## Victory Is Sweet With 19-0 Win Over Tahoka

### Grudge Match Set With Post

#### Many Going To Post

Victory was sweet as a Dime Box watermelon to the O'Donnell Eagles and their cheering fans when they soundly clawed a very good Tahoka team to pieces 19 to 0 here Friday night. This was the first win over Tahoka since 1950 when Coach Palmer as a senior Eagle led the locals to victory. However there were two years of no games matched—1952 and 1953.

The first half of the game was a scoreless defensive contest with a punting duel being featured. Both teams had strong lines but the line of the Eagle's was out of this world when the chips were down. Such players as Thompson, Proctor, Sprabery, Shaw, White and Simpson literally tore the Bulldog line apart to stop all attacks.

#### What Did He Say?

The third quarter opened with the birds acting like cats on a hot tin roof. During the 15 minutes the Featherby tribe made the Bulldogs blush three times along with one conversion. Scoring was by McKibben and Barton with the latter running some 25 yards for a T. D. on a broken field dash as thrilling as any fan would wish to see. Nearly every Bulldog in the pack had a try at trying to stop this victory-bent Eagle. What ever Coach Joe Palmer told his boys at half time got results as they acted country boys at dinner time in the Swamp Root country—simply no manners at all.

The concluding quarter saw a sea saw defensive game with all boys getting to play. At no time did the guests threaten to score and their first downs. The game was clean with no personal fouls.

Note to Avalanche sports dept.—why is it when O'Donnell wins a game it is an "upset"? For 12 years that we can recall it has always been that way.

The Eagles have both barrels loaded for Post Friday as last year that town drubbed the Eagles in their own dust 52 to 0 keeping the main string in the full game to purposely build an unsightly score. Big O, we hope, will return the compliment. The good word for Friday night is—"191 to 0—or Bust!"

#### OUR ANNUAL GUESTS

With a near record cotton crop an odds-on bet, Mexican Nationals and native Latin Americans are filling every available house on the farm and in town.

Some 3,000 Nationals and about 750 natives (counting all of the family unit) will be in the trade during the peak of the harvest. Estimating that a National spends \$5 a week on food that item will run \$15,000 a week. Another \$6,000 a week should come from other harvest labor for food, clothing, medicine, etc will depend on weather but should be another \$5,000 a week. The gross sale of farm products in this area should be over \$5 million.

The Nationals are colorfully dressed in their tropical attire and shiver and shake on cool mornings. They are surprisingly polite guests considering they are alien to our customs. Many have blue eyes and light complexions being from deep in the south of Mexico.

The Bolynada Labor Association, managed by Charley Jackson is the local importing agency for Nationals.

#### Time To Retire?

You have, no doubt, heard the old saying, "Nothing is certain in life but taxes and the sunrise!" Well, there is another thing just as certain—that every sunrise brings another day on which more than 9,000 men, women, and children are awarded benefits under the old age, survivors, and disability insurance program. Most women reaching 62 and men reaching 65 can count on OASI benefits because they or their spouses have worked long enough in covered employment to become insured under the social security law. Complete retirement is not required. Persons under 72 are considered retired if not earning more than \$1200 per year and partially retired if earning between \$1200 and \$2080 per year. Eligible persons past 72 may collect benefits regardless of the amount of their current earnings.

The average age at which workers retire sufficiently to receive benefits is 68, but many of these beneficiaries continue to have part-time earnings within the \$2080 bracket, or have months in a year in which they do not earn over \$80 in wages or actively engage in self employment.

Before reaching retirement age, every worker or self employed person with a stake in social security should find out what the "floor of security" represented by old age and survivors insurance benefits will be in his case so that he can include it in his retirement plans.

Average profit per bird for past year 7.5 cents and av. profit per house last year \$1724.35 ( 5 houses per year)

Current demand calls for 1 million birds to be on feed.

25 broiler houses here.

By better feeds expect in 1958 50.2 lbs meat per 100 lbs of feed.

\$10 profit per house may be expected by use of bulk feed.

3 new broiler houses being processed in loan for here.

O'Donnell climate and O'Donnell broilers are best in world.

Guaranteed floor of 20c by Clary and 17c on open market.

#### 1st Bale At Co-op

Wendell Edwards ginned the first bale at the Farmers Co-op gin at the 10th according to Weldon Martin, manager of that firm. The bale weighed 525 lbs and was ginned from 1449 lbs of seed cotton with 800 lbs of seed. The gin purchased the bale at 50c lb, ginned it free as well as bagging and ties. As of Saturday the gin had processed 600 bales.

Mr. Martin estimated that during the peak run the gin and its companion elevator would employ about 37 in personnel with a weekly payroll of near to \$3,000. He added that grain was coming in with high moisture content.

An estimated 3,000 Mexican Nationals are expected to be harvesting this immediate area during the week which should be the 3rd and 4th weeks of October. The crop is unusually late and is still fruiting and blooming due to recent rains. Crops are simply beautiful and per acre production should beat 1949 if a freeze does not strike early.

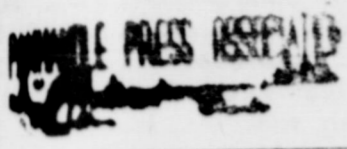

## Law Cited On Sale Of Pistols In Texas

Following is the report of the  
Lynn County Grand Jury concern-  
ing the sale of pistols —

" During the course of our in-  
vestigation, the Grand Jury has  
become alarmed at the indiscrimi-  
nate sale of pistols to unauthoriz-  
ed persons.

Merchants are advised that strict  
compliance with all requirements  
of the law concerning dealers will  
be demanded. Article 489 a of the  
Penal Code provides that no per-  
son may purchase a pistol unless he  
has secured a certificate of good  
character from a Justice of the  
Peace, County Judge or District  
Judge in the county of his or her  
residence. Strict adherence to this  
requirement will be expected.

Merchants are advised to familiar-  
ize themselves with certain pro-  
visions concerning the licensing of  
dealers in pistols and records re-  
quired by law.

Due to the good crop prospects,  
a great influx of people is expected  
in our county this fall and the Grand  
Jury respectfully solicits the co-  
operation of all merchants and citi-  
zens in regard to this matter and  
expects to continue its investigation  
of this matter at its next meeting.

Attention is also directed to a  
new act by the legislature making

it unlawful to carry certain types  
of knives in addition to others al-  
ready prohibited.
