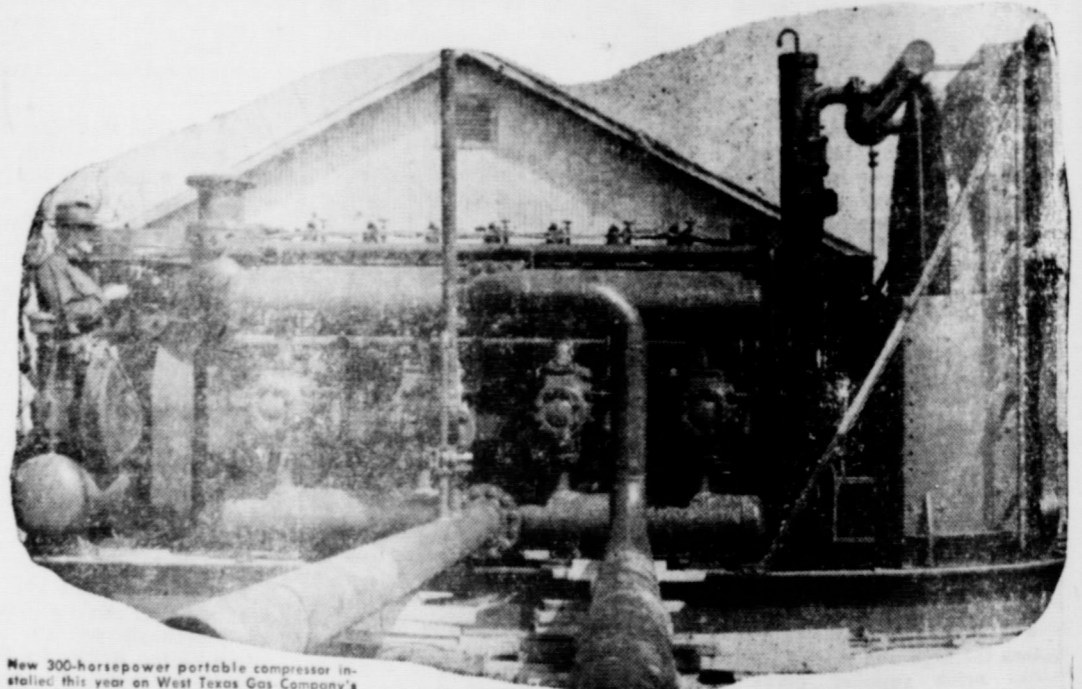

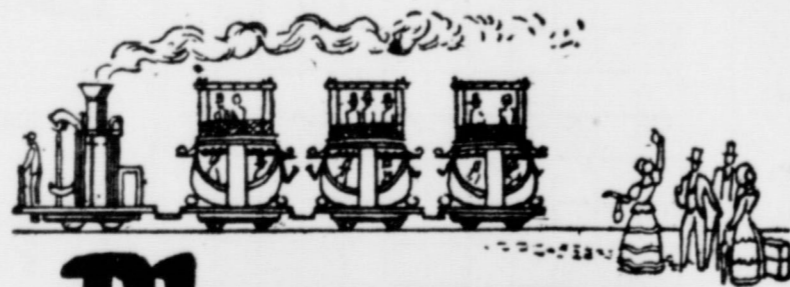

Good Clean Pasture Helps Poultry Men
Home Grown Feeds Cut Operating Cost

Good clean pasture and plenty of home grown feeds for your pullets crop pays dividends in more eggs, lower production costs and bigger poultry profits. The use of range shelters, range feeders and barrel waterers makes such a program easily possible. Missouri university tests show that pullets on well-fertilized alfalfa pasture consumed 17 per cent less feed than birds on bare range. The pasture-fed pullets needed less feed for each pound of gain. Birds on clean pasture were healthier

and more energetic. Mortality rate was lower and there were fewer culls. Out of 100 pullets at four weeks of age, 94 of the alfalfa-ranged birds later went into the laying house, compared to 70 of those raised on bare ground. Purdue university tests showed that ladino clover with corn and small grains provided a complete ration for laying flocks.

