Troy Lee had received two Salk vaccine shots along with other children at the O'Donnell Grade School. He is being treated at home. He is suffering from weakness in the leg and thigh muscles but is not expected to have any lasting effects.

HALF HOSPITALS ARE FILLED WITH MENTAL PATIENTS

Mental disorders today represent a real problem, and it is estimated that more than 50 percent of all hospital beds are filled by persons suffering from mental or nervous diseases, declares Dr. Henry A. Holte, Commissioner of Health.

It thus appears that modern civilization is exacting a terrific toll. High speed living, with its cruel demands upon nature, is responsible for a large part of the trouble.

The fact is that significant percentage of the patients entering hospitals for mental disorders are there because of organic or toxic causes.

For example, general paresis is the cause of one fifth of the mental troubles in males now entering mental hospitals. This condition is an organic disease of the brain due to the germ responsible for syphilis. It is a preventable disease. Early and effective treatment of acquired syphilis will block the end results of general paralysis in the insane.

The excessive use of alcohol is responsible for a number of mental disorders, at least in males.

Nevertheless, improper living habits continue to impair mental health in many people. Insufficient sleep, neglect of bodily care and an over forcing of nervous energy are the pitfalls to avoid in this connection. Nature demands that her fundamental laws be at least reasonably observed.

Who Files Returns?

Nearly every citizen or resident of the U. S. A. who had an income during 1955 should file a tax, according to John R. Robinson of the Internal Revenue Service office at Lubbock, Texas.

He explained that if you are less than 65 years of age and had a gross income of \$600 or more, you must file a tax return. Those 65 and over, however, must file a return when their gross income is \$1200 or more.

"Self-employed individuals with net earnings of \$400 or more must also file an annual return," Mr. Robinson said.

A person with income of less than \$600, or \$1200 for those 65 or over, should file a return to get a refund of the tax that was withheld each payday, he said.

"Every taxpayer should read the 1955 tax instruction pamphlet so he will not pay more or less tax than he owes," he urged.

Facts For Farmer

Now that the crops are laid by, many farmers are turning their attention toward Federal tax filling time in January, according to John G. Hutton, manager of the Lubbock Social Security Office.

Mr. Hutton explained that many farmers will be required to file two types of tax returns in January, 1956, for the 1955 calendar year: (1) the farmer who is self-employed will be required to file an income tax report and pay his social security tax if net earnings for 1955 are at least \$400 and the gross income is at least \$800 and (2) the farmer who has paid cash wages of \$100 or more to any employee in agricultural labor in 1955 will be required to file a return on Form 943, listing the name and social security account of each such employee.

Mr. Hutton pointed out that employees of the Social Security Administration are not authorized to advise or aid any taxpayer in the preparation of a tax return. He emphasized that such assistance as needed should be secured from the District Director of Internal Revenue or someone who specializes in filing tax returns. However, any question as to benefits payable under the Social Security law will be gladly answered by his office, Mr. Hutton concluded.

trict, grew up on a farm in Galena County. He attended the rural schools of Dawson County and worked his way thru Lamesa High School and Texas Tech. College graduatinb from the latter institution in 1934. While attending Tech he worked on farms near Lubbock and had part time employment in service stations. After graduation in 1934 he leased and operated a service station until 1936 when he entered the theatre business. In 1935 he married Miss Ima Smith, daughter of Mr and Mrs. W. J. Smith, of the Farmer Community in Crosby County. She was teaching in the Farmer School at the time of her marriage. They have two children, Mickey 15, and Jan 11. He is a member and a steward of St. John Methodist Church, a Mason, a member of the Texas Farm Bureau, and a member of the Lubbock Kiwanis Club. His mother, Mrs. C. K. Smith lives in Lamesa.
