The largest advertisers in America are the largest newspaper advertisers in America.

General Motors, the largest corporation in the world, placed more advertising in newspapers in 1966 than any other national company. The total was more than \$58,000,000.

Following General Motors in the total outlay for national advertising were the Ford Motor Company and the Chrysler Corporation.

The General Motors increase was 34 per cent over the previous year. This does not include the increase that was posted at the same time by local dealers. The local dealer increase was probably even greater.

Experienced local automobile dealers and newspaper advertising men take an "I told you so" attitude toward the trend. At least three times in the past decade, newspaper advertising has reversed a decline in American automobile sales. Judging by 1967 sales, the reversal has taken place again.

It is easy and convenient for great national companies to advertise through network television and national magazines. Such advertising does help to create prestige for a product. But it does not sell the product on the local level.

Advertising which does the final selling is information from a local dealer which tells how, where, when and at what price an automobile is sold. Without local backup, national advertising cannot sell a Ford, Plymouth or Chevrolet.

Or, for example, the largest General Motors dealer in America, depends only incidentally on national advertising. His record of sales has been built largely through persistent, specific advertising in local newspapers.

MOURNING DOVE SEASON TO OPEN IN COUNTY SEPT. 1

Dove season opens Sept. 1 at 1:00 p. m., through Oct. 30. Shooting hours will be from 1:00 p. m., central daylight savings time (12 noon central standard time), until sunset. Daily bag limit is twelve and the possession limit is twenty-four.

Hunting doves with rifles is prohibited. Doves must be hunted with a shotgun, and it must be plugged to a three shell capacity, including the shell in the chamber. The shotgun must not be larger than a ten gauge.

A person hunting any wild bird or wild animal outside the county of his residence must purchase a hunting license from the Parks and Wildlife Dept. or one of its authorized agents. A person who leases out land for hunting purposes must buy a shooting preserve license. A shooting preserve is any premises leased for hunting purposes which is a separate, unconnected, and distinct tract of land with a continuous and unbroken boundary.

No hunting is permitted in game refuges, state and federal parks, game reserves or within corporate city limits. Season is closed on all public roads.

Annual Steer Tour Set For Saturday

NEW RULES ADDED TO DRIVING CODE EFFECTIVE AFTER AUG. 28

It was announced this week by the Department of Public Safety that after Monday, August 28, everyone applying for an original driver's license will be thumbprinted. This regulation will not affect those now holding a valid license.

Also anyone applying for a license for the first time or upgrading their present license, will be required to take a driving test in the type vehicle listed on their license application. For example, anyone applying for a commercial license must take a driving test in a commercial type vehicle.

Also, a birth certificate or acceptable substitute must be presented when making application for an original license.

After Jan. 1, 1968, Texas drivers can no longer renew their licenses by mailing requests to Austin. Instead, they must appear in person at local DPS

offices, when eye vision tests will be given and photographs of each applicant will be made. These photos will make up a part of the new laminated plastic drivers' license.

Examiners Will Query Customers

Routine examination of Federal-chartered banks will soon take on an additional verification.

Auditors will mail forms to bank customers, whose accounts will be selected on a random sampling basis, asking that deposits and loan balances as reflected on books of the financial institutions be verified by individual customers.

This verification program is already in use by various bank supervising agencies of the Federal Government.

Mr. Bob Norrell President of The First National Bank of Baird said that he hopes customers will respond promptly when queried.

"This is a double protective measure which any bank should welcome," he said "and is in keeping with sound auditing principles."

Development of the system for verification will be gradual and will be based on experience accumulated by banking departments and federal regulatory agencies. The pilot program calls for specifically assigned personnel to perform the function.

Such encouragement was initiated under Mr. Saxon when he was Comptroller of the Currency and is being vigorously pursued. It is hoped that the banking public will not be unduly concerned upon receipt of this request as bankers are being asked to publicize in their various locales.

Funeral services for Henry Emmitt Bingham, 69, of Gorman, were held at 2:30 p. m. Thursday, Aug. 17, in Higginbotham Funeral Chapel, with the Rev. Marion Dennis, pastor of the Congregational Methodist Church officiating. Burial was in Sand Hill Cemetery.

Mr. Bingham died at 3 a. m. Wednesday, in Lawndale Home for Senior Citizens, following a four-weeks illness.

He was born Nov. 3, 1897 in Comanche.

Survivors include his wife; one daughter, Mrs. Wayne Rone of Baird; two sons, Neilly and Burney, both of Gorman; one sister, Mrs. Leonard Mealer; five brothers, Robert of Gorman, David of Beattie, Alfie of Farmington, N. M., Oscar and Archie, both of Brownfield.

