## Lynn County Is Still "Demo" By Large Measure

O'Donnell and Lynn county "went democratic" with a surge in the general election Tuesday, and gave President Roosevelt a thumping majority over his Republican opponent, Wendell Willkie.

J. E. McDonald, state agricultural head, who was rebuked with votes in Lynn county and his opponent, Bill Corry, given a larger total. A hurried campaign in favor of Corry was waged in Lynn county by various persons and the action produced results.

Willkie proved to be the banner Republican stronghold in the county. It registered 43 votes for Willkie against 209 for Roosevelt.

New Home stands second in the Republican list, polling 40 votes for Willkie to 219 for Roosevelt.

At O'Donnell Willkie received 38 votes but Roosevelt piled up a total of 476, beating the big electric power mogul by a majority of 12½ to 1.

West Point is entitled to the honor of being crowned as the banner Democratic box in the county, since it cast 40 votes for the head of the Democratic ticket and not one for the Republican candidate, Wendell Willkie.

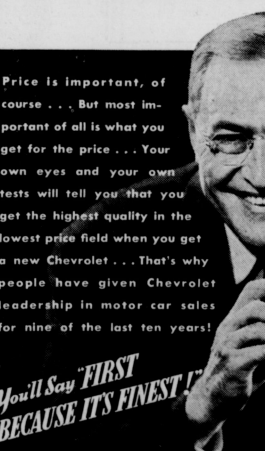

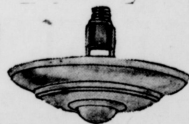
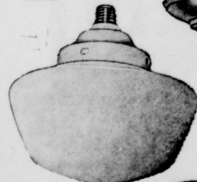
