## Wylie Funeral Home Opens

Congratulations and best wishes of this community are extended to Mr. and Mrs. W. O. Wylie upon the occasion of the formal opening of the new Wylie Funeral Home on Saturday and Sunday. Merchants and friends of the Wylies are making public their congratulations in this issue of The Baird Star and large crowds are expected to attend the Open House affair. The beautiful new structure is Spanish Mission architecture. Its walls are of white stucco and the roof is of red tile. A spacious front porch with heavy oak beams decorates the entrance. The interior is designed for efficiency of carrying on two or more funerals at the same time. It consists of a reception room, a burial insurance office, two reposing rooms, a private office, show room, preparation room, private family room for funerals, bedroom, rest room, a coffee room, and an air conditioned chapel with seating capacity of two hundred. The preparation room is one of the finest in Texas, with two preparation tables, and a hospital operating light. The entire building is air conditioned. Architects for the structure was Leo Tucker of Collier, Linberg and Tucker, architects, of Abilene.

In 1947 two new ambulances were added and new cemetery equipment was purchased recently. Wylie Funeral Home affords twenty-four hour ambulance service, which includes emergency service.

In November 1942, the Wylie Burial Association was organized and the policies, beside being serviced by the Wylie Funeral Home at Baird and Putnam, are also serviced by the Castleberry Funeral Home at Albany, the Taylor Funeral Home at Moran, and Fairman-Wilkins Funeral Home at Goldthwaite. After many requests for additional burial insurance, Wylie Life Insurance Company was organized in November 1947, and it has experienced continued growth. It is serviced by the above named firms as well as Johnson Funeral Home at San Angelo. To date more than 5,000 people are insured, which reflects its rapid growth.

Mr. and Mrs. Wylie are both licensed embalmers and funeral directors. Mr. Wylie received his embalmers and funeral directors license in 1931 and became associated with his father in the business. Mrs. Wylie assisted in the business as lady assistant. She received her license in 1935. W. O. Wylie, Sr., purchased the funeral home from the late Mayor and Mrs. H. Schwartz. At his father's death in 1942, W. O. Jr., and his wife purchased his interest in the business.

### THREE RURAL SCHOOLS TO VOTE ON MERGER

Three school communities of Callahan County will vote May 22 on consolidation to create an accredited high school, it was announced by B. C. Chrisman, county superintendent. The communities are Denton, Oplin and Bayou.

The proposed consolidated district would contain approximately 30 scholastics and have an assessed valuation of \$1,250,000 and cover 250 square miles — approximately one fourth of the county, mostly in the southwest section.

A majority vote in each box will be necessary to insure the consolidation.

Judge Lester Farmer set the election after twenty qualified voters in each district presented the petition. The Bayou school officials met Monday with the county board which comprises Chairman Norrell Long, Cross Plains; Jess Tarrant, Pet. 1, Clyde; Clint McIntyre, Pet. 2, Oplin; Fred Cook, Pet. 3, Putnam; V. C. Walker, Pet. 4, Cross Plains.

Alton Hornsby, spokesman for the Bayou school patrons, declared it would be a pity to abandon a new \$25,000 school building to bats. Bayou is at the intersection of Highway 36 and U. S. 183, in central part of the county. Bayou teachers, with J. B. Gamble is principal, Denton, six teachers headed by E. E. Durham; Oplin, four teachers, headed by Lewis Johnson.

Denton finished a rock school in 1939 with valuation of \$25,000. Oplin in 1938 completed a PWA project, which represents a value of \$75,000.

In order to create an accredited high school in the proposed district, 40 students will be necessary.

The matter of situating the central school would be up to the new board of trustees. Likely, it was indicated, Denton would be the beneficiary, since it is most centrally located and accessible.

Bayou school patrons made it clear they want to retain their school. "When we move the school we destroy our community center, and sooner or later our churches, too, will go," one protestant said.

## Baird Rodeo A Real Thriller

From the standpoint of thrills, Baird's first annual rodeo held last Friday and Saturday nights provided them galore. Friday night's performance began its breath-taking excitement when Alec, the negro clown, was gored by a Brahma bull. Riders of Bob Estes' famous rodeo stock were given a ride for their money from start to finish. Champion, a horse that has never been ridden, marked up another score for himself when he threw an ace-high cowboy, Bill Barton of Abilene, Saturday night.

The Sheriff's Posse, headed by ex-sheriff Everett Hughes, saw their dreams come true when thousands of people filled the bleachers to witness an outstanding professional rodeo in Baird. Many local people were surprised to actually see what could be done here. The rodeo is the talk of the country and when the show is put on next year, the crowds will return bringing more crowds with them.

