Advertising budgets of national manufacturers in the United States have been increased for 1967.

The increase is a reflection of evidence that there is no real basis for fear of a serious depression or controlled inflation. It is based on the knowledge that the American consumer is in a better buying position than at any time in history.

While buying power has increased to an all-time high, and unemployment reached an all-time low, the productive capacity of American industry is not being fully utilized. Only a failure in distribution should block expanded trade activity on which prosperity is built.

Money is not "tight" from the standpoint of most industries and local retailers. The consumer has been tight with his money in making certain types of purchases because he has not been stimulated to buy.

The national manufacturers have taken the first step toward speeding the movement of goods and money with vigorous advertising programs. Several times during the past decade industry has helped to move the economy from recessions to prosperity by renewed sales efforts.

However, the efforts of national industries cannot be effective unless the local retailer takes a major share of the responsibility.

The large manufacturer begins the selling process through national advertising, but local retail advertising must finally place products in the hands of consumers.

## Chamber of Commerce Elects New Officers Gives Report of Past Years Activities

The Baird Chamber of Commerce held their annual membership and directors meeting Monday night, Jan. 23, at 7 p. m. in the American Legion Hall.

Five directors were elected to three-year terms. They were Dick McNabb, Clifton Burfield, James Eubanks, Curtis Sutphen and Charles Walker. Retiring directors were Rupert Jackson, Howard Farmer, W. L. Ray, Ben Russell and Steve Warren.

Officers elected to serve during 1967 were Jimmy Godfrey, President; James Eubanks, Vice President; and Clifton Burfield, Secretary-Treasurer.

Holdover directors from 1966 were James Paul Shanks, Roy Gilbreath, Bud Smith, Terrell Williams, Bess Driskill and Margie Ray. 1965 holdover directors are Perry Jennings, Fred Goble, Jimmy Godfrey and C. M. Peck.

The Chamber had a total income from dues, banquet, etc., of \$5,843.94 in 1966, as announced by Claud Holley, Chamber of Commerce manager. Expenditures totaled \$5,762.75, leaving an operating gain of \$81.19.

An activity report was given by Mr. Holley for his past year which included the realization of Shady Oaks Recreation Center, which will be completed in 1967. This project, which was conceived by the Chamber, was secured through the combined efforts of citizens of both Baird and Clyde, and should prove to be very valuable and enjoyable to all people of this area.

Another project, closely related to the recreational project and also a combined effort of Baird Chamber of Commerce and Clyde, is the construction of a FM road southwest of Baird. The road will begin at IH 20 at the Union Hill Traffic Diversion, go south across FM 18, connecting with an east-west road. It will then continue west to connect with FM Road 604 south of Clyde. The new road will also include a park road to the new proposed Clyde Lake and Park Area.

The Chamber also held conferences with two industrial prospects. Both prospects required capital to start in Baird

and requirements were unable to be met. Hospital needs were studied by a Chamber appointed committee, which recommended additional rooms be constructed and the present facility be updated. This study will be continued in 1967. Also, efforts to secure a doctor for Baird were continued, but without success.

Prizes were contributed to winners in the Sheriff's Posse rodeo parade and the Chamber cooperated with the City in a clean-up campaign in April, and in development of an expanded filtration plant.

Also during the year, the

Chamber met with the City Council to discuss feasibility of a camper site on the east side of City Park. The City agreed on this site and the project is to be developed.

Mr. Holley, in his capacity as Chamber manager, also answered numerous requests for information on Baird and Callahan County, assisted in securing housing for families moving to Baird and promoted a Christmas activity program for the second straight year.

Many other activities were considered by the Board of Directors. There include signs on IH 20, retail trade promotion, brochure on Baird, additional paving and additional street markers.

In summing up his report, Mr. Holley said, "If we are to make your Chamber of Commerce an effective community force, we must adopt positive thinking and action. Your directors cannot develop a work program and execute it effectively without full and energetic support of everyone. This is our challenge and it must be met, otherwise, your investment in Community Improvement will not be worthwhile. As pointed out in meetings recently attended, Community Attitude and Community Improvement is number one in securing industry, new business or new citizens. This is a Time of Competitive Action, We Will Not Stand Still, We Move Forward or Fall Behind The Moving Parade of Our Times."

## Golden Holiday Nursing Home Qualified to Participate In Medicare

The Golden Holiday Nursing Home of Baird has qualified to participate in Medicare. This extended care facility can accept patients from the hospital, for further nursing care, under the Health Insurance Benefits Program for the Aged.

The patients accepted under Medicare must have been hospitalized three billing days, 4 calendar days, and a discharge date of July 1, 1966 or later, and admitted to the Nursing Home with 14 days after dismissal from the hospital.

The patients are admitted to the Nursing Home upon recommendation of their personal physician. These patients are admitted for further skilled nursing care.

Medicare will pay the first 20 days of patients stay in the Nursing Home. After 20 days, Medicare will pay all but \$5.00 per day for an additional eighty days.

Qualified nurses are in charge of each shift and sufficient nursing personnel are on duty at all times to meet the total needs of all patients.

