

groups of almost every legislature re not missing from the 55th.

In fact, recent years have seen new methods developed by these groups in their attempts to encourage action on bills favorable to their own purposes

One of the current pressure groups working on the House and Senate is the representation of the municipal policemen and firemen. This group has presented a strong

front by entering the legislative halls in goodly numbers, persistent ly plugging for the flood of wage, longevity and hour bills introduced in both the House and Senate.

Opposing these efforts on the part of the policemen and firemen is the League of Texas Municipalities. The cities claim that favorable response by the legislature to the pressure group on wage and hour bills would place the lawmakers in the position of dictating to home worders other than those who would benefit under the bills.

Haroid R. Downs, president of the League of Tevras President. the League of Texas Municipalities, has charged that legislative spon-sors of the firemen and policemen bills are "setting themselves up as superduper city councilmen at a five million dollar annual expense to the taxpayers of 71 cities."
