First Milo Harvested Two Co-op Firms Hold Meet

Edwards Sells Early Grain

Clyde Edwards sold the first load of 1958 grain here on Aug. 4th to Clayton Grain Co. to set what is believed to be a record for early grain harvesting here.

The grain tested 15 percent moisture and was harvested from 17 acres and the yield was 1270 lbs. to the acre. The farm is located above the caprock in Borden Co. Mr. Clayton said a nice premium would be paid in addition to market price of the grain which was "60 Day Sooner Milo."

Mr. Clayton estimates the early grain will begin to move to market the latter part of this month but the bulk of the crop will not be harvested until frost dries and kills the plant. Grain is looking excellent but a rain is needed to fill out the seed heads.

Workshop On Insects Now In Progress Here

A Short Course on Cotton Insect Control got underway in the Vocational Agriculture Building of O'Donnell High School at 8:00 p. m. Tuesday, August 11.

The course was organized by J. W. Reed, O'Donnell High School Vocational Agriculture Teacher and was conducted with the assistance of H. A. Turney, Insect Control Specialist for the Vocational Agriculture Service.

The object of the short course was to teach interested farmers enough about insects and insecticides that they can decide for themselves when to poison, what insecticide to use, and the rate and method of application, Reed said.

Reed explains the program agenda as follows: The course extended over three meetings. The first was devoted to identification to both harmful and beneficial cotton insects; to recognition of the nature and extent of their damages; and to insecticides, kinds, cost, use and application. Field work featured in the second meeting on Wednesday, August 13. Participating farmers had the opportunity to practice identifying cotton insects in the field to gain experience in determining the nature and extent of damage caused by various insects and to practice making insect counts as a step in deciding whether or not to poison. The date and place for the third meeting is yet to be arranged, but the program will be set up according to the wishes of the farmers to cover problems in line with their needs and interests. It is anticipated, however, that the third meeting will cover such things as safety in mixing and applying insecticides, calibrating spraying equipment, kinds of insecticides to use in controlling various insects and combination of insects, frequency of applying poisons, and review of identification and procedure for making insect counts.

V. A. Quiz

Q—I'm a Korea veteran and my deadline for starting school under the GI Bill will come next summer, August 1959. Can I make application as late as next August for going to school, and then start class in September?

A—No. You must actually be in school, within three years from the date of your discharge. It is not enough to apply on time, with the intention of beginning after your deadline.

The doctor tells me my present climate is bad for me and that I should move. Suppose I sell my GI house, and move. Can I have my GI home rights restored so I can buy a house in the new locality?

A—Yes. If your doctor says your move is necessary, your rights to a GI home loan may be restored. However, the VA must first be relieved from liability on its guaranty of your old loan.

Q—I'm computing my yearly income for VA pension purposes. do I put down my take-home salary after deductions, or my gross salary before all deductions?

A—You must list your gross salary, rather than your net take-home salary after deductions.

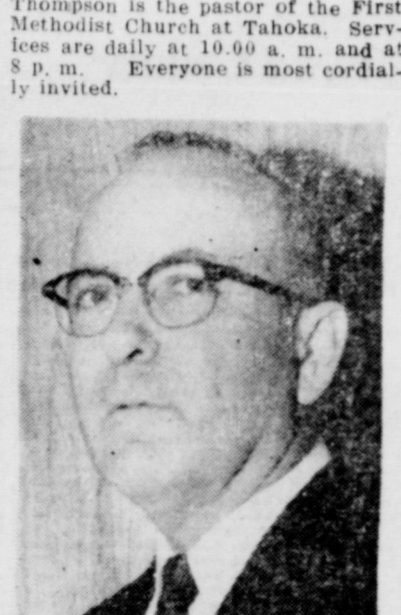

INSECTS CONTINUE LIGHT

Although the weather and the excellent condition of cotton seemed to favor insect activity, heavy infestations were reported. Scattered plantings have been treated for insect control, but infestations were rarely heavy.

Fleashoppers continue to be reported in light to medium infestations. The insect is not a problem in most fields. Only very late cotton would likely suffer any serious damage at this time.

Bullworm activity increased some what in most localities during the past week. Infestations increased to a more marked degree in the southern parts of Garza, Lynn, Terry and Yoakum Counties. Medium infestations were general in the southern part of the area. Light infestations were reported in most other counties. Scattered fields have been treated for control of the worms.

S. S. News Given

What documents do I need to furnish when I apply for my social security benefits? This question is frequently asked of the Social Security Office, according to John G. Hutton, Manager.

When a person files an application for retirement or family insurance, some records must be furnished to establish his rights to the payments, Hutton said. The proofs most often needed are proof of age, proof of marriage, and evidence of the amount of earnings in the preceding year.

Most people have an old record on which their date of birth or age was recorded many years ago, such as a baptismal certificate, school record, government record, family Bible, insurance policy, poll tax receipt, etc. Census records are sometimes available. A recently established delayed birth certificate is not sufficient proof of age for this purpose. A widow of a deceased worker who applies for monthly benefits is required to furnish proof of marriage. The marriage certificate or certified copy of it may be obtained from the county clerk of the county where the marriage license was obtained, Hutton said.

Evidence of the amount of earnings in the preceding years will speed the payment of a claim. In the case of an employee, this would be the statement of wages and taxes (Form W-2) which he received from his employer. A self-employed person should furnish a copy of his last income tax return and evidence of payment such as a cancelled check or money order receipt.

Health Problem In Travel

Many Texans like to spend their vacation time with an extended trip to far away places.

