

The Third Time The Anti-Trust Lawyers Were Wrong!

Is it a crime to give people more good food for their money?

What Has Gone Before

Today's ad is the third in a series telling about times the anti-trust lawyers made serious and damaging charges against A&P that the courts decided were not true.

In the first ad in this series we told you about the time the anti-trust lawyers charged that A&P, and other good American citizens, conspired to fix the price of bread in Washington.

These charges were false.

That was the time Federal Judge T. Alan Goldsborough instructed the jury to bring in a verdict of "not guilty".

It was the time he said to the anti-trust lawyers:

"If you were to show this record to any experienced trial lawyer in the world, he would tell you that there was not any evidence at all.

"Honestly, I have never in my over forty years' experience seen tried a case that was as absolutely devoid of evidence as this. That is the honest truth. I have never seen one like it."

But that was not the only time the anti-trust lawyers made such serious "allegations" against A&P which were false.

In our second ad we told you about the time in Wilson, North Carolina, they charged A&P's fresh fruit and vegetable buying subsidiary, and other good American citizens, with conspiring to fix and depress prices paid farmers for potatoes in North Carolina, Virginia and Maryland.

Here again, as in the Washington bread case, the charges were false.

This was the time Federal Judge C. C. Wyche directed the jury to bring in a verdict of "not guilty".

It was the time he said to the anti-trust lawyers:

"I have studied this case from the very outset. In my opinion there is no testimony produced from which it can reasonably be inferred that the defendants entered into a combination to depress or lower the price of potatoes.

"I might say that I never tried a case in my life where a greater effort, more work, more investigation had been done, combing almost with a fine-tooth comb to gather evidence, as was done in this case.

"But, as was said a long time ago, you can't make brick without straw, and you can't make a case without facts."

So here were two cases in which the anti-trust lawyers made seriously damaging charges against A&P, in which the judge decided that there were no facts to support those charges.

Today, we want to tell you about the third time—this time in Dallas, Texas—the court decided against the anti-trust lawyers.

The Dallas Anti-Trust Suit

In 1942 the anti-trust lawyers went out to Dallas, Texas, 1,400 miles from the homes of most of the defendants, and instigated criminal charges against A&P.

About this case one thing was sure.

Their previous experience did not deter the anti-trust lawyers from making more inflammatory and damaging allegations, just as they had done before.

They made practically the same allegations they are making today.

Federal Judge W. H. Atwell ruled that the case should not even be tried. He said that the indictment contained inflammatory statements that he would not permit to be presented to a jury.

Judge Atwell said to the anti-trust lawyers:

"If I thought I was presiding over a court and that I might have to sentence some person because he was a great big fellow, or because he was a Lilliputian, I would feel like resigning. God knows we don't want it ever to occur in America that the size is going to determine whether a man is guilty or innocent."

Judge Atwell also said to the anti-trust lawyers:

"If the indictment is not good then it is better to find out before an expensive trial than it is after an expensive trial. I do not think it is good, and thinking that, it is my duty to sustain the demurrers and motion to quash."

In short, Federal Judge Atwell threw the anti-trust lawyers and their case right out of his court.

So that makes three times that the anti-trust lawyers made damaging allegations against A&P. In two of these cases federal judges said they were all wrong. In the third case a federal judge said that the indictment was inflammatory and he would not even permit the case to be tried.

The anti-trust lawyers were not satisfied with the Dallas decision.

Neither were they satisfied with the two other decisions in which federal courts administered stinging rebukes to them.

They were still determined to destroy A&P.

In our next ad we will tell you how they continued their campaign in this case in the Circuit Court of Appeals and subsequent proceedings.

We will show you how, once again, they disagreed with the courts.

Everything that has happened since this suit was filed proves that the American people don't want A&P destroyed.

A deluge of letters from people in all walks of life and thousands of editorials in newspapers and magazines convince us that the public has faith in A&P.

County Agent's Column

Tractor Maintenance

This is a good time of the year to make general repairs on farm tractors and machinery. A good job now during the slack season will save many hours during the season when time will make a difference. The following is a systematic method of checking tractors that can be used:

1. Tractor safety—one of the first things to look for is the safety of the tractor. Are there any loose parts which might impair the safety of the tractor operator?
2. Operator's manual—a study of the operator's manual will in many cases give proper methods of making repairs.
3. Air cleaner service — periodic air cleaner service is a necessity.
4. Spark plug wiring and battery system—clean plugs and set gaps properly. Clean battery and check water.
5. Cooling system—perhaps a flushing out of the radiator would prevent the tractor from running hot during the coming summer.
6. Fuel intake and carburetion—a point of vital importance. Carburetor should be properly adjusted.
7. Engine lubrication—this is a good time to flush out the engine, crank case and transmission housing.
8. General lubrication—packing front wheel bearings now will save time in the spring.

