

Budgetwise Meals

BUDGET MEALS are much in demand currently, but they still must satisfy the family in taste appeal and appetite interest. If the homemaker does the kind of job she should, both in

trimming her food budget a few dollars a week, and keeping the family happy with meals served, only she need be the one to be

aware of the economy. Just as it's inspiring to turn out an interesting meal from leftovers, so is it to turn some inexpensive dishes into attractive meals that have color, glamor and eating pleas-

To trim down costs on dishes as much as possible, make wise use of leftovers so that nothing of value is ever fed into the garbage pail. Another good way is to use canned foods alone or in combination as they will substantially lower the cost of food.

Here's a satisfying as well as handsome main dish that is appealing to the eye as well as nutritionally adequate.

*Meat Pin Wheel Shortcakes (Serves 6)

11/2 cups sifted all-purpose flour 1/2 teaspoon salt

214 teaspoons baking powder

2 tablespoons fat

1/2 cup milk 2 small cans deviled ham, liver paste or other potted meats

Sift together flour, salt and baking powder. Cut in fat with a pastry blender or two knives until the mixture resembles coarse meal. Add the milk, mixing to a soft dough; place on lightly floured board and knead for thirty seconds. Roll into a rectangle approximately 12 x 8 inches. Spread with deviled ham or other meats. Beginning at the longer side, roll as tightly as possible. Cut in approximately 1-inch pieces, place cut side down on baking sheet and bake in hot oven (450°F.) 15 minutes.

Pack into wellgreased 1-quart ring mold, place in pan of water. Bake about 30 minutes in moderate oven (350°F.) Fill center with creamed peas.

When you're in a hurry, put the pressure cooker to good use by cooking a dinner in it that would ordinarily take much longer. An hour or more of cooking time can be cut down to actual 15 to 20 minutes with this savory dinner:

Quick Chop Suey (Serves 6-8)

sonings, vegetables, sugar, soy sauce, meat extract, water and molasses. Heat to 15 pounds pressure. Cook 10 minutes. Reduce pressure gradually. Add bean sprouts. Combine cornstarch and cold water; stir into mixture and cook over low heat until thickened; stir constantly. Serve over fried noodles.

When you're using canned vegetables, drain off the liquid and cook until reduced in half. Then add the vegetable and just heat through. They'll have more flavor in this

way. Don't toss away those large outer stalks of celery. Dice and cook them until tender, then add white sauce. Add a few leftover green peas for color, if desired.

Waxed or yellow beans can be both flavorful and colorful if you add to them some chopped pimiento, lemon juice and melted butter.

TAX collectors and customs officers in these days are highly respectable men. They are not (officially) popular; but every one knows they are necessary. What they col-lect is fixed by law, and they get no

commission on their collections. They live on a salary also fixed by law. If anyone feels "gouged" by taxes he never accuses the collector, the fault is somewhere Now in Palestine,

the time of Dr. Foreman Christ, it was different. Throughout the gospels the name "publican" or, as translated in present-day English, "tax-collector", is evidently a name for a mean man. Jesus himself used publicans as examples of the lowest level of society. The reason was this: In the Roman system of tax collection, the privilege of levying taxes in a given district was "farmed out", that is to say, offered at auction. The highest bidder was given the franchise, and then he, or men he hired, would proceed to collect all the traffic would bear.

Palestine at that time was under the Romans, and the Jews had the army of occupation with them year after year. What the tax collectors did was to turn over to the Romans what the Romans wanted, and everything over and above that amount went into the collector's strong-box.

A Christian's Job

ONE day Jesus just said "follow me" to one of these men, named Matthew, and the man got up and followed him. So far as we know, he never set foot in his office again. Very likely, as a great preacher has suggested, this was not the first time Matthew had seen Jesus. Possibly they had had conversations before, out of business hours. The preacher goes on to suggest that Matthew may have come to loathe his job, but never have seen just how he could leave it.

Be that as it may, Matthew understood quite well that he could not be both a publican and a follower of Jesus. This raises a question: Are there occupa-tions today which a true Chris-tian cannot follow without sin?