There are several health risks in travel to strange places, but knowledge teamed with common sense can make your trip both safe and pleasant, provided you take the trouble to follow a few simple rules.

Immunization requirements for foreign travel vary from country to country and should be determined in advance so that you have ample time to receive the proper immunizations.

By all means, you should be protected against typhoid, smallpox and polio. Your family doctor, local director of health or the State

Department of Health can advise you on these recommendations.

While it is probably safe to drink water in the big tourist hotels and the big cities everywhere, the traveler who gets off the beaten path should, in most areas, be careful!

The only safe water should be filtered and treated in an approved manner and approved by the local health department.

Coffee and tea are not necessarily safe because of boiling, and carbonated or noncarbonated soft drinks from unfamiliar sources should be avoided. And don't forget that ice cubes from polluted water can contaminate any drink.

Unless you are sure that the local milk is absolutely safe, and that the custards, ice cream, ect., are made from safe milk, you had better steer clear of them.

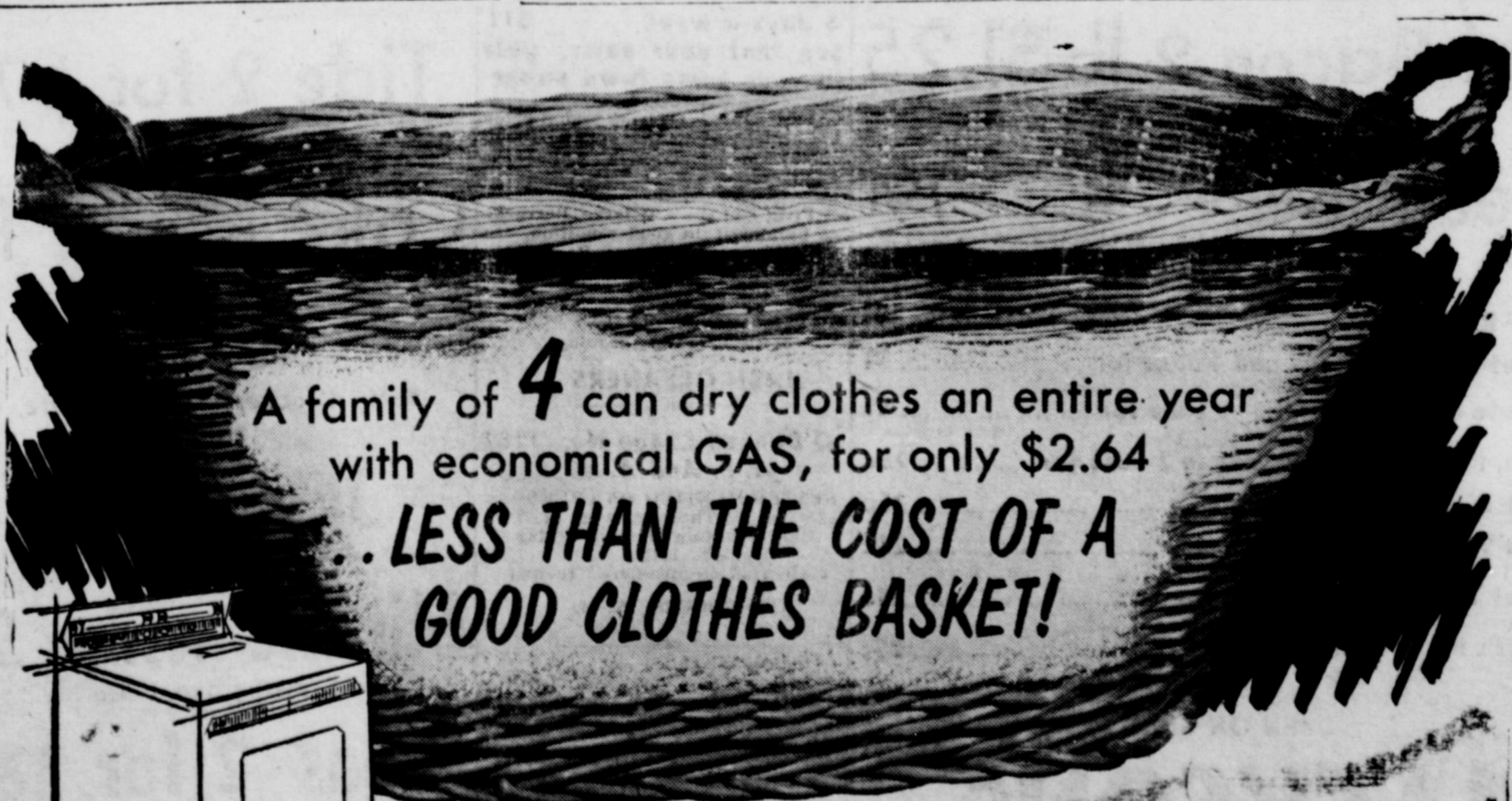

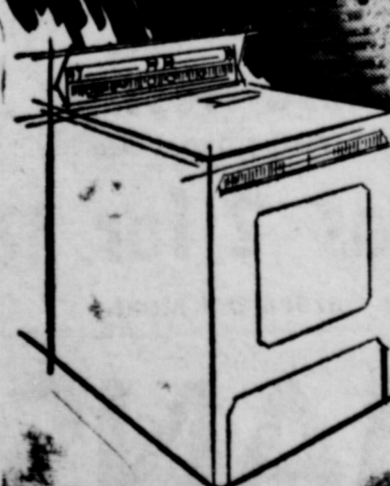
