## County's Ginnings Total 21,530 Prior November 1st

Ginnings over Lynn county are still lagging far behind totals registered in 1939 up the same time.

A total of 21,530 bales had been ginned in this county prior to November 1, so Holloway reports, against 49,662 last year.

Estimates of Lynn's yield from the 1940 crop will be placed at about 40,000 bales by many cotton companies, but since the middle of the season guesses range from thirty to forty thousand, with most believing that 35,000 will be a close estimate.

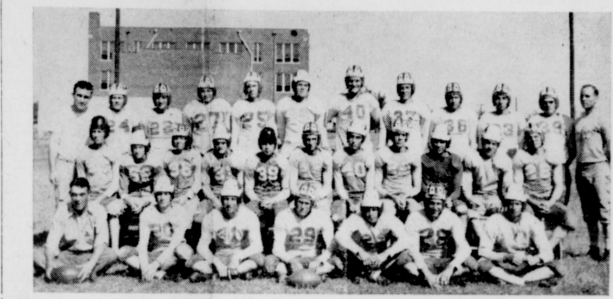

## F. S. A.

In Lynn County

A group meeting was held in the District Courtroom Thursday November 7, by Miss Argen Hix and Mr. Jack Welch. This meeting was to explain the program of the Farm Security Administration to new borrowers.

Because of the number of farm families in the county who need financial assistance and agricultural guidance, a number of new families will be able to secure help from the Farm Security Administration for their 1941 operations.

Farm owners, farm tenants and share-croppers who need financing and guidance which they cannot obtain from any other public or private agency are helped through FSA.

Loans are made for periods of from 1 to 5 years, depending on the purpose for which the money is used. Money loaned to buy livestock or machinery might be repaid over a 3 year period.

Lynn county has recently been designated through a recommendation of the Lynn County Land Use planning committee to make Water Facilities loans.

These loans can be made to tenants or landowners to build stock tanks, install windmills and storage tanks, pipe water into the house and in some cases install bathroom fixtures.

The loans are made by the FSA in cooperation with the Soil Conservation Service who furnish the technical service. Information will be furnished in regard to these loans at the local office in the county courthouse.

With most loans due for payment later on, thirty farm families in Lynn County have made their 1940 payments before they are due.

These families have learned to follow a live-at-home program, and how to conserve the fertility of the soil they till. They also have learned how to manage their farms and homes and know the value of keeping accurate records.

Bill sponsored by the Texas Dirt Farmers' Congress have been unanimously endorsed and adopted as a part of the program of twenty state-wide organizations, according to Bailey Ragsdale of Austin, chairman of the Congress.

The two bills, prepared under the direction of Ragsdale, were endorsed by representatives of farming, ranching, grocery transportation and highway users organizations, with each group testifying to the immediate and pressing importance to the growth of development of Texas industrially and agriculturally for the repeal of the present 7,000 pound truck load limit and the adoption of the proposed scientific rating of truck loads.

The truck load bill provides for the repeal of the 7,000 pound load limit, and the adoption in its place of a scientific formula prepared by the National Safety Council, endorsed by the National Highway Users Conference and already in force in eleven states. The bill presents four limitations for the operation of trucks so as to give the trucker maximum hauling capacity and at the same time protect the safety of all highway users and the condition of the roads themselves. The limitations are placed on the number of pounds that may be placed on one axle, and the number of pounds per square inch of tire area in contact with the road surface, the over-all length of the vehicle, the height, and the width.

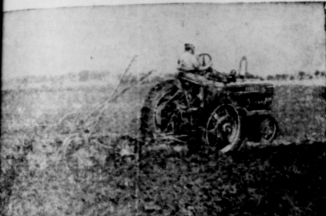

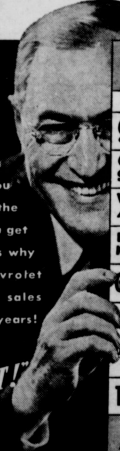

Tonight the O'Donnell Eagles and the Tahoka Bulldogs, traditional rivals, meet in Tahoka for the annual 'grudge' game.

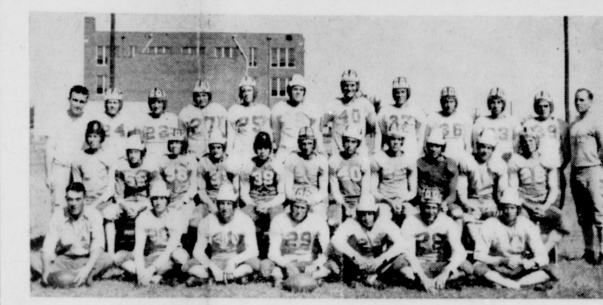

farm owners, farm tenants and share-croppers who need financing and guidance which they cannot obtain from any other public or private agency are helped through FSA.

Loans are made for periods of from 1 to 5 years, depending on the purpose for which the money is used. Money loaned to buy livestock or machinery might be repaid over a 3 year period.

Lynn county has recently been designated through a recommendation of the Lynn County Land Use planning committee to make Water Facilities loans.

These loans can be made to tenants or landowners to build stock tanks, install windmills and storage tanks, pipe water into the house and in some cases install bathroom fixtures.

The loans are made by the FSA in cooperation with the Soil Conservation Service who furnish the technical service. Information will be furnished in regard to these loans at the local office in the county courthouse.

With most loans due for payment later on, thirty farm families in Lynn County have made their 1940 payments before they are due.

These families have learned to follow a live-at-home program, and how to conserve the fertility of the soil they till. They also have learned how to manage their farms and homes and know the value of keeping accurate records.

- Bill sponsored by the Texas Dirt Farmers' Congress has been unanimously endorsed and adopted as a part of the program of twenty statewide organizations, according to Bailey Ransdale of Austin, chairman of the Congress.
- The two bills prepared under the direction of Ransdale, were endorsed by representatives of farming, ranching, grocery transportation and highway users organizations, with each group testifying to the immediate and pressing importance to the growth of development of Texas industrially and agriculturally for the repeal of the present 7,000 pound truck load limit and the adoption of the proposed scientific rating of truck loads.
- The truck load bill provides for the repeal of the 7,000 pound load limit, and the adoption in its place of a scientific formula prepared by the National Safety Council, endorsed by the National Highway Users Conference and already in force in eleven states. The bill presents four limitations for the operation of trucks so as to give the trucker maximum hauling capacity and at the same time protect the safety of all highway users and the condition of the roads themselves. The limitations are placed on the number of pounds that may be placed on an axle, and the number of pounds per square inch of tire area in contact with the road surface, the over-all length of the vehicle, the height, and the width.

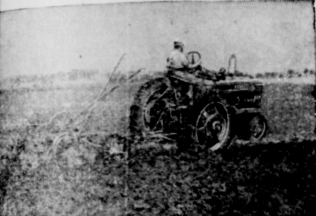

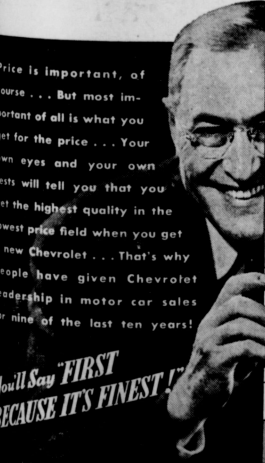