TOUGHER VEHICLE INSPECTION SLATED FOR TEXAS MOTORISTS

The Texas Department of Public Safety reminded all motorists of the new motor vehicle inspection period and that laws relating to vehicle inspection have been changed.

Monday, August 28, will start the new period of inspection for all vehicles operated and registered in this state except trailers and semi-trailers whose gross weight and that of a load carried is 4,000 pounds or less.

The usual items inspected, brakes, lighting equipment, horn and warning devices, mirrors and windshield wipers, will no longer be the only items to be inspected. Now, in addition to the above, front seat belts have been added as an item that must be inspected and is therefore required equipment.

Front seat belts are required on every motor vehicle in which belt anchorages were a part of the manufacturer's original equipment. On all American passenger cars, beginning with 1962, seat belts were part of the original equipment.

Steering has also been added to the required items for inspection. Wheels and rims will be inspected for bent rims,

loose or missing bolts or nuts, or cracks.

Another change in this law raises the fee for inspection from \$1 to \$1.75.

Every motor vehicle that is involved in an accident where there is at least \$25 damage done to their vehicle must be inspected again after repairs have been made before it is operated on streets and highways in this state.

The deadline when all vehicles must be inspected is April 1, 1968.

The Texas Department of Public Safety also urged all licensed drivers, age 14 to 15, with a restricted drivers license, who have completed both phases of a driver education course, to go to their nearest drivers license office and take their driving test and have the restriction removed before August 28.

The new drivers license law change go into effect on that date.

If the drivers whose licenses are restricted to having a licensed driver 21 years of age or older in the front seat fail to beat the August 28 deadline, they will have to wait until their 16th birthday.

Then to Clyde to Ira Akers, Charley Sargents, Joe Gray and Weldon Edwards ranches. In Belle Plain to Blain Odums, then to Cross Plains Park for dinner.

From there the group will see the Cross Plains steers, and on to Clinton Waddells in Putnam, and finally to Gene Finleys, near Baird.

There are 43 Callahan County boys and girls with some 80 beef calves on this tour, and they have been consolidated, for convenience, at the above places.

There are eleven boys and girls from the Baird 4-H Club with beef calves on feed; six from Clyde 4-H; four from Putnam 4-H; twelve from Baird FFA; eight from Clyde FFA; and two from Cross Plains FFA.

Some ten of the steers are being readied for the Dallas State Fair, to be held in October, and the rest will make the 1968 spring shows.

"WEEKLY MEDITATIONS"

THE LIGHT OF THE WORLD

"Ye are the light of the world. A city that is set on an hill cannot be hid. Neither of men light a candle, and put it under a bushel, but on a candlestick; and it giveth light unto all that are in the house."

Matthew 5:14-15
It may well be said that this is the greatest compliment that ever was paid to the individual Christian, for in it Jesus commands the Christian to be what He Himself claimed to be. Jesus said, "As long as I am in the world, I am the light of the world" (John 9:5). When Jesus commanded His followers to be lights of the world, He demanded nothing less than that they should be like Himself. We must shine with the reflection of His light. The radiance which shines from the Christian is lit by the presence of Christ within the Christian's heart.

When Jesus said that the Christian must be light of the world, what did He mean? A light is first and foremost something which is meant to be seen. So, then, Jesus is saying that Christianity is something which is meant to be seen. As someone has well said, "There can be no such thing as secret discipleship, or the discipleship destroys the secrecy." A man's Christianity should be perfectly visible to all men. Further, this Christianity should not be visible only within the church. A Christianity whose effects stop at the church door is not much use to anyone. It should be even more visible in the ordinary activities of life. A Christian should be just as much a Christian in the workshop, the schoolroom, the kitchen, the

golf course, the playing field as he is in church.

Jesus did not say, "You are the light of the Church"; He said, "You are the light of the world," and in a man's life in the world his Christianity should be evident to all.

A light is a guide. So then the Christian must make the way clear to others. It is the Christians duty to take a stand which the weaker brother will support, to give the lead which those of less courage will follow. The world needs its guiding lights; there are people waiting and longing for a leader to take the stand and to do the things which they do not dare to take and to do by themselves.

A light can often be a warning light. A light is often the warning which tells us to halt when there is danger ahead. It is the Christians duty to bring to his fellowman the necessary warning. This is often difficult, and it is often hard to do in a way which will not do more harm than good; but one of the greatest tragedies in life is for someone, especially a young person, to come and say to us, "I would never been in the situation in which I now find myself if you had only spoken in time."

