National Parks Ready For '46 Travel Rush

America is hitting the vacation trail this spring and summer and the crowds in the national parks are expected to be the greatest in their history. Some of the parks are already open, and all of them will be operating at full schedule by June, says Newton B. Drury, director of the National Park Service.

Lodges and hotels which have been closed for three years are being reconitioned. New staffs are being recruited and trained for the summer season.

Few of the sightseeing busses used in the national parks were suitable for war use, so most of the fleets are still intact.

Yellowstone, Yosemite, Grand Canyon and Glacier national parks will have complete sightseeing services.

It is expected that enough manpower will be available to restore full service in the other parks of the system.

Some reconitioning work may take more than six months.

Staffs may not be as complete and skilled as they were before 1941, but the concessionaires stated their plans are being rushed and they have high hopes of giving good service by June.

More than \$500,000 for reconitioning the cabins, lodges and cafeterias in Grand Canyon, Bryce and Zion national parks and at Cedar Breaks national monument is being spent by the Union Pacific railroad, which operates the facilities in these parks.

The renovation program also includes purchase of 22 new 29-passenger busses and a fleet of 9-passenger sedans for charter service.

The prewar five-day all-expense tours through all the parks and

shorter tours in Zion, Bryce and Grand Canyon will be resumed.

Ranger crews maintained by the national park system during the war years for vital conservation work will have their ranks augmented to protect the parks' natural beauties and resources.

They'll also protect the crowds, who often take chances in the unfamiliar wilds.

An intensive road-building and road-improvement program is planned by the department of the interior, continuing through 1946 and 1947, to meet the influx of automobile tourists who will follow in the wake of new car production.

While the national parks are always free and open, the usual tourist facilities were suspended during the war. Park attendance dropped from a high of 21,050,426 visitors in 1941 to a new low of 6,968,749 in 1943.

That the 1946 total will surpass the attendance of 1941 is indicated by the rush of late fall and winter visitors which started immediately after V-J Day.

Shenandoah national park, in Virginia's Blue Ridge mountains, was virtually isolated during gas rationing, but on the Sunday following the surrender of Japan four cars a minute were checked in at the park.

Eastern Parks Offer Variety To The Tourist

The Shenandoah and Smoky mountains national parks offer an unsurpassed beauty treat to mid-westerners whose previous vacations have shown them the wonders of the Rockies.

Great Smoky mountains national park embraces 460,000 acres, of which 200,000 are still covered by primeval forests. The peaks and ridges of the range, rising above 6,000 feet, and almost always veiled in mist, are the starting point of some 600 miles of trout streams.

The north entrance to the park is 30 miles southeast of Knoxville, Tenn., making it easily accessible by all types of transportation. Busses make two round trips from Knoxville through the park daily. There are two camp grounds in the park, and hotel and tourist camp facilities are available in nearby cities and towns and at Knoxville and Asheville.

Blue Ridge national parkway, a 405-mile strip of parkland connecting the Great Smoky mountains and Shenandoah national parks, will eventually have a modern highway running its entire length. U. S. route 11 provides an almost direct connection between the two parks at present.

A more scenic approach to Shenandoah from north of Roanoke, Va., is along the completed portion of the parkway, which connects with Skyline drive running the entire length of the park along the crest of the Blue Ridge.

The Skyline drive is 107 miles long, with parking areas, picnic grounds and a camping area along its length. Visitors may enjoy the magnificent scenery of the Shenandoah valley's fertile farmlands on the west and the rolling hills of Piedmont plateau on the east.

Oregon Caves Are Opened

GRANTS PASS, ORE.—The Oregon caves recreational area near here, which were closed during the war years, will reopen late in May under the national park service.

Harold B. Say has been appointed general manager of the resort. The caverns were discovered in 1874 when Elijah Davidson, an early settler, shot at a bear. The wounded bear disappeared into a hole in the mountainside, and Davidson followed with a pitch torch to find a great underground world.

Before the war, increasing thousands each year were taking the 15-mile drive to the caves up through the timbered Siskiyou mountains from the Redwood highway.

The weird and beautiful underground chambers and the Swiss chalet lodge, in a canyon at the mouth of the caves, are expected to break all attendance records as the travel season opens for 1946.

VETS ARE LUCKY Colonial Mansion Used by GI Couples at University

NEW YORK CITY.—Three couples from Midwestern and Western communities who planned to live in New York City while doing graduate study at Columbia university are beating the critical housing shortage by sharing an old colonial mansion on a country estate an hour's drive from the school.

And they readily admit they enjoy their leisurely country living much more than city dwelling "because it's so much like home."