Getting good pasture and a cheap and plentiful supply of grain is a matter of putting farm soil in shape to produce bigger yields per acre. For this you need a rotation in which deep-rooted legumes and grasses are keystone. You need to build up the organic matter supply via plowed-under legumes, crop residues and manure. You need to feed the soil a good ration of plant nutrients, so it, in turn, can feed the crops. In such a program, fertilizer is an important member of the soil-building team.

At current prices, eggs will buy nearly twice as much fertilizer as 10 years ago. It takes only 90 dozen eggs to buy a ton of 3-12-12 fertilizer today, whereas it took 170 dozen back in 1939.

A bucket spray pump, equipped with a four foot extension rod and at least 15 feet of hose, is satisfactory for a few fruit trees around the home but for spraying orchards up to 300 trees, a barrel spray pump which develops from 125 to 150 lbs pressure is more practical

Owners of the 55,000 horses and mules on Maryland farms have been urged to "check intake valves, remove carbon from the cylinders, and adjust the carburetor."

Those terms aren't as mixed as one might think. Joseph M. Vial, extension animal husbandman, explained that a horse's mouth and teeth may be compared to intake valves on a tractor. The teeth need to be floated (just as the intake valve needs to be properly seated) if they are to meet evenly and let the horse chew his feed properly.

Just as tractors are troubled with carbon in the cylinders, horses may have trouble with internal parasites. These may be removed by any competent veterinarian and the horse will be a better worker during the coming summer.

The carburetor on the tractor adjusts fuel supply to the work load. For horses, this is accomplished by getting them in proper condition before the heavy work load comes. Vial recommends this be done by "feeding the horse a handful of oil meal with his grain at this time of year to keep him in good condition and by giving him as many jobs to do as possible; such as spreading manure or hauling logs."

Other recommendations include: "Keep water in his cooling system, keep his tires in good condition by having him properly shod and see that his harness fits."

AROUND THE HOUSE

Dipping easters in melted paraffin before placing them under tables and chairs will keep them from coming loose so often.

To squeeze that extra drop of juice out of a lemon, use an ordinary pair of pliers.

If cheese is too soft to grate, soften it a little more in a warm place and press through a coarse strainer.

Purse mirrors placed under individual candle holders are attractive insurance against dripping or spilled tallow.

Unused marshmallows will stay fresh after the box has been opened if they are kept in the bread box.

Mix odds and ends of left-over paint together and use to paint under-side of porch, steps, clothes props, etc. Before putting air-tight cover on left-over paint, pour a little turpentine over the paint. This helps against "skinning" or drying out.

To give an illusion of greater size to a small room, paint one or more of the walls a different color; or, paint one wall and paper the others.

When carpeting reaches all the way to the walls, use vacuum around baseboard frequently—moths love to lay eggs in such spots.

Use an old powder puff when applying shoe polish: it conserves useful cloth, does not smear fingers, and fits nicely into can for future use.

Try tomato juice to remove stains from washable materials.

Apply a thin coat of sealer to wire clotheslines to keep them from rusting and make them much easier to clean.

Wash fluffy pile bedroom slippers—using same method as for chenille robes, etc.—Do not wring: squeeze gently and shake occasionally while drying: when dry, brush vigorously to bring up nap.

Make the sandwich loaf the night before; get together the ingredients for the cool drink and refrigerate them, too. When serving time arrives you have simply to bring things together.

For a youngsters' party, serve glamorized milk drinks and simple cookies, baked in advance. Or, give them sandwiches with the beverage because these, too, may be made in the morning for an afternoon party, if they are wrapped in waxed paper and refrigerated.

A glorious cake makes an excellent duet for a punch bowl. For a shower you might try a refrigerated

type because women love them dearly and they are just a little bit more fancy than a baked cake.

IF YOU'RE planning to serve punch, make fruited ice cubes in advance.

Squeeze the fruit juices and place them in separate glass jars in the refrigerator. When party time arrives, simply put them all together in a large bowl or a pretty pitcher and the beverage part of your party is well under control.