The light which can be seen, the light which warns, the light which guides, these are the lights which Christians must be.

Appointed As Co-Chairmen

Hugh Ross, James Snyder and Wendell Smith of Baird have been appointed area co-chairmen of the 1967 Cattleman's Round-Up for Crippled Children.

The announcement was made by Charlie Morris of Abilene, general chairman of the Round-Up, the chief means of support for the West Texas Rehabilitation Center. Several persons from this area receive free treatment at the WTRC, which has accepted neither state or federal funds during its nearly 14 years of operation.

The area chairmen, supporters of the Round-Up for many years, act as the chief link between the Round-Up and the ranchers in their area.

Throughout the years, WTRC has received valuable support from generous area ranchers who have cut out a head or two of cattle - or other livestock - and donated them to the WTRC for sale at the annual Round-Up. This year, the Round-Up will be conducted September 25th at Ranchers and Farmers Livestock Auction in Abilene.

During each of the last two years, the Round-Up has raised nearly \$80,000 toward the Center's annual budget of \$260,000. Other operational funds come from memorial contributions and from various United Funds.

The Center provides free treatment, without regard for race, creed, color or financial circumstances, to more than 1,600 patients from far-flung areas.

"We have the WTRC at our disposal only because we cattle-men care," Morris said in emphasizing the need for an especially good Round-Up this year. "The cattlemen of West Texas haven't let us down yet, and we don't expect them to this year."

Any livestock donated to the Round-Up will be transported free of charge to the Abilene auction site, the chairman added. Anyone wishing to donate livestock to the sale should contact his area chairman or the WTRC in Abilene, Morris said.

AUSTIN — Major changes in state drivers license law go into effect on August 28.

At the same time, inspection of additional auto equipment will be required, and minimum fee for vehicle inspections will be raised to \$1.75. Inspections for the 1968 sticker will continue until April 15, the usual deadline.

Under the new law, front seat belts will be required on all cars which have belt anchorages as part of original equipment. Steering mechanism, wheels and rims will be added to inspection items.

Other changes effective next week include:

Licensing law raises minimum age to 16 for those who have completed a driver's education course and to 18 for those who have not had approved training.

Minimum age for operating a motor scooter has been raised to 15 and a special examination will be required after January 1 to operate a motorcycle.

All licenses issued to persons under 21 will be stamped "provisional" and may be suspended if the operator is convicted of two traffic law violations in a 12 month period. (This provision effective January 1).

Motorists convicted of driving without a license will be subject to a fine of up to \$200 for first offense and stiffer penalties thereafter.

Those convicted of driving while intoxicated (or similar offense, are subject to first suspension of 12 months (18 months for later offenses) and may be required to attend a program of rehabilitation for problem drivers.

Thumb prints will be required on all original applications.

Driving while license is suspended or revoked is punishable by fine of \$25 to \$500 or a jail sentence of three days to six months.

Stiff penalties are provided for counterfeiting or forging a license.

Department of Public Safety will in the future receive from Department of Public Welfare a list of all Texans receiving aid due to visual defects.

POLITICAL SIGNS BREAKING — First major political indicators of what is expected to be a stormy year ahead began to come into focus here last week.

House Speaker Ben Barnes and Lt. Gov. Preston Smith acknowledged that they sat down together to talk over plans at length.

Barnes said Smith told him he plans to run for governor and encouraged him to seek the lieutenant governor's office.

Both declined to make any formal announcement of their plans until after Gov. John Connally's return from Africa about September 4.

"I am hoping things work out so there will be no big political turmoil but I have stated repeatedly my plans are not dependent on what anyone else does," commented the lieutenant governor.

"I may announce in the next few weeks, but I have to think about all this," said Barnes. "This is a political decision I am not ready to make yet."

Most overusers rate Governor Connally as almost certain to seek a fourth term.

HOSPITAL BUILDING SIGNALLED — Texas Mental Health and Mental Retardation Board has approved \$3,200,000 in construction priorities and set aside \$3,000,000 for the Dallas Neuropsychiatric Institute.

Major items include \$500,000 for an institute for human growth and development at Austin State School; \$397,828 for a rehabilitation building at Kerrville; \$388,859 for air conditioning at a Terrell unit; and \$290,459 for a recreation building at Abilene.

Grants in aid were approved for these community health centers: Austin-Travis County, \$392,816; Edinburg, \$102,024; Beau-

mont Port-Arthur, \$305,000. Contracts also were made to assist in developing community centers in Abilene, Amarillo, Brownwood, Harlingen, Texarkana, Dallas, and San Antonio. Contract services were continued with individual physicians or hospitals in Amarillo, Corpus Christi, El Paso, Houston, Lufkin and San Antonio.