The couples are Mr. and Mrs. Donald Murray of Wausau, Wis.; Mr. and Mrs. John McDonough of Seattle, Wash., and Green Bay, Wis., and Mr. and Mrs. Cameron Bremseth of Leeds, N. D.

They and 11 other married veterans and their wives live the part of country squires in Nevis, a 20-room mansion built in 1835 on an oak-studded 75-acre tract which gently slopes down to the Hudson river. The mansion, located at Irvington-on-Hudson, New York, was converted into single room apartments by Columbia university to help solve the student veteran's housing difficulty. The estate was acquired by the university from Mrs. T. Coleman Du Pont in 1933 and had been used as a botanical experiment station before its present tenants moved in.

Mrs. McDonough, the former Marie Monard, who was brought up on her father's farm near Green Bay, summed up the attitude of the couples from west of the Mississippi.

"Country life is the life I'm used to and although I wanted to live in New York City while my husband was studying, I far prefer Nevis," she said. "Just to feel more at home, I'm raising vegetables on a small plot of land. It helps the shopping problem."

Wedding Parties Need Light, Dainty Types of Food



If you're serving at any of the wedding parties, see that all service is of the finest. It's time to bring the silver out of the mothballs, and to see that the best china is washed gently to sparkle on the wedding reception or breakfast table.

Weddings always pose an interesting refreshment problem because we do not face them every day. With shortages still very much evident, the problem is bound to be just a bit thick, especially if you happen to be personally involved. Then, too, if the wedding happens to be a big affair with showers and parties preceding the big event, most of us are apt to run out of ideas pretty quickly. For this reason, I've made up menu suggestions for different types of wedding refreshments, including the bridal shower. Everything is on the simple side, but if you choose, you can make it quite an event by garnishing the food attractively, as suggested.

Menu I—Bridal Shower
Frosted Sandwich Loaf
Molded Salad Relishes
Raspberry Cream Parfait
Dainty Cookies Coffee
The dessert is an easy to fix number provided you're stocked with fresh berries, ice cream and some currant jelly.

Raspberry Cream Parfait.
(Serves 6)
1/2 cup currant jelly
1 cup raspberries
1/2 cup whipping cream
Vanilla ice cream
Beat the jelly with a fork, fold in raspberries. Add whipped cream. Fill parfait glasses with alternate layers of the jelly mixture and ice cream. Garnish with whole berries.

Menu II—Spinster Luncheon
Consomme with Lemon Slices
Creamed Chicken with Toasted Almonds
Orange Salad Thin Melba Toast Individual Meringues with Ice Cream
Mints Beverage
How to do: Prepare consomme ahead of time; heat when ready to serve. For casserole, use large pieces of white meat, rich cream sauce and top with sliced, toasted almonds. The orange salad may be molded; it's good with a honey french dressing. Tint the meringues pink and serve with ice cream or whole, sugared berries.

LYNN SAYS

Taste Teasers: For a summery touch to a consomme noodle soup, add 1 chopped hard-cooked egg to each four servings.
Sprinkle croutons with grated, nippy cheese and serve them with soup or vegetable juice as a first course.
Two tablespoons of chopped pickle relish adds zip to any macaroni or noodle and cheese dish. Add the relish before baking.
Season steaks with a sauce made by mixing chili sauce, grated onion, Worcestershire sauce and a bit of mustard together. Pour over the steak just before it finishes broiling.
Halves of canned peaches filled with cream cheese mixed with chopped bits of ginger or sliced almonds are delicious served on a bed of greens.
Sprinkle grated cheese on tomato juice before serving for a nippy taste.

Menu III—Wedding Breakfast.
Iced, diced fruit in Melon Shell
Creamed Sweetbreads or Chicken with Mushrooms
Buttered Asparagus Ripe Olives
Tiny Muffins Endive Salad
Ice Cream Bride's Cake
Beverage Mints
I've found an excellent recipe for creamed chicken which is basic. You may vary it as you see fit, adding pimiento and mushrooms or even substituting sweetbreads, parboiled, for part of the chicken.
Creamed Chicken.
(Serves 6)
1 1/2 pound chicken or fowl
2 small white onions
1 bay leaf
2 teaspoons salt
1/4 teaspoon pepper
1/2 cup chicken fat, butter or substitute
1/2 cup flour
1 cup chicken broth
1 1/2 cups rich milk
Simmer chicken and onions in boiling water to cover. Add seasonings and cook until tender. Remove chicken from broth and cool. Skin fat off broth and reserve; strain broth, reserving onions and butter. Cut chicken into pieces. Melt chicken fat in top of double boiler, blend in flour and stir in broth and milk. Cook until thickened while stirring.
Add onions and chicken. Heat and season further if necessary. Serve in toast cup or patty shells or large silver casserole.

