand master. Along with others he organ ize the local lodge as well as the O'

For 27 years he was a trustee and a member of the Board of the local Methodist church living a fine throughout the years alloted him.

But the thing that meant most to us was Ben as a fellow man and friend. Always strikingly istinguished, his keen mind was marvel to us. His personality vas like quick-silver and if a hundred of his friends could draw. each would give a different picture. We know not that which lies beyond a mist to our mortal eyes, but we like to think that our Ben at the delightful task of discovng, exploring, marveling at beauty, tasting to the fullest that

A member of the Texas Tech. Museum Society, Mr. Moore was a well known South Plains writer and naturalist and a frequent con-tributor of feature articles to mag azines and newspapers. He was con s dered an authority on West Texas Indian lore and culture.

Eight years ago Mr. Moore wrote a book entitled, "Seven Years With the Indians," a story dealing with a missionary who lived among the Comanche Indians.

Lifeboat Race Began With Sea Battles of Old

NEW YORK-Had they lived centuries ago, seamen who rowed n the International lifeboat race held this year on the Hudson river might have been pulling an oar for their lives in a battle at sea instead of racing against friendly competitors for glory and exer-

While thousands watched from the Manhattan shore, a Norwegian ew beat an American boat by three lengths over a mile course from Grant's tomb to the soldiers and sailors monument at Riverside drive and 89th street. Great Britain, the Netherlands, and Israel trailed in that order.

Roman triremes, the galleys of the Barbary corsairs, the long ships of the Vikings-all were powered in battle maneuvers by oars. Rowers often were convicted criminals or war captives, galley slaves chained to their benches.

Sailing Days When larger ships were built and sails replaced manpower, seamen

still rowed. Oars moved the small boats that shuttled between anchorage and shallow beach and towed great square riggers in and out of congested harbors, Old records of naval battle con-

tain references to instances where rowing boats were launched from warships to tow them to safety or into better position for attack. Oars and brawn took George Washington across the Delaware to surprise the Hessians, helped Sag Harbor whalers to run down their quarry and still help Grand Banks dorymen get about in search of

With rowing a universal skill in the days of sail, it was natural that competition should develop wherever shipping gathered. Writers of the sea speak of gig and whaleboat races between windjammers' men of many nations in such farflung ports as Hong Kong, Le Havre, and Valparaiso. There is a record of a rowing race on the Hudson in 1824 between New York ferrymen and a boat's crew from the British frigate Hussar.

This sort of racing, sometimes intentionally international in character but more often a matter of rivalry between individual ships or shipping lines, never became formalized.

Builds Own Home;

Beats Housing Shortage BERLIN, N.H.-One way to beat the housing shortage-if you have the time and talent, backbone and brawn-is to go out in the woods and start building your own house with your own hands

That's what Bob Hughes, Berlin artist and high school art instructor, decided to do about two years ago, and if all goes well, he hopes to move in with his wife and two children before long

The 36-year-old jack-of-all-trades has been building the new house almost single-handed during summers, weekends, and any spare time he can find.

The front door will have 15 panels of thick pine, recessed and carved by the gifted young artistteacher-marionette maker into the 12 signs of the zodiac, with three panels for another design. The front hall will be paneled in pine. some a foot and a half wide. The stairs are huge solid oak blocks.

Bob Hughes is his own archi tect, designing the house himself and working from his own set of blue-prints. It is a combination of modern and traditional. The living room has a large picture window, composed of twelve panes which saves the expense of a single sheet of plate glass, and has the advantage of individuality.

The kitchen will be done in white ash, and has a laundry shoot down into the basement.

Looking tanned and rugged. with a crew cut, dungarees and G.I. shoes, Bob didn't think was doing anything particularl remarkable in building his ow house. Although he was aboard the first landing craft to hit the coast of Normandie on D-Day, he knows he is not the first amateur to build a home for his family i this area. 

Who Files Returns?

Nearly every citizen or resident of the U.S.A. who had an income during 1955 should file a tax, according to John R. Robinson of the Internal Revenue Service office at Lubbock, Texas.

He explained that if you are less than 65 years of age and had a gross income of \$600 or more, you must file a tax return. Those 65 and over, however, must fil a return when their gross income is \$1200 or more.

"Self-employed individuals with net earnings of \$400 or more must also file an annual return," Mr. Robinson said.

"A person with income of less than \$600- or \$1200 for those 65 -or over should file a return to get a refund of the tax that was withheld each payday." he said. Every taxpayer should read the 1955 tax instruction pamphlet so he will not pay more or less tax than he owes," he urged.
