Boats Need Tags

--0-State Highway Engineer D. C. Greer said recently that registration of boats would go into effect in October. The new boating act requiring registration was recently passed by the Legislature.

Greer assured boat owners that no penalitles or convictions will be involved for this delayed registration date, particularly in view of the fact that the final boat-regis-tration date is March 1, 1960. Other features of the act go into effect immediately.

Greer explained that boat regis tration was a little foreign to the ordinary function of the Texas Highway Department, but that the Department was already well ex-perienced in handling this type of operation.

'We have been registering motor vehicles for more than forty years. Nearly four and a half million motor vehicles were registered by the Department this year. The Texas Legislature, cognizant of the experience of the Highway Department, gave us the job in order to advantage of existing operations and to cut cost. The Texas Highway Department deals solely with registration in this boating bill, we have nothing to do with the safety aspect," Geere said.

Insects Continue Light

Cotton insect infestations were reported low in a majority of fields in most localities. Populations of some of the pests had increased, with occasional plantings being treated for insect control, Although such infestations were rarely heavy, cotton should be checked frequenty for any appearance of damaging infestations.

Aphids were reported in heavy infestations occasional fields, but populations had decreased in

many fields. Fleahopper populations were reported heavy in some fields in Lynn County. Light to medium infest-

ations were reported elsewhere. Cabbage loopers increased in numbers in some fields but were found in lower infestations in others. Disease caused heavy mortality in some plantings. Egg counts increased to a marked degree in many fields in Lubbock County. Bollworm infestations were

ported in light to medium infestations in Howard, Scurry, and Yoakum counties. Light infestations were reported elsewhere. Scattered fields have been treated for control of damaging infestations. Since some of these infestations have developed without any general show of eggs and small worms on plant terminals, forms should also be carefully checked for the appearance of damaging infes-



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

Most Drinking Starts **Before College Days**

NEW HAVEN, Conn .- Four out of every five college men who drink began their drinking before entering college, a researcher at Yale University's laboratory of applied physiology reported recently.

Robert Straus, research associate, disclosed for the first time preliminary results of a five-year study into the drinking habits of American college youth. This study was made by Mr. Straus and Selden D. Bacon, director of Yale's center of alcohol studies.

Of the American women students who drink, 65 per cent also started driaking before entering college, Mr. Straus said.

"The probability that a young person will drink at all," he continued, "is closely related to the practices of his or her parents.

"Of the men whose parents both drink, 90 per cent are themselves users. However, only half of the men (51 per cent) whose parents both abstain, drink.

"Where both parents are users, 83 per cent of the women drink on occasion. However, when both parents abstain, only 19 per cent of the women students drink."

He declared that parental advice on abstinence seems to be much stronger than advice from either church leaders or teachers.

Family income is a large factor "closely associated with the probability that one will use alcohol Among those whose family income is under \$2,500, two thirds of the men and only 30 per cent of the men students drink.



Keys to the City Come in All Kinds Of Sizes, Meaning

NEW YORK CITY-First tenants in all new apartment houses in New York will receive "keys" to the city, but they are not lively to unlock any doors.

The "keys" are on the letterhead of welcome distributed over the signature of the mayor and consist of a simple code, or key, to aid newcomers in finding their way around the c'ty.

Presentation of some sort of a key to a city is an ancient custom. even if the keys will not unlock so much as a street-numbering system. Many cities engage in the practice when distinguished visitors arrive at city hall.

It was not always a hapov occasion. In ancient times kevs to the gates of a walled town were some times handed over to a conqueror by defeated citizens, and the ceremony was not one that called for rejoicing.

In the Middle Ages, however the custom became more or less honorary. With the gates of European cities locked at night it proved practical and convenient to give keys to particularly distinguished or wealthy-and trusted-vis ters so that they could come and go as they pleased at any hour without challenge from the guard

The custom of giving keys to the city has even been given a reverse twist. In Washington District of Columbia com nissioner greeted the visiting Mayor of Lima, Peru, with the tralitional key and was surprised when the South American official returned the favor and presented him with a beautifully worked silver key to Lima.

Various cities give various kinds of keys. In Baltimore, distinguished visitors receive a suitably inscribed wooden key, carved from the beams of the old flag house where one of the first American flags was made. Miami has honored guests with cypress keys, and in Portland, Oregon, plyword has



LAW-continued from page 1 may start a laysuit to settle the problem which the temporary injunction has deared up for the mo-

if the court grants an injunction, it must be served on the defendant to be effective. Then if he disobeys the order. he is disobeying the court and is subject to a fine or a jail term for "contempt of court'

"Mandamus" is a special remedy used to right wrongs or enforce proper action by a public officer. When we elect public officers to work for us, we place a great deal of authority in their hands. Sometimes they fail to do their lawful. times they fail to do their lawful duty. One way to make a govern-ment official do his job is to ask he court for a writ of mandamus Suppose you have applied for a permit to build a house under a city building code. You submit your plans which meet all the requirements of the code but the proper official won't give you the permit and you can't get one elsewrere. You can then ask the court for a writ of mandamus and if you were right and the building offciand had no grounds for refusal, the court will order him to issue the permit.

Before the court will issue such a strong command as this, the of-ficer must have refused to do his clear cut legal duty - not some-thing that he may or may not have to do as part of his job.