How to do: Everything in this menu is served cold except the hot oysters or crabmeat dish and the beverage. Prepare these cold things ahead of time while you set the table. Leave the hot dish until last. The bride's cake may be homemade or ordered depending upon the amount of work involved. Many guests will prefer taking the cake home, so it is necessary to serve a dessert like Bisque Tortoni:
Bisque Tortoni.
(Serves 15 to 18)
1 teaspoon unflavored gelatin
1 tablespoon cold water
1 cup sugar or light corn syrup
1/2 cup cold water
1/4 teaspoon salt
6 egg yolks
1/2 cup crushed macaroons or dry cake crumbs
1/2 cup chopped nut meats
1/2 cup chopped blanched almonds
1 teaspoon vanilla
2 cups heavy cream, whipped
Soften gelatin in water 5 minutes. Boil sugar, water and salt until syrup spins a thread (230 degrees). Pour slowly over beaten egg yolks, stirring constantly. Add softened gelatin and stir until dissolved. Cool. Fold in macaroons and nut meats. Add whipped cream. Pour into crinkled paper cups, place in freezer tray and freeze.
Note: 1 cup chopped maraschino cherries may also be added for extra flavor and color.

FINDING A NEW SENSE OF VALUES

LESSON TEXT—Luke 12:15, 20; 18:24-30; 19:1-10
MEMORY SELECTION—The kingdom of God is not meat and drink; but righteousness, and peace, and joy in the Holy Ghost. —Romans 14:17.

Money, riches, possessions—that's what men are living and striving for in our day. It is going to seem a bit strange, but it will be very salutary to stress once again the eternal truth, best summarized by our Lord Jesus when he said, "A man's life consisteth not in the abundance of the things which he possesseth" (Luke 12:15).

I. Don't Depend on Riches (12:15, 20).
The rich man increased in selfishness as he increased in wealth. He began to feel secure because he had laid up much goods. Now he became proud and boastful. He thought he saw years of comfort and ease ahead. Evidently he had not read, or did not believe, the words of Scripture, "Boast not thyself of tomorrow; for thou knowest not what a day may bring forth" (Prov. 27:1; see also James 4:13-17).

II. Beware of the Snare of Riches (18:24-27).
The rich young ruler had come running to Jesus to seek eternal life, but had turned away sorrowful when he found that a man cannot love money and love God at the same time.
Jesus improved the opportunity to point out that it is impossible for a rich man to be saved, except as the grace of God gets hold of him and sets him free from dependence on his wealth.

Apart from the grace of God, it is so easy for a rich man or woman to trust in riches, and to feel no need of God.
Look again at I Timothy 6:9, 10 and you will see that even the desire to be rich leads a man into a temptation and a snare. The man of God is warned to "flee these things; and follow after righteousness, godliness, faith, love, patience, meekness," and thus to be able to "fight the good fight of faith" (I Tim. 6:11, 12).

We repeat that all this has a strange sound to modern ears, so accustomed to the worldly philosophy of trust in things and in dollars. We need to warn our young men and women about the awful danger of loving money.
There is something infinitely better than riches, and that is what we find in our next point.

III. Seek True Riches in Christ (18:24-30).
Peter and the other disciples had forsaken all the things of the world to follow Christ, and now as he reminds the Lord of that fact, he receives the assurance that there is a higher level of riches and reward for the loyal disciple.
God will never be in debt to anyone. There is no sacrifice made for his glory which does not find its glorious recompense, and no burden borne for his sake which does not bring its rich reward.
All this is not the result of some kind of a "deal" with God. We do not serve him because we expect a reward, but the assurance of the reward is there to encourage and spur us on in life and service for him.
The fact is, spiritual currency has far higher value than the gold and silver of this world.

IV. Ask Christ to Deliver You From Riches (19:1-10).
Zacchaeus was a man well versed in the devious ways of the extortioner. He knew money, and how to make it. But he was not satisfied. He knew there was something more worth while than riches. His life was empty.
He sought Jesus. One look from the Master and he knew that he must lay his sinful heart open before him in confession. Salvation came to Zacchaeus that day.

Here, then, is the way to be delivered from the snare of riches—take Jesus Christ as your Saviour and Lord. He may then entrust riches to your care to use for him, but he will deliver you from a love for gold and from the folly of putting your trust in it.
The person who lives for riches is lost (v. 10), caught in a snare (I Tim. 6:9, 10), trusting in something that will fail him when most needed (Luke 12:19, 20), and trusting something which will keep him from God (Luke 18:24-27), unless there is grace to flee from it and turn to God.