Orange Punch (Serves 15)
1 pint orange juice
1 pint orange sherbet
1 pint vanilla ice cream
1 pint ginger ale

Beat orange juice, sherbet and ice cream with a rotary beater. Add ginger ale and stir thoroughly. Serve at once from punch bowl.

Fruit Punch (Makes 1 gallon)
1 quart strong tea
1 cup lemon juice, strained
1 cup orange juice, strained
1 cup sugar
3 cups grape or cranberry juice
1 quart water
1 pint ginger ale

Mix tea, fruit juices, water and sugar; chill. Just before serving add ginger ale and pour over a large piece of ice in a punch bowl. Garnish the punch with sprigs of mint, maraschino cherries, slices of lemons and oranges.

HERE'S AN IDEAL recipe for punch for the youngsters:
Pineapple Milk Punch (Serves 6)
3 cups cold milk

LYNN SAYS:
Simple Sandwiches Make Good Refreshments

Combine 1/2 pound of cottage cheese with a dash of onion juice, salt, pepper and two tablespoons of chopped cucumber or onion. This is enough for eight full sized sandwiches.

Cream cheese softened with mayonnaise, then mixed with chopped, salted almonds and a few chopped maraschino cherries make dainty little sandwiches.



A bowl of punch, decorated with slices of lemon, orange and sprigs of mint, makes an easy and festive way to entertain a crowd. Cookies, cake or sandwiches may be served with the punch to complete the party fare.

2 cups cold pineapple juice
3/4 cup coffee cream
1/4 cup sugar
1 1/2 teaspoons lemon juice
Pinch of salt
12 drops peppermint extract

Combine all ingredients in a shaker or beat with a rotary beater until foamy. Pour into tall glasses; garnish with a sprig of mint and serve immediately.

Just the sight of these glasses of fruit ice cream float are enough to make youngsters cheer. The recipe suggests cherries but other kinds of fruit such as strawberries, raspberries or blackberries may be used in place of cherries.

Sandwich Loaf (Serves 8-10)

1 1-pound loaf unsliced bread
Butter
1 1/2 cups ham salad
1 1/2 cups egg salad
1 cup red jelly such as currant
8 ounces cream cheese

Trim all crust from bread. Cut loaf of bread into four lengthwise slices. Butter each side which filling will touch. On the first bottom slice place egg salad, top with bread slice; cover top of that slice with ham salad. Top with another slice and cover that with jelly. Top with slice of bread; wrap loaf in waxed paper and place a weight such as a bread board on it. Chill in refrigerator for several hours. Then unwrap and cover whole loaf with cream cheese which has been softened with cream and tinted pale green. Save a bit of the cream cheese and tint this pink or yellow and force through pastry tube to make rosettes to decorate loaf.

***Chocolate Cake (Makes 2 9-inch layers)**
3 ounces unsweetened chocolate
1/2 cup hot water
1/2 cup shortening
1 1/2 cup sugar
3 eggs
2 cups sifted flour
1/4 teaspoon soda
1/4 teaspoon salt
3 teaspoons baking powder
1 cup buttermilk
1 teaspoon vanilla

Cut chocolate in pieces. Add hot water, cook and stir over a low flame until a thick smooth paste is formed. Cool. Cream together sugar and shortening. Beat eggs until creamy and add to sugar-fat mixture. Blend in chocolate. Sift together the dry ingredients, then add to the first mixture alternately with buttermilk. Fold in vanilla. Bake in two nine-inch greased pans in a moderate (350°) oven for 25 minutes.

Frost with chocolate icing between, on top and sides. Sprinkle with chopped nuts, if desired.

This chocolate cake may also be frosted with Seven-Minute icing and sprinkled with crushed peppermint stick candy.

To make a very festive cake, frost with sweetened, whipped cream and sprinkle the top with shaved, unsweetened chocolate.

Tried Cole slaw sandwiches? Minted the cabbage fine, and have sufficient salad dressing in it to moisten it for spreading. Add some chopped bacon for flavor and spread on whole wheat bread.