The history of big time rodeos is that it takes several seasons to put them over in a financial way, but Baird has made one of the best starts any town ever made. Baird is fortunate in having a native son, Bob Estes, to produce the show for he has exerted every effort to make his home town rodeo the best he ever had, and he even says it will be better next year. Some of us are wondering how it could possibly be better than these first two big nights. The local town people became enthusiastic over the bid rodeo and helped to spread that enthusiasm over all this area. Baird was one of the most decorated towns in the country for the rodeo and tours were made to some 23 neighboring towns a week before the rodeo. This is one time when there was some real team-work and cooperation here.

The U. S. Army assisted with its sound truck and Parsons Electric Shop also rendered a service with its public address system. Mayor B. H. Freeland was the announcer for the tours and at the big parade each day. This parade was colorful all the way through. Mrs. Bob Estes and Miss Curley Seale carried the colors to lead the procession each day.

The fast mounted Quadrille, led by Mrs. Bob Estes, was a number one feature of the show that provided the spectators with some fine entertainment.

Among the renowned contestants was Carl Olsen, of Calgary, Canada, who is today world champion saddle bronc rider. One of the broncs he picked in this rodeo was Star Bright, a mean horse that he had also ridden in the northwest.

Winners of first prizes in the various events were: Bareback bronc riding, Wart Baughman, L. E. Weeks; Calf roping, Burl Hitson; Saddle bronc riding, Bill Ward, Frank Duce; Steer wrestling, Bill McGuire; Barrel race, Martha Joe Dodson; Brahma bull riding, Bill Barton, Tye Brown. Prizes were given for the first four places in each event.

CAN WITH THE PRESSURE SAUCEPAN

If the pressure saucepan meets certain requirements, and if correct processing times, which have been scientifically tested, are used, then the pressure saucepan can become a valuable addition to your canning equipment, especially for small jobs of home canning. That's the latest word from Louise Mason, extension food preparation specialist of Texas A. & M. College.

The question of using the pressure saucepan for canning has been brought up by many home-

makers and two specialists of the USDA's Bureau of Human Nutrition and Home Economics in Washington have been working on the answer. Their report has been published recently.

Be sure that the saucepan is tall enough to hold pint jars on a rack with the cover locked in place, and that there is a gauge which allows pressure to be controlled accurately at 10 pounds, Miss Mason says.

The experimental canning report shows that the processing time in the saucepan at 10 lbs. pressure must be 20 minutes longer than the time recommended for a pressure canner; less time will not sterilize the vegetables safely. The pressure saucepan heats quickly, takes only a minute to exhaust its air content, and cools rapidly after the jars of food are processed. As a result, the heat necessary for the safe sterilization of the food must be obtained during the processing time. A pressure canner requires a longer time to heat, exhausts and cools slowly and consequently, the necessary heat for sterilization is provided even though the processing time is shorter.

When canning with a pressure saucepan, use the following processing times for pints at 10 lbs. pressure: asparagus, 45 minutes; lima beans, 55 minutes; snap beans, 40 minutes; beets, 45 minutes; carrots, 40 minutes; cream-style corn, 105 minutes; whole kernel corn, 75 minutes; okra, 45 minutes; peas, 60 minutes; cubed pumpkin, 75 minutes; strained pumpkin, 80 minutes; spinach, 65 minutes; summer squash, 50 min-

utes; dry-pack sweet potatoes, 85 minutes; wet pack sweet potatoes, 75 minutes.

Miss Mason emphasizes that these process times are for use when the canning directions issued by the Texas Extension Service are followed throughout. These times might not be adequate for food preserved by other directions.

Home canning instructions are given in the Extension Service circular C-223, "Can Vegetables in a Pressure Canner." Copies may be obtained from local county home demonstration agents or by writing to the Extension Service, Texas A. & M. College, College Station.

#### HUMBLE TO CONTINUE GAS CONSERVATION

Houston — Plans for continuing its long-range gas conservation program at a cost of \$11-837,000 during 1948 were announced in Houston by Humble Oil & Refining Company.

New units to be constructed by Humble this year are natural gasoline plants at Conroe, Pickton, and Ouelousas, La.; and gas injection plants at Seelingson and Kelsey. The Seelingson plant will ultimately be developed into a gasoline plant.

The new plants will process an additional 186 million cubic feet of gas daily, the company estimates. Humble spent approximately \$5,000,000 on gas conservation facilities in 1947, increasing the amount of gas conserved by about 80 million cubic feet daily to a total of 620 million cubic feet per day.

The absorption-type gasoline plant to be built at Olepousas, costing \$2,800,000, will process the wet gas passing through the Interstate Gas Company's line, returning the dehydrated gas to the line.