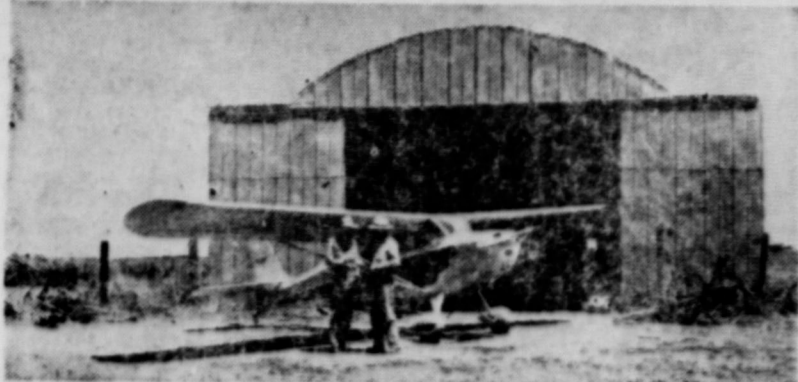

"Flying Farm Machines" Prove Valuable

AIR-MINDED farmers already are putting planes to work and consider them part of their farm equipment, an article in nationally-circulated Capper's Farmer points out.

"Light aircraft are no longer considered as exclusive playthings of rich pilots," the magazine declares. "Farmers from the wide open spaces build T-hangars or park the planes in the barns and use level pasture, alfalfa or wheat fields for landing strips.

"These farmers hop nonchalantly into their planes and put them to dozens of uses, including seeding crops, spreading insecticides, counting cattle, checking fence, carrying farm produce, getting implement repairs in a hurry and doing many other jobs. The cost of operation varies between 2 and 6 dollars an hour."

Active in helping air-minded farmers organize into state associations, the magazine read by 1,250,000 farm families points out that the flying farmers of Oklahoma already have formed the National Flying Farmers Association to promote the greater use of aircraft in agricultural production. Capper's Farmer is urging farmers using airplanes in other states to organize and affiliate with the national organization, whose headquarters are at Oklahoma Agricultural and Mechanical College, Stillwater, Oklahoma.

Proof of growing interest in flying among farmers is indicated by the fact that while only 12 planes were flown to the first Flying Farmers Meet at Stillwater, Oklahoma, in 1944, a total of 130 farm-owned aircraft were there for the 1945 gathering. Some 222 farm men and women pilots attended.

The Third "R"

For a short while before my first day at school, and for several weeks after, I heard a great deal of conversation about the three R's of education. My elders seemed to expect me to think it was very funny that the three R's should stand for reading, writing and arithmetic. It left an impression, to say the least. I still know that education includes some variety.

One of the things about modern education that disarms me is the fact that students don't pursue the three R's long enough. They are at liberty too early to ignore one of them—the last one. Figures are dry at first and a lot of youngsters drop mathematics. High school freshmen have learned to say "it's only a waste of time to study things you don't like and will never use."

Ignorance Is Costly
"What you don't know doesn't hurt you," is rubbish. Certainly what you don't know does not do you any good. Truly an actor may draw a fabulous salary for years and die in debt. Tales are told of artists and musicians who can't balance their check stubs. Their ignorance of math did not make them better artists. It would be like saying liquor made Poe a poet, or that harem make great kings.

A national poll might show that millions of Americans don't know what it means to balance the budget. It wouldn't be surprising; most of us don't even have a personal budget, we live so easily and well. But our national budget needs to be balanced. People who try to laugh that off don't know what it means or, worse yet, would welcome national bankruptcy as a stepping stone to revolution.

What Does It Mean?
Balancing a budget, whether it is a family budget or a national budget, means keeping a safe relation between income and outgo. The inevitable result of spending more than we get is debt, bankruptcy and loss of credit. That's just another way of saying "loss of our good name and the respect of our neighbors." When we stop paying our debts and start breaking our promises, that's loss of credit.

Uncle Sam is on his way to that social level. He has not reached it yet, but when he does it will be too late to save him. Now is the time to balance the national budget. I was never so proud of my home state as when the entire Arkansas delegation in Congress, senators and representatives, went on record in March as favoring a balanced national budget. That's practical statesmanship.

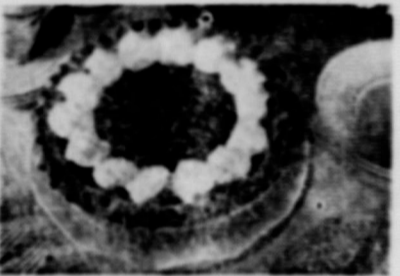
Read These Truths
"A balanced federal budget can be accomplished in the next fiscal year if congress will meet its full responsibility and adopt a program of economy. By considering each appropriation bill in the light of its effect on total necessary expenditures, we can hold the cost of government within the annual revenues collected. . . . The time to begin is now." So said the statement.