There was a dope peddler one night sitting on a stone wall outside a New England Charles the sing-the Spirit of God blessed the sing-New England church. Somehow ing that night, for one of the hymns sang its way straight into that man's heart, and that very hour he threw his packet of dope away and became a Christian. He never went back to that business. We can all see that he was right; but are there other businesses also that cannot have the blessing of Christ upon them?

Whom Do You Follow?

THE story of Matthew suggests also that every one is some kind of follower. Some people just "follow their noses", that is, they just keep on in the routine of their lives, doing today what they did yesterday just because they have the habit of living in this way. Others follow an ambition, others a desire for revenge, others follow pleasure, others attach themselves to a leader (political, social or what not) and follow somebody else's band-wagon.

The tragedy of the Christian church is that although every Christian, or rather every church member, has solemnly promised to follow Jesus Christ. they don't all follow him, by any means. They go right on following habit, or pleasure, or ambition, and they do not ask (as Matthew must have asked) whether these things are such as Christ can bless, or not.

In spite of Jesus' plain statement: You cannot serve God and Mammon (the god of money), people go right on serving Mammon in spite of their Christian profession.

About Face!



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

The East-West Struggle Places **Europeans in Political Quandary**

Europeans today are having an extremely difficult time trying to face in two opposite directions at the same time. There is, of course, the ever present Soviet threat of military invasion.

Europe Is Concerned

But, as the United States enters into a crucial election year in which the fate of European military and economic aid will be determined in congressional debate in next November's election, these people are extremely concerned with political events in the United States.

American taxpayers can feel fairly sure on one important aspect of this situation. Their representatives from both houses of Congress have poured into Europe in good numbers to observe first-hand the political and military situation as it

When the great debates start, both in the halls of Congress and on the campaign platforms of America's home towns, there will be a store of first-hand observations, which will enable the American voters to ask direct questions and be reasonably sure of getting well-founded replies with regard to the stake we have in

Both American officials and the officials of other countries told us that these congressmen and senators, who visited them, took a good look and should be able to present a clear picture. We noticed that both political parties were well represented in these congressional inspection teams.

No Backing Down

If economic and military aid from the United States were to be withdrawn, or seriously curtailed, it would be difficult to speculate on the outcome of such action. These countries certainly would not immediately back down, or "go over to the other side"

Countries like Turkey, Greece and Yugoslavia have no choice but to stand as firmly as they can against the Soviet Union. In Turkey we were told, for example, that the world would not be in such a sorry state today if other countries had taken as firm a position against Russia as have the Turks.

In Yugoslavia there is great concern on the part of many observers, as to whether or not the people of the United States are completely convinced that the Tito defection from the Kremlin has been complete and unqualified. Our representatives in Europe voice the general opinion that Yugoslavia has, indeed, cast

her lot with the West. In countries like Italy and France, there are thousands of people who still vote as "Communists". However, the general appraisal of these voters by American officials seems to be that only a small percentage are real "hard-core" Communists. They ally themselves with Communists and vote for Communist candidates as a protest against the other political parties which currently govern these nations.

If the cold war turned to a hot one, these people would undoubtedly fight against the Russian Communists. There would be some local sabotage, of course, but the majority would support the west.

A subject of continuing speculation by thinking men in Europe to-day is this problem of the "will to fight". Europe is tired. Its economy has been shattered by almost nonending wars through the first half of this century. Its people bear physi- States.

Much of the physical property which was destroyed during World War II has been rebuilt. But the minds of the people who have survived these wars are not rebuilt They look with understandable suspicion upon alliances, which con-ceivably could thrust them into another war. And yet, at the same time, they know that their fate is completely tied to the democratic principles of government best peronified today by the United States

In their attitude toward peace and war, these people are little different than Americans. They know, even better than we do, the high and horrible price of war. But, somehow, one senses that they know, too, that unity must be maintained against Russian aggression.

Somehow, you feel that they in-stinctively agree with General Eisenhower, when he says:

Political Federation

"I believe that there will be no permanent position of serenity and confidence for the western world as long as we are confronted with the Communist menace. As a counter there must be created a United States of-or political federation of -Western Europe; and Western Europe must include at least Western Germany, and preferably United Germany.