At Conroe, a new Humble gasoline plant designed for high propane recovery will replace the existing facilities. Part of the plant residue will supply the artificial life requirements in the Conroe field and part will go into the Tomball Natural Gas System which will be extended at a cost of \$300,000. Initial investment will be \$4,160,000, but future developments will bring the cost to about \$5,735,000.

Expenditures on the Seelingson injection plant during this year will be about \$1,336,000, but when developed into a gasoline plant some time in the future will total about \$9,545,000. This plant will return to producing formations Humble's casinghead gas that is now being flared in Borregas, Seelingson, and Tijerina-Canales fields.

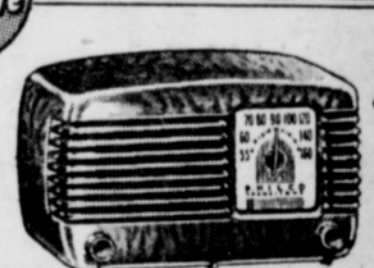

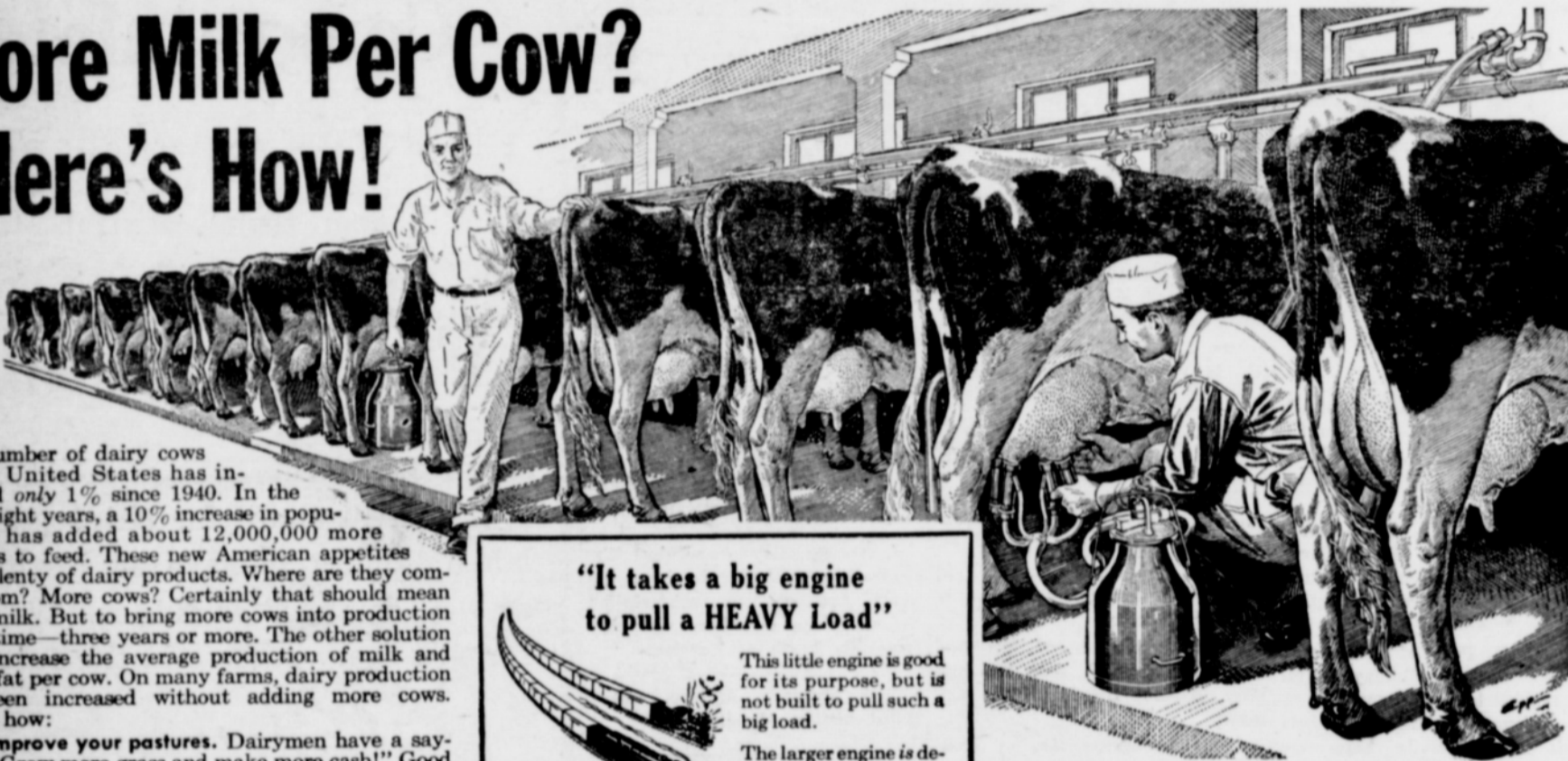

The number of dairy cows in the United States has increased only 1% since 1940. In the same eight years, a 10% increase in population has added about 12,000,000 more mouths to feed. **Standardbred vs. Crossbred Chickens**

by R. George Jaop

The relative merits of standardbred vs. crossbred chickens may be summed up in three words—not much difference. But this difference is more often in favor of the well-chosen crossbred.

