Part Of Area Gets Rain Sunday

A late afternoon heat induced thunder storm Sunday netted from one half inch to one inch of needed moisture in the T-Bar, Wells and New Moore area and other points to the west and southwest. The Draw area south into Borden got one quarter of inch.

Felmont G. C. Geller No. 1 shot free oil high up on the rig during a routine drill stem test and the Charley Kendrick No. 2 is almost a sure bet to be another Spraberry producer.

As a bit of background the new field was called a discovery last winter with the Kendrick No. 1 coming in as a good oiler. The field has currently five hits counting the above two wells. The score board records two dusters and currently two wells are drilling with another being announced this week. The outline of extent of the strike is currently unknown but there is a suggestion of a trend to the north.

ORDINANCE NO. 68

AN ORDINANCE PROHIBITING THE KEEPING, RAISING OR FEEDING OF CHICKENS, BROILERS, CAGED HENS, TURKEYS, AND ALL AND EVERY OTHER TYPE OF FOWL, WITHIN THE CORPORATE LIMITS OF O'DONNELL, TEXAS, WHEN SUCH KEEPING, RAISING OR FEEDING IS FOR COMMERCIAL OR BUSINESS PURPOSES; AND ALSO PROHIBITING THE CONSTRUCTION, ERECTION OR MAINTENANCE OF ANY BUILDING, STRUCTURE, BROILER HOUSE, CAGED-HEN HOUSE, HATCHERY, PENS OR COOPS WITHIN THE CORPORATE LIMITS OF THE CITY OF O'DONNELL, TEXAS, WHEN ANY SUCH STRUCTURE OR BUILDING IS TO BE USED, IN WHOLE OR IN PART, FOR THE HOUSING, KEEPING, FEEDING, PROCESSING OR IN ANY MANNER MAINTAINING CHICKENS, BROILERS, CAGED HENS, TURKEYS, OR ANY OTHER TYPE OF FOWL ON A COMMERCIAL OR BUSINESS BASIS OR FOR COMMERCIAL OR BUSINESS PURPOSES.

WHEREAS, it is deemed inimical and dangerous to the public health and sanitation to permit the keeping, raising or feeding of chickens, broilers, caged hens, turkeys and all and every type of fowl within the corporate limits of the City of O'Donnell, Texas, when such is for commercial or business purposes; and

WHEREAS, it is deemed inimical and dangerous to the public health and sanitation to permit the construction, erection or maintenance of any structure, building, broiler house, hatchery, pens, or coops, within the corporate limits of the City of O'Donnell, Texas, when any such structure is to be used in whole or in part for the housing, keeping, feeding, processing or in any manner maintaining chickens, broilers, caged hens, turkeys or any other type of fowl, on a commercial or business basis, for commercial or business purposes; and

WHEREAS, it is deemed that any such activities would in addition constitute a nuisance to the public by generating foul odors, attracting insects, and disturbing the peace and quiet and general well-being of the community, and it is deemed advisable any and all such activities should be prohibited within the corporate limits of the City of O'Donnell, Texas:

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF O'DONNELL, TEXAS in special session duly called the 26th day of June, A. D. 1956:

That henceforth, no person, group of persons, firm or organization shall keep, raise, feed or maintain any chickens, broilers, caged-hens, turkeys or any other type of fowl within the corporate limits of the City of O'Donnell, Texas, when such keeping raising or maintenance purposes, and any such activity is hereby prohibited.

That henceforth, no person, group of persons, firm or organization shall construct, erect, or maintain any building, structure, broiler house, caged-hen house, hatchery, pens or coops, within the corporate limits of the City of O'Donnell, Texas, when any such building, structure, or house is to

be used, in whole or in part, for the housing, feeding, keeping, or in any other manner maintaining chickens, broilers, caged-hens, turkeys, or any other type of fowl, on a commercial basis, or for commercial or business purposes, and any such construction or use of any building or structure for such activities is hereby prohibited.

This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage and approval as provided by the laws of the State of Texas and the Charter of the City of O'Donnell, Texas.