ATTORNEY GEN. SPEAKS — Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin said it is up to each individual school district to decide if it wants to adopt the new "tenure" or "continuing contract" law for its teachers. However, once adopted, the tenure plan (protecting teachers against firing without cause) becomes mandatory.

In other recent opinions, Martin has held that:

Insurance issued to an individual under a group policy does not become incontestable under the insurance code until two years from the date the person becomes insured under a master policy.

District judges and district attorneys can claim full reimbursement for official travels out of county of their residence, effective September 1.

Railroad Commission employees assigned to a transportation conference are entitled to travel expenses, as are state employees representing their agencies at a Texas Historical Survey Committee-sponsored dedication ceremony.

A public weigher may not conduct weighing operations outside the area in which he was elected or appointed; deputy weighers need not be actual residents of the area they serve. Cities under 185,000 population cannot pay any portion of

firemen's personal obligation as contribution to relief or retirement fund.

Texas Employment Commission may contribute state funds to the premiums of its employees group insurance coverage; but under these conditions Commission must secure the contract of insurance, be the policyholder and pay the contributions to the company.

Writ of possession on property sold at a tax sale must be issued to the purchaser after expiration of 20 days from end of redemption period.

State agencies must make purchases of goods manufactured by the prison system through the Board of Control; political subdivisions may purchase directly from prisons but Board must set manufacturing specifications.

OIL OUTPUT REMAINS HIGH — Texas Railroad Commission maintained August's high oil production allowable for September - 54 per cent of potential.

September figure allows for maximum production of 4,075,231 barrels daily, unchanged from August.

Allowable has zoomed following Middle East oil crisis. It was 33.8 per cent in May, 35.9 per cent in June, 42.9 per cent in July and 54 per cent in August.

Nominations to purchase oil from major buyers came to 3,406,451 barrels a day for September, an increase of 383,041 over August. Bureau of Mines predicted the demand for Texas crude in the coming month would be 3,525,000 barrels a day.

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 9, Article VIII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 9. The State tax on property, exclusive of the tax necessary to pay the public debt, and of the taxes provided for the benefit of the public free schools, shall never exceed Thirty-five Cents (35¢) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation; and no county, city or town shall levy a tax rate in excess of Eighty Cents (80¢) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation in any one (1) year for general fund, permanent improvement fund, road and bridge fund and jury fund purposes; provided further that at the time the Commissioners Court meets to levy the annual tax rate for each county it shall levy whatever tax rate may be needed for the four (4) constitutional purposes; namely, general fund, permanent improvement fund, road and bridge fund and jury fund so long as the Court does not impair any outstanding bonds or other obligations and so long as the total of the foregoing tax levies does not exceed Eighty Cents (80¢) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation in any one (1) year. Once the Court has levied the annual tax rate, the same shall remain in force and effect during that taxable year; and the Legislature may also author-

ize an additional annual ad valorem tax to be levied and collected for the further maintenance of the public roads; provided, that a majority of the qualified property taxing voters of the county voting at an election to be held for that purpose shall vote such tax, not to exceed Fifteen Cents (15¢) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation of the property subject to taxation in such county. Any county may put all tax money collected by the county into one general fund, without regard to the purpose or source of each tax. And the Legislature may pass local laws for the maintenance of the public roads and highways, without the local notice required for special or local laws. This Section shall not be construed as a limitation of powers delegated to counties, cities or towns by any other Section or Sections of this Constitution."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on November 11, 1967, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following:

"FOR the constitutional amendment allowing counties to put all county taxes into one general fund."

"AGAINST the constitutional amendment allowing counties to put all county taxes into one general fund."

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PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding a new Section in Article III, to be known as Section 52e, reading as follows:

"Section 52e. Each county in the State of Texas is hereby authorized to pay all medical expenses, all doctor bills and all hospital bills for all Sheriff, Deputy Sheriffs, Constables, Deputy Constables and other county and precinct law enforcement officials who are injured in the course of their official duties; providing that the county shall continue to pay the maximum salary of these officials while they are incapacitated, but such salary payment shall not continue beyond the terms of office to which they were elected or appointed."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on November

11, 1967, at which time the ballot shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Amendment to the Constitution authorizing each county in this state to pay the medical bills, doctor bills and hospital bills for all Sheriff, Deputy Sheriffs, Constables, Deputy Constables and other county and precinct law enforcement officials who are injured in the course of their official duties; providing that the county shall continue to pay the maximum salary of these officials while they are incapacitated, but such salary payment shall not continue beyond the terms of office to which they were elected or appointed."