Brahma-Hereford Crosses
Stockman are always arguing

whether the straight Hereford or the hereford cross with something else will make the better calf. The Texas Experiment Station at Lufkin has released some figures that show that the Brahma-Hereford crosses continue to be heavier in weight for age that grade Herefords. A particular advantage was shown in the weight and flesh of calves mothered by half and quarterblood Brahma-Hereford cows.

Calves out of Hereford cows by Brahma and by Hereford bulls weighed about the same at both 2 weeks and weaning ages. Calves out of 1/2 Brahma-1/2 Hereford cows by the same Hereford bull weighed the same at two weeks but were 153 lbs. heavier at weaning. The calves out of 1/4 Brahma-3/4 Hereford cows, also by the same Hereford bull, were about 8 pounds heavier at 2 weeks and 74 pounds heavier at weaning than the straight Hereford calves, but 80 pounds lighter at weaning than those out of the half-blood cows.

For detailed figures on this experiment you can contact the county agent. These experiments started in 1944 and are still being carried on. Figures are in the office on the weights of calves out of various breeds and crosses of breeds.

HEALTH FACTS
Solution of the nation's dental problems lies in making dental health education and dental care available to every child, said Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer.

He said it is possible to prevent loss of teeth from decay if a person starts early in life to follow these simple rules:

1. Early and frequent examination of the mouth by a dentist.
2. Early treatment of small cavities and other dental defects.
3. Proper diet with refined sugars held to a minimum.
4. Proper brushing of teeth after eating.

A child should be taken to the dentist shortly after the last of his first teeth appear at about the age of two, he declared. Frequent examinations and treatment of dental defects by dentists should follow, he added.

Experiments are under way in research laboratories to find the answer to dental decay and other dental diseases, he said, adding:

"It has been learned that the very active element, flourine, can be used to curb dental decay to a large degree. Dentists are now applying a solution of sodium fluoride to the teeth of their child patients as a routine dental treatment.

"To improve the dental health of the children of this country, each community, through coordinated group activity, should assume its responsibility in putting an adequate dental health program into operation to meet adequately the needs of our children."



SOCIAL SECURITY LAWS ON LIMITATIONS SAME

The \$3,000.00 limitation on wages for social security purposes has not been changed, according to a statement released today by Ralph T. Fisher, manager of the Abilene office of the Social Security Administration.

The fact that the social security tax advanced from 1% to 1 1/2% each from the employer and the employee, effective Jan. 1, 1950, has caused some employers to inquire if the law has been changed to tax more than the first \$3,000.00 in wages paid to an employee in a year.

"The law that limits taxable wages to the first \$3,000.00 in wages paid by an employer to each employee is still in effect," Fisher said, "and only an Act of Congress will change the law pertaining to the maximum wages to be taxed."

Fisher pointed out that all inquiries regarding social security tax matters should be referred to the Collector of Internal Revenue, and that all questions about old-age and survivors insurance benefits should be directed to the social security office located at 308 Post Office Building, Abilene, Texas.

New Rates FOR HAULING TRASH

EFFECTIVE MARCH 1, 1950

Rates for Sanitation Service in Baird Will Be As Follows:

RESIDENTS - per month - 50c
BUSINESS FIRMS - per month - \$2.00

The amount paid into the Sanitation Fund during the past five years has been far below the cost of rendering the service. For example, the following figures were compiled to show how income and expenses have been over a period of the past seven months: Income totaled \$1,034.50. Total expenditure \$1,671.46, which included \$124.91 for equipment and repairs, \$166.95 for gasoline and oil, \$1,125.00 for labor, and \$254.60 for work at the dump ground.

As can be seen, the costs of maintaining the trash haul has been held to the very minimum. Many other towns in Baird's class pay a much higher rate for this service. The usual fee is \$1.00 for residents and \$3.00 for business firms for the same service rendered. The new 50 cents and two dollar rate is still very low, but should be sufficient to continue the service that has been established. The new rate will go into effect on March 1st, but will not appear on the statements until April 1st, 1950.

We take this opportunity to thank all citizens who have given their cooperation and helpful suggestions in making Baird a cleaner, better town. It is only by the sincere desire of the citizenship that a town can be made better.

