

New Pyramid Is Found in Egypt By Scientists

CAIRO-A heretofore unknown pyramid has been discovered at Saqqara on the edge of Egypt's Western Desert, 50 miles from

It is a step pyramid like the nearby Pyramid of Zoser, the earliest known building in the world made entirely of stone. The step pyramids were built in ascending stages, each smaller than the last, as contrasted with the smooth outline of the later true pyramids.

Scientists think the new pyramid probably was built for King Zoser's successor about 2700 B. C. Discovery was made by archeol-

ogists sinking trial pits in late 1951. They found a vast terrace, 1803 feet long and 558 feet wide, surrounded by remains of an enclosing wall, one section of which was perfectly preserved.

Ruined Temples Within the enclosure were piles of broken stone and masonry suggesting the temples, shrines, and secondary tombs which make up a pyramid complex. A pit dug in the exact center of the terrace uncovered three parallel leaning walls.

The scorching heat of the Egyptian spring stopped work for a time, and the dimensions of the central structure have not yet been ascertained. When digging begins again, efforts will be concentrated on a search for the well hidden burial chamber.

Egyptian officials say legendary curses will not stop the excavators. The most blistering curses inscribed on many tombs were directed more against violators of endowments than against grave robbers. Set up in lands and revenues, endowments insured proper religious services for the care of the departed soul.




