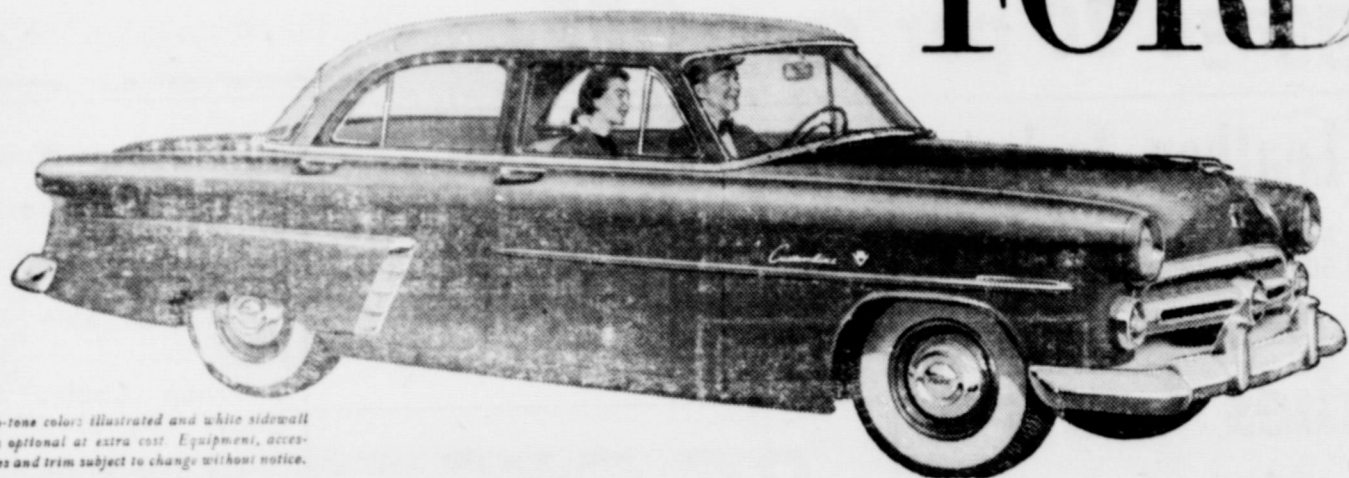

Artists Found Home In Mountain Town

LITTLETON, N. H. — Tucked away on a back country road in this White Mountains community, a group of artists have "found a home" for summer activity in New Hampshire and have named it Rock Pool. They have converted and rebuilt old farm buildings into studios and an art shop. During the season skilled instructors demonstrate the arts of ceramics, sculpturing, painting, wood-cutting, and silver-smithing. The visitor to Rock Pool can watch the entire process of creation. For instance, in ceramics the clay is mixed, shaped, baked in the kiln, glazed and decorated in an individual studio with the most modern and complete equipment.

Each artist also holds classes in his own medium and students can learn the art of jewelry making, or take a sketching class with a professional model, or "throw" a vase on the electric wheel.

A new idea in the art world, each of these artists is self-sufficient. Owner Bill Gordon has long been interested in arts and artists in Boston, and it was his idea to convert Rock Pool into an art center. He provided the lodgings and equipment and then turned the project over to the artists, who in return, give a percentage of their summer's intake back to make the project self-sufficient.

Of his project, Director Gordon declared, "It is inspiring to have this new colony here in New Hampshire, and there couldn't be a more logical spot for an art center than this peaceful and scenic countryside with its natural offerings of beauty to the artist."

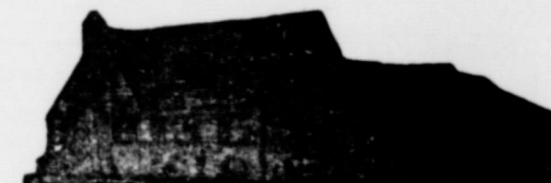

Redcoats

March Upon Village
SCHUYLERVILLE, N.Y.—A week-long celebration marked the 175th anniversary of the Battle of Saratoga, fought on the site of this village, 11 miles east of Saratoga Springs.

The British opened the campaign of 1777 by seeking to isolate New England through occupying the Hudson Valley. Lord Burgoyne was to come down from Canada through Lake Champlain and Lake George, meeting Lord Howe, who was to march from New York, at Albany.

