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Multiple Sclerosis Victims Get Hope
ATLANTIC CITY—The attitude concerning multiple sclerosis, once regarded as a disease leading to helplessness and early death, has changed. The feeling now is that patients can live a useful life for a long time.

This change in attitude was told here by Drs. Edward E. Gordon and Karl E. Carlson of New York. They presented a joint paper before the section of physical medicine and rehabilitation at a meeting of the American Medical Association. They said multiple sclerosis need not have terrifying implications if the optimistic side be stressed, such as the relatively long life expectancy and the possibility of spontaneous arrest of the disease process.

They pointed out that the survival time of victims appears to be underrated, citing one recent statistical study which indicated that the median duration of the disease is about 27 years.

Multiple sclerosis follows a chronic degeneration of the brain and spinal cord, most common in young persons. The onset is usually between 15 and 30 years of age. Among its many symptoms are weakness in one or both legs, tremors, slowness in pronunciation and eye disorders. In late stages there may develop defective memory, emotional disturbances and lack of control. The cause is obscure.

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Fee-Splitting Racket Spreads Among Docs
NEW YORK — Fee-splitting among doctors "is a sinister and spreading medical racket that is a menace to our health," charged Dr. Arch J. Beatty, writing in Coronet Magazine.

"Many people today," Dr. Beatty claims, "are made poor by unnecessarily exorbitant surgical charges and even by unnecessary surgical operations through the dangerous practice of fee-splitting." This "racket" is an under-the-counter deal in which the surgeon buys his patients in order to perform surgery upon them, and in which fees from these operations are split between the surgeon and the referring physician without the patient's knowledge.

"Ghost surgery" is another form of this "evil racket" that is a menace to our health, claims Dr. Beatty. "Here, the patient is told by a general practitioner that an operation is necessary and is led to believe that the practitioner will perform it. Instead, without the patient's knowledge, a surgeon is hired to step in after the anesthesia is administered, perform the operation, then step out again.

"Today," continues Dr. Beatty, "surgery is a skill that goes beyond the use of a scalpel. . . . But the ghost surgeon has nothing to do with any of this. The patient gets very little of what he is paying for. All too commonly, this means double the price for the patient."

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Atabrine Is Used To Treat Tapeworm

CHICAGO — Quinacrine hydrochloride (atabrine, trademark)—used during World War II as an antimalarial agent—has proved of value in the treatment of tapeworm.

Even persons suffering from tapeworm were given the drug, reported Drs. William A. Sodeman and Rodney C. Jung, of the School of Medicine, Tulane University of Louisiana, New Orleans. It was effective in 10 of the cases on the initial trial, and in the 11th when treatment was repeated, they stated.

The patients were given doses ranging from 0.6 to 1.2 grams at the rate of two 0.1 gram tablets every five minutes with a little water until the entire amount was taken. If the patient reacted to the drug by vomiting and nausea, sodium bicarbonate was added to the water when the medication was repeated.

In the treatment of tapeworm, the doctors said, the prompt action of quinacrine and the benign character of the toxic reaction have established it in their opinion as the drug of choice.

Planetarium Shows Complex Universe

PHILADELPHIA — The Fels Planetarium show, "Hurling Through Space", shows just how many and how complex the motions of the earth really are.

There are many excellent and graphic ways to prove the rotation of the earth. There is the Foucault pendulum. There is the centrifugal effects of the earth's rotation, which accounts for the uphill flow of the Mississippi River, and there is the apparent rotation of the heavens.

The first proof of the earth's rotation was furnished in 1679 when the English physicist Hooke verified a prediction made by Sir Isaac Newton. Newton held that, if the earth rotates, a body on its surface will not be traveling as fast as a body in the top of a high tower, for the latter body will be farther from the axis of rotation.

He computed that at the equator a ball dropped from a 400-foot tower will land more than 1 1/4 inches east of the point where it would have fallen if the earth were not rotating.

This rotation of the earth produces other effects as well. The Earth is not spherical but has an "equatorial bulge", just like people. That equatorial bulge makes the axis of the Earth wobble, so that the north pole is not always pointed to the same part of the sky. Because of this slow change, in about 14,000 years the bright star Vega will be the pole star, instead of the present Polaris.