Habitually spending money we do not have can't help but lead this nation to collapse, and nothing worse could happen to the world's economic welfare. Think of the war functions now idling along; of the men whose energies might be transferred to the credit column. In every locality there is uncounted waste that should be and can be transformed into a bit of thrift.

Peanut Pie Has High Taste Appeal

For a sweet, crunchy dessert that is delightfully different, try Peanut Pie, advises Marjorie Griffin, Rural Home editor of Capper's Farmer. The nutty flavor from chopped peanuts has high taste appeal, she writes in the nationally circulated farm magazine.

Just before serving the pie, top it lavishly with whipped cream. Arrange it around the edge of the dark filling in a ring of snowy peaks.



PEANUT PIE
2 tbsp. Beat 2 eggs
1/4 C. sugar 2 tbsp. shortening
1/2 tsp. salt 1 C. peanuts
1/4 C. cold water 1 unshaded pie shell
1 C. dark corn syrup

Combine flour, sugar and salt; add water and corn syrup and blend well. Boil gently for 3 to 5 minutes. Then slowly pour mixture into slightly beaten eggs, stirring continuously. Add shortening. Spread chopped peanuts over bottom of 9-inch pie shell. Pour filling into crust. Bake in hot oven (425° F.) for 10 minutes; reduce heat to 350° F. and continue baking 35 minutes. When silver knife inserted in center of filling comes out clean, pie is done. Before serving, top with whipped cream. Serves 6.

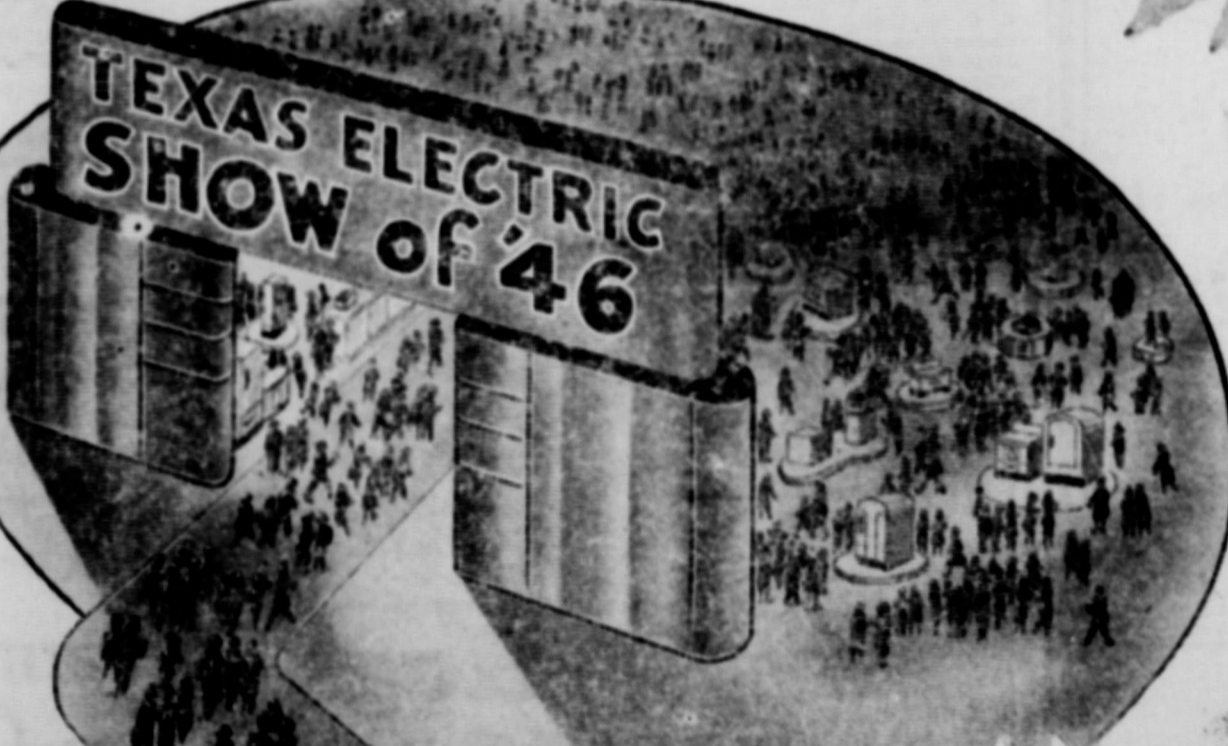


RAISIN PINWHEELS
2 C. flour 1/2 C. 1 C. milk
2 tsp. baking powder 1/2 C. seedless raisins
1/2 tsp. salt 2 tbsp. corn sirup
1/4 C. shortening 1/2 tsp. cloves

Sift together flour, baking powder and salt. Cut in shortening. Add enough of the milk to make a soft dough. Divide dough into 7 or 8 pieces; shape each piece into a strip. Coil strips into pinwheels and place them in a greased pan. Mix together raisins, corn sirup and cloves. Sprinkle mixture on biscuits, pressing raisins into dough. Bake biscuits in hot oven (425° F.) 15 to 20 minutes. Makes 7 or 8 large biscuits.