Mix ground leftover meat with finely shredded carrots and chopped hard-cooked eggs. Add enough mayonnaise for easy spreading and serve on rye bread.

Another filling that calls for seconds uses crushed peanut brittle with enough softened butter to make a nice spread for sandwiches.

The Lord's Supper

Lesson for May 22, 1949

LET US CLEAR UP some very common misunderstandings of what the Christian religion is. Some (both enemies and friends) think it consists in turning one's back on the world, living in a sort of happy wonderland where the evil of the world is altogether shut out and forgotten.

Another notion is that Christianity presents an angry God (or one who can very easily be made angry) laying down the law to mankind. Another is that Christianity is a purely individual affair. And still another is that Christian religion consists of the teachings of Jesus and that is all it is. Every one of these misunderstandings vanishes in the light that shines around the Lord's Supper.

On that last night, dark forces were closing in on him. One of his own circle would betray him. Yet it was in that sort of atmosphere, heavy with betrayal and hatred, that Jesus began this sacrament of faith, hope and love.

The true Christian does not live in a fool's paradise, he does not imagine that everything is lovely in the nicest possible words. The sacrament which is the heart of his worship is itself a reminder of the ugliness of the world which man's sin creates.

Blessing
"AND HE BLESSED the bread . . ." If Christianity consisted mainly of condemning wickedness and denouncing sinners, then at the center of our worship we would have some symbol of dread and awe, like fire and brimstone, a consuming flame.

But no—at the heart of our worship is a thing as simple, plain and friendly as a loaf of bread, bread on which the blessing of God has been asked. Blessing, not cursing; invitation, not threatening, is at the heart of our religion.

Whenever you see some one whose chief idea of being a "good Christian" is going around proclaiming the meanness of the world, cawing at everybody and everything.

Breaking
"AND BROKE IT, and gave . . ." Artists have tried in a single picture to express the meaning of Christianity. Some of the pictures are beautiful, but many of them miss an important truth. What shall it be? A picture of a shipwrecked woman clinging to a rock? Of a saint praying in a long solitary vigil? These leave out something vital. For Christianity is a fellowship. No Christian is complete by himself.

At the heart of our religion is a Communion. Few if any Protestant churches allow any one even a minister, to give the Holy Communion to himself, by himself.

The true Christian never finds himself, his true self, alone; only in fellowship. A Christian belongs with other Christians as much as one coal in a bed of coals belongs with all the rest.

Blood
JESUS TEACHINGS are so important, so full of wisdom and of living power, that often some one will say that Jesus was a teacher and only a teacher, and that following his teachings is all that Christianity is. Jesus did not think of it in this way.

True, his teaching is of the utmost importance; but that was not and is not all. As Middleton Murry said years ago, Jesus was the only teacher who has died for his teaching. But he did more than that; he died for those he taught.

The cup at the Holy Communion reminds every one who partakes of it that Christ was not only a teacher, he was a sacrifice.

FIRST AID to the AILING HOUSE

Care of Floors

Question: A few months ago I had all the floors sanded, filled and varnished. I would like to wash them but have been advised not to use water, as it discolors floors. Please advise.

Answer: The manufacturers of hardwood flooring do not, as a rule, approve of using water on such flooring. As your floors have been so recently varnished, it should be fairly easy to clean them with some of the special cleaning preparations intended for this purpose. Or you can clean them by wiping with cloths damp with turpentine. Consult your hardware dealer. First take up the loose dust in the usual way.

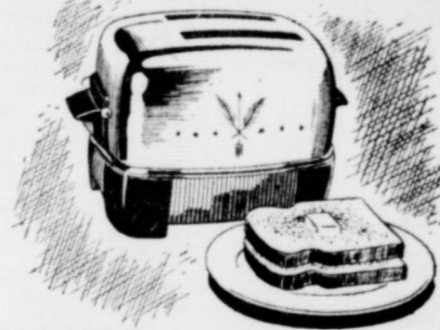