The plan went awry. Lord Howe marched to Philadelphia. Lord Burgoyne reached Ticonderoga by July 1, but suffered heavy losses. After a series of defeats inflicted by Gen. Benedict Arnold, the British surrendered to General Gates at Old Saratoga, now Schuylerville, on Oct. 17.

Community Soaked As Indians Perform Ancient Rain Dance

ANADARKO, Okla.—The American Indian Exposition here was rainsoaked 12 hours after the Jemez Apache Indians completed a rain dance under a clear sky.

Chief Juan Gachupin and his 14-year-old daughter, Leonora, performed the rhythmic, stamping dance while two braves chanted and beat a tom-tom, before 10,000 delegates from 35 tribes and 6,000 palefaces.

Another performance was scheduled. The rain threatened to reduce attendance and slow down athletic contests.

Two years ago, the Kiowa Indians performed a "forbidden" pagan sun dance over the angry opposition of tribal leaders. It was followed by rains so heavy that they nearly washed out the exposition.

Farmers near Anadarko rejoiced after the rain. A summer drought had almost destroyed their cotton, peanut and feed crops. Chief Gachupin refused to take credit.

Asked through an interpreter whether he thought his dancing had anything to do with the rain, he grunted, "I couldn't say."

The Jemez tribe, descended from the pueblos, has claimed for centuries that the dance does bring rain.

Exposition officials said that the opposition to the sun dance in 1950 came from the fact that it was considered pagan.

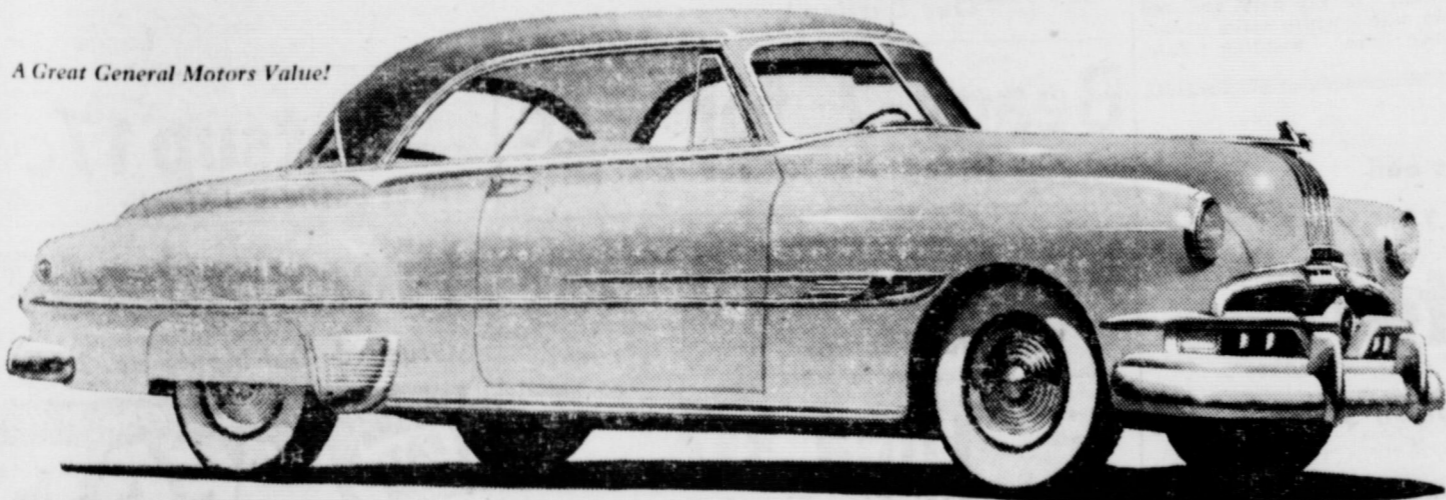

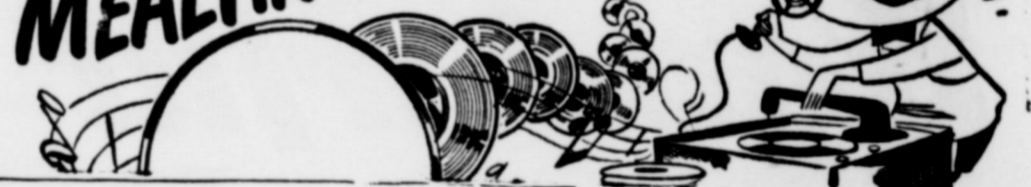