Simplified Shopping For Home Furnishings

GOOD news for rural families is the announcement that home furnishings in properly matching and contrasting colors soon will be available, the Rural Home Editor of nationally-circulated Capper's Farmer points out.

More than 200 manufacturers have formed the Home Furnishings Style Council. All of them will use the same nine basic colors in designing certain lines of their merchandise.

For homemakers this means simplified shopping for everything from floor coverings through furnishings, drapery materials, linoleum, upholstery, Venetian blinds, paint and wall papers, points out this Capper's Farmer expert.

Colors were chosen according to those most popular for homes today and named after sections of the United States. They are green (Shenandoah Group), tan (Alamo Group), mauve (Prairie Group), rose (Grand Canyon Group), gray, (Great Smoky Group), cedar, (Santa Fe Group), blue (Great Lakes Group), burgundy (Adirondack Group), and beige (Cape Cod Group). Each group has been broken down into tones and shades from the lightest to the darkest values.

Some of these items are already available, but many stores may not have them until September.

Very effective results have been obtained by using atlatide at the rate of 1 pound dissolved in 1 gal. of water per 100 sq. ft. in the heading and blooming stage in late summer or early fall. This being the case farmers are urged to keep the Johnson grass down by the usual cultural methods until August, then as it comes to the heading and blooming stage strike the death blow by spraying with atlatide.

Recent potted rains varying from a mere trace to 1 1/2 inches have allowed farmers to plant some 20 per cent of the normal acreage in this county to cotton. This 30,000 acres already planted to cotton indicates that if sufficient moisture arrives in time there will be at least 150,000 acres planted to cotton in Lynn County this year.

Every cotton producer in Lynn county is invited to participate in the 7 step cotton production program. The 7 steps are designed to lead to balanced farming, efficient production, better cotton and higher profit. They are as follows: 1. Fit cotton into balanced farming. 2. Take care of your soil. 3. Get together on the best variety. 4. Make your labor count. 5. Control insects and disease. 6. Harvest and gin for high grade. 7. Sell for grade, staple and variety value.

The outstanding cotton producer in Lynn County for 1914 will be selected and given proper recognition and receive an appropriate award. A committee will select the winner on the basis of points scored on this 7 step Cotton Improvement program.

Grasshoppers are making their appearances in Lynn County. Since the recent rains several farmers having adjoining pasture land have noticed quite a number of young grasshoppers. The numbers as of this date are not sufficient to justify undue alarm, but it is expected however that grasshoppers poison will be very scarce and hard to get this year. They should be watched very closely and should they begin to appear in large numbers they should be reported immediately to the County Agent in order that arrangements may be made for a government sponsored poisoning program.

The Farm Labor Program administered by the Extension service will be in charge of the County Agent. Farmers needing farm hands are asked to leave their applications in the County Agent's office, likewise farm hands desiring to work in Lynn County are asked to contact the County Agent's office to secure employment. The County Agent's office will serve as a clearing house for Migratory labor as the need arises.

SIDLIGHTS FROM WASHINGTON

By George Mahon

On Wednesday of last week our seven man subcommittee on Military Appropriations began hearings on the Military Appropriations Bill to meet the needs of the Army for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1946.

We are being asked to appropriate the money for an Army which will number 1 1/2 million men on July 1, 1946 and shrink to 1 million by June 30, 1947. The huge sum of 7 1/4 billion dollars is being requested for this one year period. This is a vast sum of money, but it is quite a come down from the peak annual appropriation for the Army of 72 billion dollars in 1944. The money requested for next year, the first post-war year, is one third of the sum which was appropriated for the year just prior to the outbreak of the war.

In our democracy the Army makes available for publication many facts which no other nation would think of publishing. The Russians, and even the British, do not make public detailed figures about their military strength. On July 1st we will have 492,000 men in the Pacific area, 338,000 in Europe and 732,000 in Continental United States. The Army proposes that by June 30, 1947, the numbers will be reduced to 272,000, 161,000 and 547,000 respectively. These figures do not take into account the men we have in Alaska, Newfoundland, the North Atlantic and the Caribbean areas.