"AGAINST the Amendment to the Constitution authorizing each county in this state to pay the medical bills, doctor bills and hospital bills for all Sheriff, Deputy Sheriffs, Constables, Deputy Constables and other county and precinct law enforcement officials who are injured in the course of their official duties; providing that the county shall continue to pay the maximum salary of these officials while they are incapacitated, but such salary payment shall not continue beyond the terms of office to which they were elected or appointed."

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER SIX ON THE BALLOT

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 33, Article XVI, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 33. The Accounting Officers of this State shall neither draw nor pay a warrant upon the Treasury in favor of any person for salary or compensation as agent, officer or appointee, who holds at the same time any other office or position of honor, trust, or profit, under this State, except as prescribed in this Constitution. Provided, that this restriction as to the drawing and paying of warrants upon the Treasury shall not apply to officers of the National Guard or Air National Guard of Texas, the National Guard Reserve, the Air National Guard Reserve, the Air Force Reserve, the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States, nor to enlisted men of the National Guard, the Air National Guard, the National Guard Reserve, the Air National Guard Reserve, the Air Force Reserve, and the Organized Reserve of the United States, nor to retired officers of the United States Army, Air Force, Navy, and Marine Corps, and retired warrant officers and retired enlisted men of the United States Army, Air Force, Navy, and Marine Corps. It is further provided, until September 1, 1969, and thereafter only if authorized by the Legislature by general law under such restrictions and limitations as the Legislature may prescribe, that a non-elective State officer or employee may hold other non-elective offices or positions of honor, trust, or profit under this State or the United States, if the officer or employee is of benefit to the State of Texas or are required by State or federal law, and there is no conflict with the original office or position; prohibiting elected officers under this state or the United States from holding any other office or position under this state; and adding members of the Air National Guard, Air National Guard Reserve, Air Force Reserve, and retired members of the Air Force to the list of persons exempted."

"AGAINST the constitutional amendment allowing non-elective state officers and employees to serve in other non-elective offices or positions under this state or the United States until September 1, 1969, and thereafter only if authorized by the Legislature, if the offices or positions are of benefit to Texas or are required by state or federal law, and there is no conflict of interest with the original office or position; prohibiting elected officers under this state or the United States from holding any other office or position under this state; and adding members of the Air National Guard, Air National Guard Reserve, Air Force Reserve, and retired members of the Air Force to the list of persons exempted."

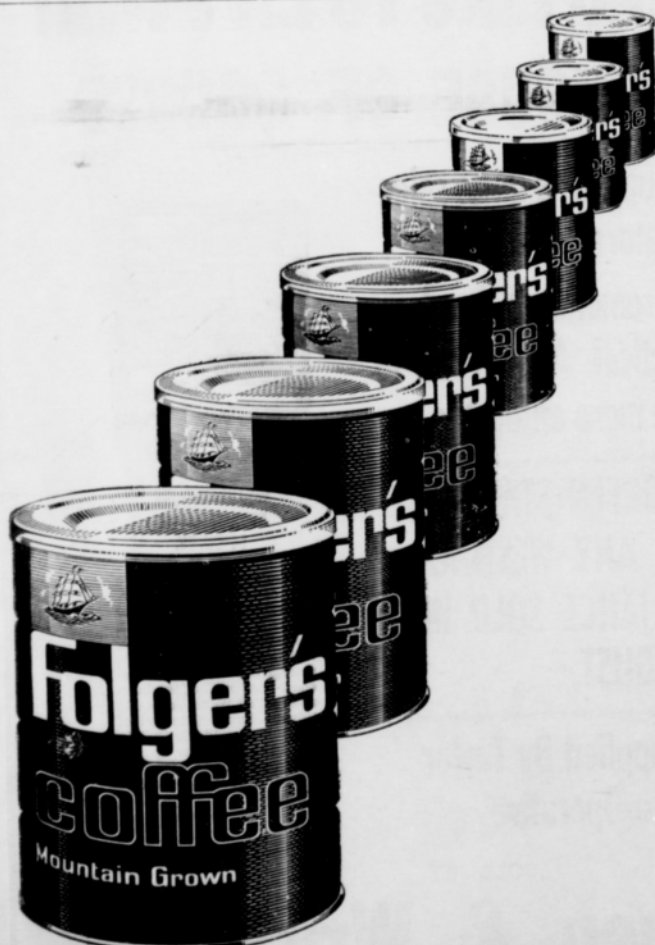