- EDITORIAL -

WE ARE ON OUR WAY

With progress that is being made on the new lake, Baird is at the threshold of a new era. Many people are watching the lake project closely, and when bids are awarded on February 17th, other steps will be taken for the town's general improvement. Some people are buying property here and others are planning to build homes and business houses on that happy day when Baird will have an abundant supply of good water.

The demand for rent houses in Baird has been serious for some time, but there seemed to be no one with the money who wanted to invest in Baird rent property. Several people are ready to do something about this situation as soon as the lake is built. Baird is ripe for a big real estate project or two right now. A new subdivision, a general home building program is in order.

The lack of water has been Baird's drawback all through the years, but with the completion of the new lake the town is bound to go forward at a rapid pace. We have heard the question asked: How would more people live in Baird? The opportunities here are more than one would think. A business survey would surprise the most of us as to the opportunities that are all around us.

A&P CONTENDS LAWYERS USING FALSE CHARGES

Anti-Trust Lawyers are using charges court rejected as false, A&P contends:

Inflammatory and damaging allegations made in a suit against the Great Atlantic & Pacific Tea Co. at Dallas, Texas, were so baseless that the Federal Judge "threw the Anti-Trust lawyers and their case right out of his court," the company is saying in advertisement this week. The advertisement scheduled for publication in 2,500 newspapers throughout the nation, was the third in a series discussing former court cases where Federal judges found there was no evidence against the company and administered stinging rebukes to the Anti-Trust lawyers. In the Dallas anti-trust suit, the ad states, the anti-trust lawyers "made practically the same allegations they are making today" in their current suit to break up the 90 year old food store-chain. Federal Judge W. H. Atwell, the ad states, ruled that the Dallas case "should not even be tried" because the indictment "contained inflammatory statements he would not allow to be presented to a jury."

"If I thought I was presiding over a court and that I might have to sentence some person because he was a great big fellow, or because he was a lilliputian, I would feel like resigning," the ad quotes Judge Atwell. "God knows we don't want it ever to occur in America that the size is going to determine whether a man is guilty or innocent."

Judge Atwell, the ad also says, told the anti-trust lawyers "if the indictment is not good then it is better to find out before an expensive trial than it is after an expensive trial. I do not think it is good, and thinking that, it is my duty to sustain the demurrers and motion to quash."

Captioned "The third time the anti-trust lawyers were wrong," the advertisement reviews two other actions — The Washington, D. C. bread case and the Wilson, N. C. potato case — in which Federal Judges found no evidence to support "damaging" charges brought by anti-trust lawyers against A&P.

The anti-trust lawyers are "still determined to destroy A&P," the ad continues, but it adds, "Everything that has happened since this suit was filed proves that the American people don't want A&P destroyed." The ad cites how supplies, unions, competitors, newspapers through editorials and people "in all walks of life" have rallied to A & P's support.

"The housewives of this nation, whose patronage has made this company big, are buying from us in increasing numbers and increasing volume," the ad says. "Apparently most Americans do not want to let the anti-trust lawyers in Washing-

ton blow the whistle on any businessman who does a better and more efficient job and grows big in the process. "No one can make them believe it is a crime to try to sell the best quality food at the lowest possible price."

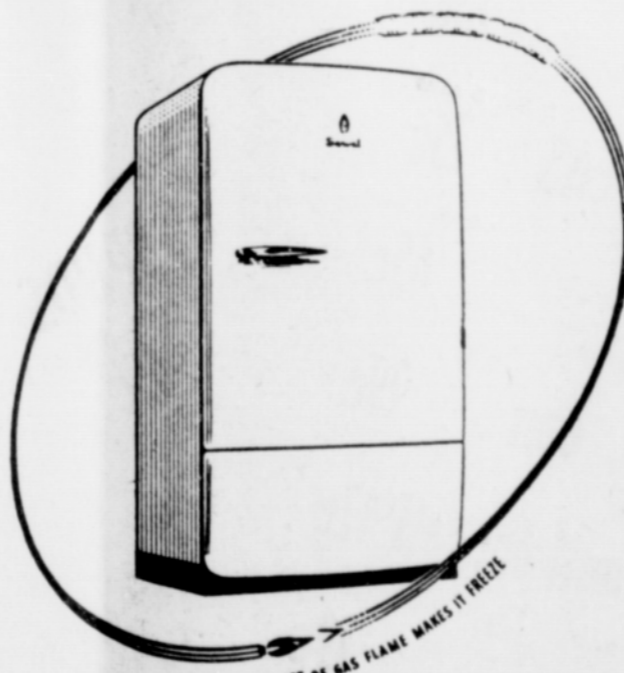