General Eisenhower will not appear before us until early in June as he now is in the Pacific, but he left word with us that his request for men and money is a "rock bottom" request. The Secretary of War appeared before us last Friday, and we assured him that we would not withhold the appropriation of any sum that was clearly needed. I became a member of the War Subcommittee in 1949 and have always followed the policy of supporting necessary military appropriations.

The Air Force are requesting funds for the purchase of 1100 new planes of the very latest type. Aviation development moves very rapidly and many of the planes which were built a couple of years ago are now outmoded.

For the atomic bomb development the sum of 200 million dollars is being requested. A short time ago I spent a day in Los Alamos, New Mexico, where the atomic

bomb is made. The substance for the bomb is made in Tennessee and in the State of Washington, but the bomb itself is made in Los Alamos. That is, the final processes are completed there. Having spent a couple of days at the atomic bomb plant in Oak Ridge Tennessee, in May of last year and observed the gigantic proportions of the project, I was struck by the contrast when I saw the relatively small and unimpressive layout out at Los Alamos, nestled in the mountains northwest of Santa Fe about 40 miles by auto. Los Alamos is 7,000 feet above sea level and the terrain is such that the place is relatively easy to guard and it is far enough from any city so that experimental explosions do not present a hazard.

Most of the buildings are quite temporary in character. The money which was provided for construction at the project was relatively small

when compared to the big plants in Tennessee and Washington -- less than 30 million dollars. Now that the work is to go forward on an experimental basis as a permanent thing, many additional provisions will have to be made.

Los Alamos has a population of several thousand. It is a little city within itself built by the Government. I complained that the place did not have a church or chapel. A theatre is used for religious worship. The population is largely adult. I believe someone said that there are only six graduates in the High School graduating class this year.

CONGRESS HAS TAKEN THE FIRST STEP IN THE RIGHT DIRECTION TO STOP Inflation

THE House of Representatives of the U. S. Congress recently passed a bill extending the life of the Office of Price Administration, but amended the law to the extent of eliminating some of the past unsound O. P. A. policies and practices. These past policies of OPA were hamstringing production, creating Black Markets and retarding distribution. This is the first step in the right direction to eliminate inflation and indicate to the people that eventually the OPA War Measures will be terminated.

Woman's World Flour Sacks Aid Seamstress As Fabric Shortage Continues

IF YOU'VE tried to do any sewing lately and have scoured the stores in a vain attempt to find suitable material for yourself, then you will welcome any suggestion that gives material easily. Long before we had the wealth of fabrics found in prewar times, many homemakers were making good use of those large, clean, readily available flour or sugar sacks.

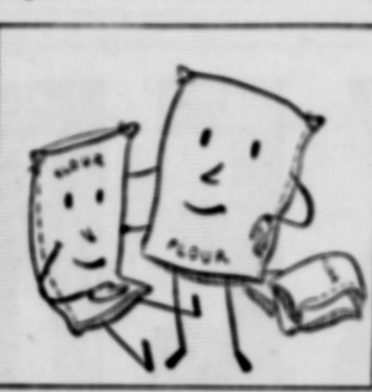
Some of the department and notions goods stores still carry them, and you might well look to them as material for a cheerful morning dress or cover-all apron. Cheerful? Why yes, of course. Just get out the package of dyes and dyeing kettle and go to work. Since these sacks are cotton, they take dye very easily, and of course you do not have to bleach them first. You can have any color you desire—a bright kelly green, rose pink, aqua or robin's egg blue.

Depending on your size, it will take from two to four of the large size flour or sugar sacks to give you the material you want. Take out the seams first, and make certain the sacks are clean. Use the directions for the particular dye you have on hand and go to work. After the fabric has been dyed, dried and ironed, lay it out for the pattern, making sure that no materials will be wasted.

Checking Measurements Considered Essential

Some of you may say, "Well, it's not so important that my house dress fits so perfectly." Why shouldn't the dress you do your work in, the one you spend most of the daylight hours in, be well fitted? Actually, good fit is important here as in a dress-up dress. Then, too, these dresses are relatively simple, and you can learn good fitting from making them—a thing of importance when you begin sewing on the "more important" articles of clothing.

Select or make a pattern that comes exactly to your own bust size. Adjustments of an inch or so can be made easily, but remember it is easier to make a pattern one size larger—a little smaller, than to cut

suits in a pattern that is too small to make it fit.

A good way to get this fitting problem in hand is to take your own measurements and pencil them down side by side with the pattern measurements. Then you will know exactly the amount of adjustment needed, and can allow accordingly.

In cutting a dress from a flour sack, bear in mind the grain of the material and place the pattern correctly on the lengthwise grain. Mark all sewing guides either with stitching, tailor's tacks or chalk. This makes the work move along much faster.

