## Bond Issues Defeated By Large Majority

### Baptist Meeting Under Way At Berry Flat

A big Baptist meeting is under way at Berry Flat and the people out that way are taking great interest in the services. The Garrison-Ogden Evangelists are conducting the services in a large tent. The Berry Flat meeting will run until August 26th, when the tent will be moved to O'Donnell and a revival of two-weeks duration will be conducted by these able evangelists.

It is said that the song service at Berry Flat is especially good, being under the leadership of a capable musician and singer. Everybody invited to attend these services.

### Board of Equalization To Meet August 20

The Board of Equalization for the O'Donnell Independent School District will be in session on the 20th of this month, notices to this effect are being mailed out to those whom the board believes the rendition of their property is too low.

The taxable values of the district amount, under the present rendition, to \$2,103,000, the rendition last year being \$1,460,000, or an increase of \$643,000.

This increase in property values show that O'Donnell is stepping right along.

### Nazarene Meeting To Be Held At Plainview

The members of the Plainview Nazarene church announce that Rev. J. A. and Nora Pruett of Roby, will conduct a revival meeting at the school house beginning on Thursday night, August 18, and will run two weeks. They invite all to attend the services.

Rev. C. C. Montandan will preach at the Nazarene church Saturday night, Sunday and Sunday night. All are invited to attend.

Fifty-six voters of O'Donnell signified their desires for waterworks and street drainage at the election Wednesday and ninety-four made it plain by their voting that they did not want the improvements, the vote on both bond issues receiving the same number of yeas and nays.

Very little pre election interest was manifested either way and the vote was considerably less than half of the total voting strength of the town.

Some day O'Donnell will have waterworks and street drainage, but Wednesday's election shows that the majority is not ready for it.

### Increased Business Demands Expansion

Taylor Brothers, who operate the Top and Curtain Shop, announce that they will enter into a general repair and garage business in connection with the top, curtain and painting business, and will install a free air and gasoline filling station. Miss Munk had been ill for about three months and leakage of the heart was said to have been the immediate cause of her death.

The truck is being furnished by C. I. Kuykendall of the Lynn County Motor Company and will be fitted for the comfort of the boys on the road. It is planned for the truck to leave here Monday, and the boys to spend the night in Lubbock the guests of the Boy Scouts of that place, and the next night will be spent at Roswell, N. M., and from here it is an easy drive to the camp. It is estimated that around 150 scouts will attend the encampment. E. M. Wilder will accompany the boys on the truck and will have them under his charge until they reach camp.

## District Court to Meet in Tahoka September 21

### Church of Christ Calls New Pastor

At a meeting of the members of the Church of Christ held this week it was decided to offer the pastorate of the church to Elder W. A. Kercheville of Breckenridge, which he accepted and will move here with his family and take charge of the church on October 1st.

Elder Kercheville will preach at the O'Donnell church two Sundays each month, giving the other Sundays to rural churches. He was pastor of the O'Donnell church before moving to Breckenridge and is considered one of the strongest preachers in the Church of Christ in West Texas and is popular with all the people in Dawson and Lynn counties and the local church was very fortunate in securing the services of such an able preacher.

### Berry Davis Sells Gin to Boone

A deal of considerable importance was made recently when Berry Davis sold his ginning plant to J. D. Boone of Roswell, N. M. The gin will be under the management of Fred Henderson, also of Roswell, who is now on the ground getting the plant ready for the big crop this fall.

Mr. Davis operated this gin only one season, but during that time proved his ability as a gin man and gave a service that made him many friends among the farmers. He states that he would not trade O'Donnell for any country and will continue to reside here and will buy cotton next fall and winter.

Mrs. J. E. Baker was quite ill first of the week but is reported as improving at this time.

District Court in the newly formed district will function for the first time in Lynn county on the fourth Monday in September after the fourth Monday in August which will be the 21st day of the month. This judicial district was created by an act of the last legislature and is known as the 106 and is comprised of the counties of Lynn, Terry, Dawson, Gaines, Yoakum and Garza.

The plums of appointment of Judge and Attorney of the new district fell into the laps of two Lamesa lawyers, the judgeship going to Judge Gordon B. McGuire and that of district attorney fell to A. W. Gibson, both received notices of their appointment on Thursday of last week. Judge McGuire came to Lamesa from Dallas about eleven years ago and is regarded by the bar as an able judge of law. He served the 72nd district as district attorney and made an enviable record during his incumbency of office.

Attorney Gibson has only been a resident of Lamesa a few months, moving to that city from Crosbyton. He is a seasoned lawyer and was attorney for several large oil companies before moving to this district.

All processes issued and recognizances made, and all grand and petit juries drawn before the act creating this district will be valid for and returnable to the next succeeding terms of the District Court of the counties embraced as though issued and served for such terms and returnable to and drawn for the same. The first term of court in the new 106 District will be held in Brownfield during this month, the court going from there to Tahoka.

The date for the second term of court for Lynn county has been fixed for the third Monday after the third Monday in January.