The advantages of a good crossbred are: faster growth and more eggs. However, many a slip can occur in crossbreeding chickens which will make them inferior, market-wise, to standardbreds.

For example, to produce a suitable crossbred, both standardbred parental breeds must be of top quality. If one has a mediocre egg production, it is almost a certainty the resulting crossbred will be a poorer producer than the high-producing standardbred side of the family.

The fact that crossbreds usually are darker-colored may be a market disadvantage. Many markets pay a premium for white-feathered chickens. White Plymouth Rocks are not suitable for crossbreeding. If they are crossed with New Hampshires, dark-colored chickens will often result. Therefore, the premium for whites is lost. And the slightly faster growth rate of crossbreds may not make up this profit difference.

In color of eggs, the crossbred producer is also at a market disadvantage. Most egg-producing crossbreds lay colored eggs. Many markets pay more for white eggs. Therefore, the crossbred producer forfeits the profit on white eggs until crossbreds, which will consistently lay white eggs, are produced.

In certain cases, crossbreds may develop a greater susceptibility to disease than the better parent.

It is possible to develop crossbreds superior to the better standardbred strains. But determining the most suitable crossbreds is difficult because two different breeds are involved.

**Martha Logan's Recipe for SUMMER SAUSAGE SCRAMBLE**  
 (Yield: 2 servings)

1 tablespoon butter 4 eggs  
 ½ cup chopped summer sausage (cervelat)  
 4 tablespoons milk

Melt butter in skillet. Add summer sausage and fry lightly. Beat eggs with milk and add. Cook gently, stirring carefully until just set (still moist). Serve immediately.

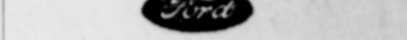

**SEASONAL ADVICE TO  
VACATIONISTS**

Austin. — Seasonal advice to  
vacationists concerning the pro-  
per precautions to be used in  
water sports was released from  
the State Health Department by  
Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health  
Officer.

Lakes and ponds of unknown  
depth, and streams of unfamiliar  
currents are often the site of  
picnics and excursions, and the  
usual lifeguard supervision asso-  
ciated with bathing beaches and  
commercial swimming pools is, of  
course, not available in such  
places.

"Swimming and water sports  
are beneficial to good health pro-  
vided one's physical condition  
justifies this type of exercise,"  
Dr. Cox asserted. "Nevertheless,  
they possess dangerous possibili-  
ties if the rules of safety are  
disregarded through carelessness  
or thoughtlessness."

The State Health Officer out-  
lined the following simple rules  
for bathing and swimming safe-  
ty: at least one hour should  
elapse after a meal before en-  
tering the water; upon the first  
indication of fatigue, come  
ashore, and don't re-enter the  
water; if chilled, leave the wa-  
ter immediately; do not enter  
the water when overheated; learn  
to float -- this is important;  
never attempt to rock a boat in  
a spirit of fun; and never swim  
in water that may be polluted.

"Outdoor excursions, picnics,  
and swimming parties contri-  
bute much to a healthy, happy,  
normal life," Dr. Cox said. "It  
is by no means advisable to eli-  
minate these pleasures from our  
summer program, but it is im-  
portant that they prove benefi-  
cial and not disastrous."

**PUT THEM AWAY**

These warm spring days mean  
warm weather is not too far  
away, and it's time to store the  
woolen articles for the summer.  
Most housewives are especially  
interested in taking the best pos-  
sible care of their blankets.

Mrs. Bernice Claytor, exten-  
sion home management specialist  
of Texas A. & M. College, says  
that blankets should be care-  
fully cleaned so they will keep  
their light, soft fluffiness. And  
storing woolen blankets is an im-  
portant job -- it must be done  
correctly so there is no risk of  
moths and dust.

Good care of blankets means  
several things. Keep them clean,  
light and fluffy. Repair the  
frayed or ripped edges and darn  
the holes and thin spots. Protect  
them against moths, and wash  
and store them properly. They  
will give you extra years of ser-  
vice if treated gently.

Moths cannot live in freshly  
laundered blankets, so for that  
reason alone, it is important that  
they be clean before they are  
stored.

Lukewarm water, plenty of  
suds and three rinsings in clear  
water will lengthen the life of  
the blanket. Hang it in the shade  
to dry, and remember it will  
dry much more quickly if hung  
over two lines about a foot apart.