## Department of Public Safety Lists Requirements For Trainees

If you are interested in becoming a Texas Highway Patrolman, the following is required:

Male, 20 through 35 years of age (inclusive.)

High school graduate or equivalent.

Good moral character.

Excellent physical condition.

Visual acuity no worse than 20/40 correctable to 20/30.

Resident of the State of Texas for at least one year immediately prior to employment.

**Employment**

Contact any DPS office or Patrolman for an application.

Take the completed application to the nearest regional, district or sub-district DPS office.

A written exam will be given. Each applicant will be told immediately if he has qualified for further consideration.

Successful applicants will be given an agility test, and arrangements will be made for a physical checkup.

A character investigation will be conducted and those persons who are accepted for employment may be placed on the payroll within 10 days.

Each cadet will be assigned temporary duty at the Austin headquarters, regional or sub-district office until a recruit training school begins.

Salary is \$440.00 from beginning of employment until completion of the school.

**Training**

Cadet will be assigned to Austin for an 18 weeks training session at the DPS Law Enforcement Academy at the appropriate time.

This training is designed to equip the cadet to handle any of the various situations he may encounter as a patrolman, and will start him off on the right foot toward a rewarding career in law enforcement.

**Assignment**

After satisfactory completion of the training at the DPS Academy, the salary is automatically raised to the level for the service to which the cadet is assigned.

Assignment is made in the best interest of the individual and the Department as to service and station location.

Requests for specific location will be given strong consideration.

Uniforms, vehicles, weapons, ammunition and related equipment are furnished.

Bible Thought: "Prove all things; hold fast that which is good; abstain from every form of evil." (1 Thessalonians 5: 21-22).

Here are a few of the many verses in the Bible on intoxicating liquor. May every Christian learn them and take heed to them. May every parent and teacher teach them diligently to the young. May every preacher preach these Scriptures with holy boldness.

**Liquor and Its Agents Are Deceitful:** "Wine is a mocker, strong drink is raging; and whosoever is deceived thereby is not wise." (Proverbs 20:1).

**Drunkenness Leads to Poverty and Rags:** "Be not among wine-bibbers; among roituous eaters of flesh; For the drunkard and the glutton shall come to poverty; and drowsiness shall clothe a man with rags." (Proverbs 23: 20-21).

**Liquor Brings Woe, Sorrow, Contentions, Babbling, Wounds, and Inflamed Eyes, Says God's Word:** "Who hath woe? who hath sorrow? who hath contentions, who hath babbling? who hath wounds without cause? who hath redness of eyes? 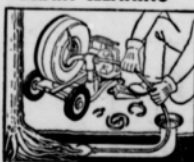

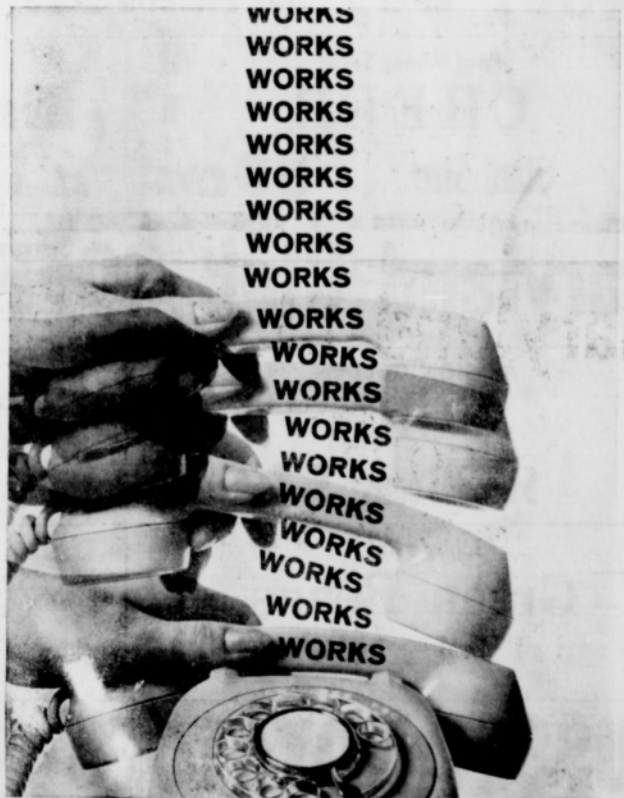

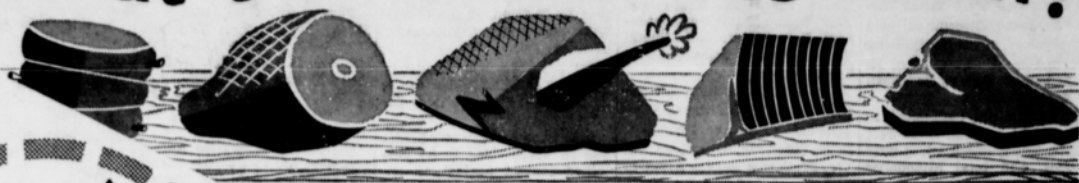