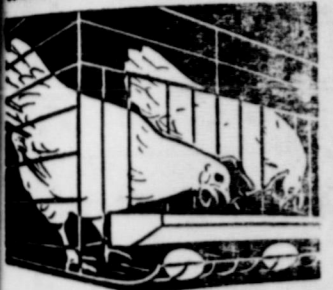

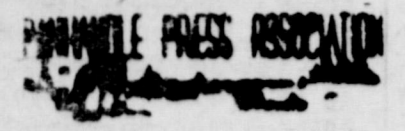

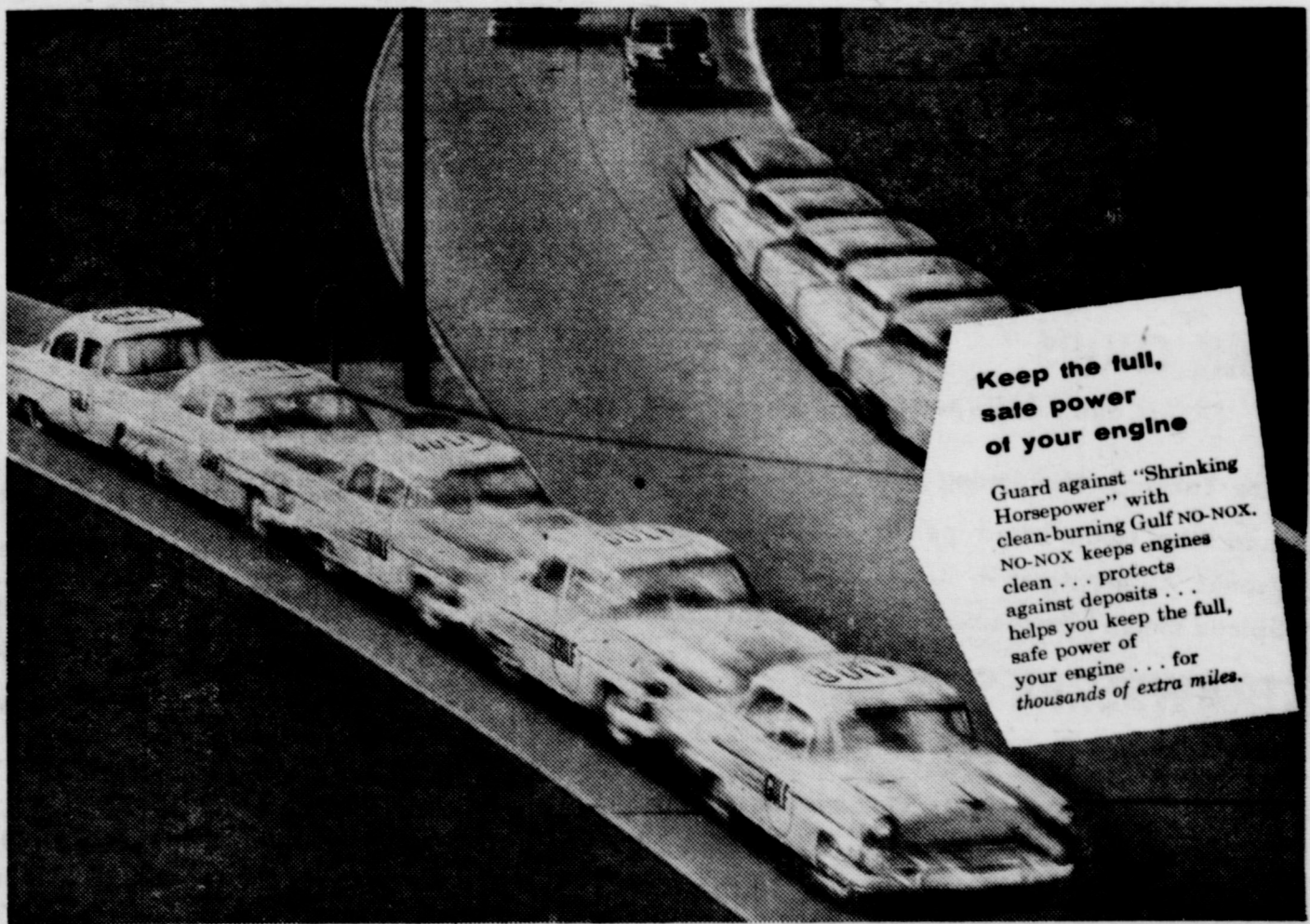
