Income Tax News ---

Believe it or not, the U. S. In-
ternal Revenue Service is looking
for 4,000 taxpayers in the Dallas
District with some good news for
them.

Uncle Sam, in the form of the
Dallas District of Internal Revenue
Service, has thousands of dollars
in the form of refund checks which
rightfully belongs to Dallas Dis-
trict taxpayers.

These are checks left over from
the recent filing period. The checks
ranging from \$1.00 to \$4,000.00
have been returned in the mail for
lack of proper address.

Ellis Campbell, Jr., Director of
the Dallas District, announced the
figures today in kicking off "Oper-
ation Remail."

He said a group of his employees
have been searching telephone di-
rectories, contacting employers and
attempting through other sources
to find the correct addresses of the
taxpayers to whom the refunds are
due.

Now Director Campbell is ask-
ing taxpayers to do themselves and
his office a favor. In an appeal to
readers of this newspaper, he said:

"If you are entitled to a refund
check on the tax return you filed
this year and have not received a
letter from the Internal Revenue
Service advising you that your re-
turn is being examined, then write
me at 2101 Pacific Avenue, Dallas
1, Texas, or call RI 8-5611, Ext.
2572."

"When writing or calling, a tax-
payer should state his or her name
and address exactly as it appears
on his or her return," Mr. Campbell
said.

"Your social security number
and the amount of the refund also
will be helpful," he said. "If course
don't forget to give us your new
address."

September 30 is the last day to
claim a refund of the federal tax
you paid from July 1, 1955 to
June 30, 1959 on gasoline used for
farm work, reminds Tom E. Prat-
er, extension farm management
specialist.

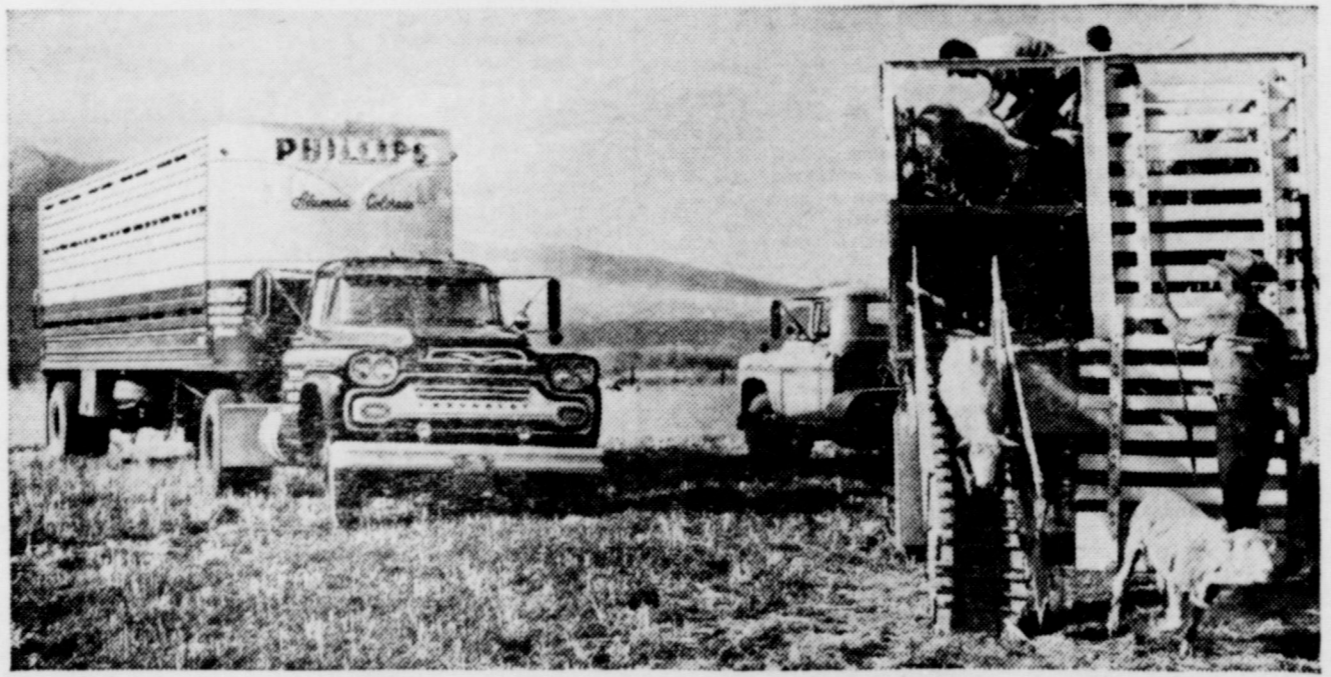

A Worm That Stings

We don't know how you feel about it, but we're watching out this year for those nasty Megalopyge caterpillars. For those of you who don't have an entomology textbook handy -- that's a moth, commonly called "asp" or "puss caterpillar", in the larval stage.

These brown or grey, semi-crescent shaped larvae may become extremely abundant, feeding on the foliage of a variety of trees and shrubs.

Schools have experienced difficulties in the past as a result of the prevalence of the insects on school yards. They represent a very real problem to householders during warmer months.

