Workshop On Insects Now In Progress Here

A Short Course on Cotton Insect Control got underway in the Vo-cational Agriculture Building of O'Donnell High School at 8:00p. m.

Tuesday, August 11.
The course was organized by J. W. Reed, O'Donnell High School Vocational Agriculture Teacher and was conducted with the assistance of H. A. Turney, Insect Control Specialist for the Vocational Agri-Insect Control culture Service.

The object of the short course was to teach interested farmers enough about insects and insecticides that they can decide for themselves when

da as follows: The course over three meetings. The first was devoted to identification to both harmful and beneficial cotton insects; to recognition of the nature and extent of their damages; and to insecticides, kinds, cost, use and application. Field work featured in the second meeting on Wednesday, August 13. Participating farmers had the oppartunity to practice identifying cotton insects in the field to gain experiencein determining the nature and extent of damage caused by various insects and to practice making insect counts as a step in deciding whether or not to poison. The date and place for the third meeting is yet to be arranged, but the program will be set up ac-cording to the wishes of the farmers to cover problems in line with their needs and interests. It is anticipated, however, that the third meeting will cover such things as safety in mixing and applying insecticides, calibrating spraying equipment, kinds of insecticides to use in controlling various insects and com-bination of insects, frequency of applying poisons, and review of i-dentification and procedure for making insect counts.

Coffee and tea are not necessarily safe because of boiling, and carbonated or noncarbonated soft drinks from unfamiliar sources should be avoided. And don't forget that ice cubes from polluted water can contaminate any drink.

Unless you are sure that the local milk is absolutely safe, and that the custards, ice cream, ect., are made from safe milk, you had better steer clear of them.