There are usually some parts of dressmaking that are more tricky than others. Take the sleeves, for

example. Just how are they to be eased into the garment without ugly gathers where they should not be? The best way I know is to take small basting stitches around the fullest

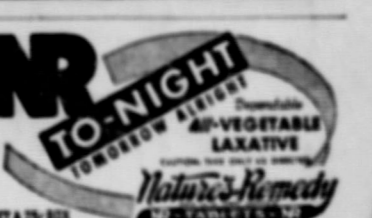

EDWARDS county already has some of its post war road improvement under way. The State Highway Department is retopping No. 41 from Rocksprings to the County

The Texas Electric Show of '46, a presentation of electronic devices, new and modern electrical appliances and continuous entertainment features will be announced this week. The show will be staged May 23 thru May 25th in the Settles Hotel by the Texas Electric Service Company, which has the co-operation of leading electrical appliance manufacturers throughout the nation.

Recent electrical and electronic developments will be presented as a part of the show. In addition, complete electric kitchens, dozens of the latest models of all conventional electrical appliances and many new improvements in electrical homemaking will be displayed by the electrical manufacturers.

The Texas Electric Show will be one of the most interesting shows of its kind ever presented in West Texas. Not only will visitors find a most imposing array of electrical appliances, but will also find continuous entertainment features including moving pictures.

The farmer and rancher will find the Show of great interest, for considerable emphasis is placed on demonstrations of practical applications of electricity to farm and ranch operations. Feed grinders, milkers, chicken brooders, cream separators and water pumps are only a few of the electrically operated devices which will be shown. The farm and ranch exhibit has been arranged by our company with the assistance of the Agricultural Engineering Department of Texas A. and M. college and with the co-operation of leading manufacturers of electrical farming equipment.

STATE HEALTH DEPT. WARNS ABOUT POLIO

Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, has issued the following statements and suggestions concerning the control and prevention of polio (infantile paralysis) which is now occurring in certain sections of the State.

Until recently it was generally believed that this infection is transmitted by means of discharges from the respiratory tract. It is now believed that polio may be another of the several gastrointestinal infections. Therefore, control measures must include clean-up campaign and improvements in sanitation.

Strict Sanitary measures must be observed in all communities. Stringent efforts should be made to eliminate the house-fly and to destroy its breeding places. All mosquitoes and mosquito breeding places must be eliminated at once. Every effort should be made to institute approved garbage collection systems immediately. Safe water supplies must be assured. Where adequate municipal sewage disposal systems are not in operation it is vitally important to promote and maintain sanitary septic tanks and outdoor privies.

All raw foods and vegetables should be washed thoroughly before use and protect from flies, filth and insects. All eating and food handling establishments should adhere strictly to the state Law concerning the sterilization of dishes and utensils. Those restaurants with insufficient sanitation should close one or two hours a day so that employees can assist in maintaining cleanliness and high sanitary standards.

Every effort should be made to secure approved milk. Rats and mice should be eliminated. Maintain in the home the same sanitary standards that are necessary in community life. Particular attention should be paid to personal hygiene. Excreta from cases and contacts should be handled and disinfected with the same scrupulous care as in typhoid fever or bacillary dysentery.

Over exertion in children should be avoided. Children should not visit homes where there is illness. Polio cases should be quarantined for 14 days and adults who work in food establishments should be particularly instructed in personal hygiene. It is advisable to reduce to a minimum all human contacts, especially in children during an outbreak of this disease. It is not advocated that schools, churches and theatres be closed.

Early symptoms of infantile paralysis are headache, fever, vomiting, drowsiness, followed by stiffness in the neck and back. When suspicious symptoms appear, a physician should be called immediately.

REPORT ON TEACHERS

The Texas State Teachers Association has just completed a survey among city and county school superintendents to determine the condition of the teacher personnel in Texas. Replies were received from 945 superintendents representing 36,957 teaching positions or about 89 per cent of the total in Texas. Since the opening of school in September 3,633 teachers have resigned their positions which represents about 10 per cent of the total. Of the teachers included in the survey, 5,546 were listed with substandard qualifications which represent approximately 15 per cent of the total.

Local districts are exerting every effort possible to keep the teachers in the classrooms but many superintendents report that it appears impossible to fill all of their positions this coming year because of the LOW salaries paid and the number of resignations which are anticipated at the close of the current school year. Practically all of the cities in Texas report resignations averaging 13 per cent. Many local school districts are voting to increase their tax rate or will increase property valuations in order to secure more revenue for teachers salaries.

It is estimated that 8,500 Texas teachers entered the armed forces and industry from September 1941 thru 1945. However, only 1,277 have returned to teaching.