The large number of requests for information concerning the "puss caterpillars" now being received by the Texas State Department of Health entomologist indicates a population peak of these insects.

Everyone should familiarize themselves with the appearance and medical importance of these stinging caterpillars. Children, in particular, should be warned to avoid them.

Individual reaction to the stings varies greatly, dependent upon many factors such as age, sensitivity, size of caterpillar, area of skin involved, and the amount of pressure on contact.

A mature larva dropping from a tree into a person's shirt or blouse and mashed against the skin in several places before being retrieved would likely cause a much more painful condition than the simple act of brushing an exposed arm or leg against a small specimen.

A burning pain is felt almost immediately on contact. Small, raised, whitish spots appear, later becoming red. The inflamed area may spread for several inches, accompanied by swelling.



The resulting skin reaction frequently lasts for several days. Further systemic symptoms may arise of an allergic nature.

Over \$5,500,000 has been obligated to Plains farmers and ranchers under the Great Plains Conservation Program, reports Lynn Pinnard, extension assistant soil and water conservation specialist. Range work accounts for over half of the fund distribution.

The volume of farm marketing in the first 6 months of 1959 increased almost 3 percent over the corresponding period of 1958, says John G. McHaney, extension economist. But because of lower prices, cash receipts from farm marketing were \$13.9 billion, compared to \$14.8 billion received during the same period a year ago. Receipts from crop sales were up 4 percent, but cash receipts from livestock and products were lower.

If you are trying to make money out of hogs, keep them cool, says T. D. Tanksley, extension animal husbandman. When the temperature is 70-100 degrees a hog eats twice as much to put on the same gain as he does when the temperature is 60-75 degrees, he adds.

Most Drinking Starts Before College Days

NEW HAVEN, Conn.—Four out of every five college men who drink began their drinking before entering college, a researcher at Yale University's laboratory of applied physiology reported recently.

Robert Straus, research associate, disclosed for the first time preliminary results of a five-year study into the drinking habits of American college youth. This study was made by Mr. Straus and Sel-den D. Bacon, director of Yale's center of alcohol studies.

Of the American women students who drink, 65 per cent also started drinking before entering college, Mr. Straus said.

"The probability that a young person will drink at all," he continued, "is closely related to the practices of his or her parents."

"Of the men whose parents both drink, 90 per cent are themselves users. However, only half of the men (51 per cent) whose parents both abstain, drink."

"Where both parents are users, 83 per cent of the women drink on occasion. However, when both parents abstain, only 19 per cent of the women students drink."

He declared that parental advice on abstinence seems to be much stronger than advice from either church leaders or teachers.

Family income is a large factor "closely associated with the probability that one will use alcohol. Among those whose family income is under \$2,500, two thirds of the men and only 30 per cent of the women students drink."

Keys to the City Come in All Kinds Of Sizes, Meaning

NEW YORK CITY—First tenants in all new apartment houses in New York will receive "keys" to the city, but they are not likely to unlock any doors.

The "keys" are on the letterhead of welcome distributed over the signature of the mayor and consist of a simple code, or key, to aid newcomers in finding their way around the city.

Presentation of some sort of a key to a city is an ancient custom, even if the keys will not unlock so much as a street-numbering system. Many cities engage in the practice when distinguished visitors arrive at city hall.

It was not always a happy occasion. In ancient times keys to the gates of a walled town were sometimes handed over to a conqueror by defeated citizens, and the ceremony was not one that called for rejoicing.

In the Middle Ages, however, the custom became more or less honorary. With the gates of European cities locked at night it proved practical and convenient to give keys to particularly distinguished or wealthy—and trusted—visitors so that they could come and go as they pleased at any hour without challenge from the guard.

The custom of giving keys to the city has even been given a reverse twist. In Washington, a District of Columbia commissioner greeted the visiting Mayor of Lima, Peru, with the traditional key and was surprised when the South American official returned the favor and presented him with a beautifully worked silver key to Lima.

Various cities give various kinds of keys. In Baltimore, distinguished visitors receive a suitably inscribed wooden key, carved from the beams of the old flag house where one of the first American flags was made. Miami has honored guests with cypress keys, and in Portland, Oregon, plywood has



may start a lawsuit to settle the problem which the temporary injunction has cleared up for the moment.
If the court grants an injunction, it must be served on the defendant to be effective. Then if he disobeys the order, he is disobeying the court and is subject to a fine or a jail term for "contempt of court".
"Mandamus" is a special remedy used to right wrongs or enforce proper action by a public officer.
When we elect public officers to work for us, we place a great deal of authority in their hands. Sometimes they fail to do their lawful duty. One way to make a government official do his job is to ask the court for a writ of mandamus.
Suppose you have applied for a permit to build a house under a city building code. You submit your plans which meet all the requirements of the code but the proper official won't give you the permit and you can't get one elsewhere. You can then ask the court for a writ of mandamus and if you were right and the building official had no grounds for refusal, the court will order him to issue the permit.
Before the court will issue such a strong command as this, the officer must have refused to do his clear cut legal duty — not something that he may or may not have to do as part of his job.
