Club women of the county will supervise the making of the mattresses, with our agent, Miss Maurine McNatt directing activities.

Persons whose incomes in 1939 was under \$400, with half of that amount from agricultural sources, are eligible for a mattress. A minimum of 12 bales of cotton, enough for 10 mattresses each, and 10 yards of ticking for each mattress, must comprise the original order.

Forms on which applications are to be made, were distributed. The county Agricultural Adjustment administration committee will pass on eligibility of applications. Each family will be furnished with the cotton and ticking and will be shown how to make a mattress. Communities will arrange for location for the work to be done.

The commissioner pointed out that persons eligible for these mattresses are not necessarily required to be relief clients, and that 120 such clients are necessary for the establishment of the project. C. A.