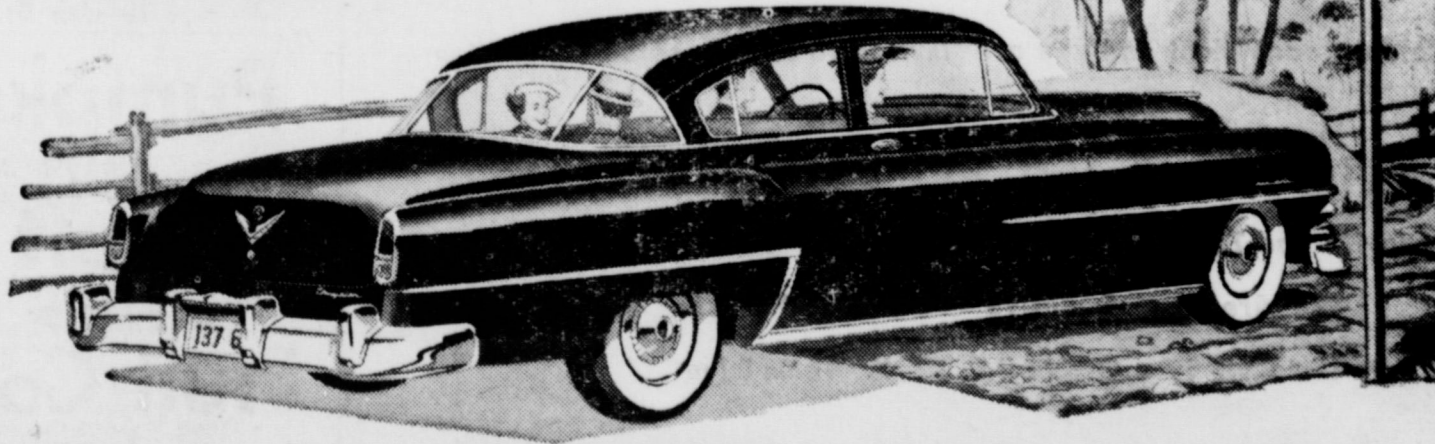

Atabrine Is Used To Treat Tapeworm

CHICAGO — Quinacrine hydrochloride (atabrine, trademark)—used during World War II as an antimalarial agent—has proved of value in the treatment of tapeworm.

Eleven persons suffering from tapeworm were given the drug, reported Drs. William A. Sodeman and Rodney C. Jung, of the School of Medicine, Tulane University of Louisiana, New Orleans. It was effective in 10 of the cases on the initial trial, and in the 11th when treatment was repeated, they stated.

The patients were given doses ranging from 0.6 to 1.2 grams at the rate of two 0.1 gram tablets every five minutes with a little water until the entire amount was taken. If the patient reacted to the drug by vomiting and nausea, sodium bicarbonate was added to the water when the medication was repeated.

In the treatment of tapeworm, the doctors said, the prompt action of quinacrine and the benign character of the toxic reaction have established it in their opinion as the drug of choice.

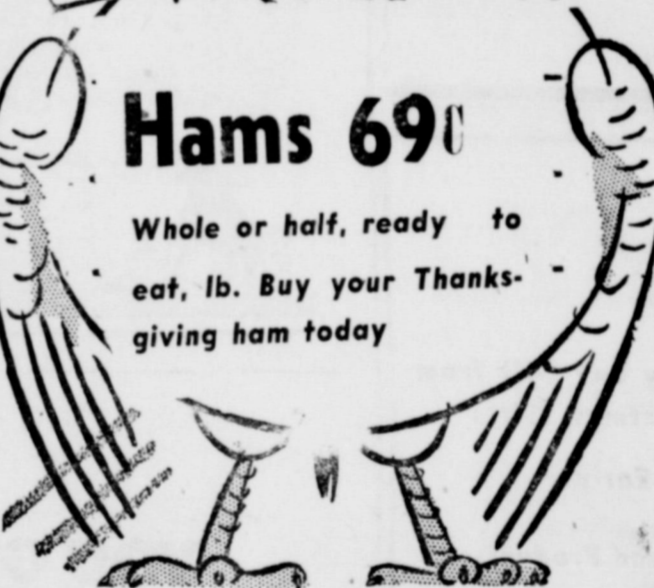