Many of the American officials with whom we spoke sincerely believe that such a federation of European countries is the only answer to the economic and political problems of these countries.

Such a union will not come easily, but the Europeans themselves know that something other than continuing subsidization by the United States must be done to give them an equitable status in the world's family of peoples. And it is here, in this realm of future long-range planning, that one encounters a European viewpoint, perhaps not thoroughly understood or appreciated by the American taxpayer.

Two Personal Questions

In the early stages of our trip, we encountered an American businessman, who was primarily concerned with getting us to find the answers to his two most important questions: (1.) "Do these people (the Europeans) really appreciate what we are doing for them?" and (2.) "When are they going to get "off the back" of the American taxpayer?"

"Appreciation" is hardly the word for the feeling which most Europeans have for the United States, with regard to the financial and military assistance which it has rendered They know, and say freely and openly, that this aid has been their salvation. But by and large, these people are strongly nationalistic, and they are not happy with their fate of being the recipients of Amer 'benevolence.'

They don't feel that we are 'giving' them anything. They feel that we are buying their partnership in an alliance against a common

They feel, also, that they would like to have the aid, which we have been giving them, terminated just as soon as it is militarily and economically safe to do so. They feel that we are buying much with the money we are spending in Europe.

Many of them are frank to say that it is much better for America to have a "front" against Soviet Russia located where it is today, than it would be to have a front on the Atlantic seaboard of the United



sional cease-fire-line agreement in Korea expired without final agreement between the Communists and the United Nations in their peace talks. As a result, it will be necessary to redraw the cease-fire line whenever all other armistice points are settled.

Although progress in the talks has been slow, the over-all picture is encouraging. Results are beginning to show.

First, and possibly most important, is the slackening of fighting, resulting in a great drop in the number of casualties on both sides. This policy is likely to continue as long as the talks are in progress, because, as Gen. James A. Van Fleet told correspondents: "We will not sacrifice our men needlessly. What is the use of thousands of casualties if it is

Second, the United States and its allies have a general idea, although somewhat inaccurate, of the number of fighting men held by the Communists in their prisoner-of-war camps. United Nations negotiators, however, are still pressing for a full accounting of more than 50,000 unlisted Allied prisoners. The U.S. has asked specifically what has become of 1,058 Americans not on the official Red prisoner-of-war list.

How soon a final agreement can be reached in the talks is anyone's guess, but distrust on the part of both sides will not hasten it. As an example, the Reds charge the lack of agreement due to "extraordinary . colossal bungling, criminal negligence, and master-race arrogance" by the Americans.

On the other hand, the Allies charge the "Communists have run true to form . . . With few exceptions the talks have been marked by the familiar Red pattern of delay, deceit, and diversionary tactics."

PRICE CUTS-Rural and small town families, by far the largest group of mail order patrons in the country, are wondering if the announced price cuts on thousands of items by the firms located in Chicago is an indication of things to come during 1952.

Midwinter sales catalogues of the four biggest mail order houses in the business list lower prices on thousands of items. It is the biggest

One form cut the price on an 11-cubic-foot refrigerator from \$262.72 to \$212.75, a 25 per cent mark down on men's shirts, and price reduc tions ranging from 80 cents to \$2.30 on tires from last fall's levels. The firm also listed 400 price cuts on both wood and metal furniture.

SALES SAG-The Securities and Exchange Commission and the Federal Trade Commission, in a report of business conditions during the last quarter of 1951, said sales in the nation dropped under the previous quarter's level for the first time since 1949. The report also said the profit sag, which began at the end of 1950, continued with manufacturers returns amounting to 15 per cent before taxes and 23 per cent after taxes. Sales fell off \$2,600,000,000 during the period.

Only four of the 22 industries covered in the report recorded an increase of profits before taxes in the third quarter of last year. They were petroleum, food, tobacco, and apparel and finished textiles.

The commissions did not attempt to interpret the general decline in business. It was obvious, however, that decline was due to a consumer buying lull that started early in 1950, sharp increases in defense taxes, shortages of materials and controls on scarce metals. Most observers believe the trend can be expected to continue during the early part of

THE OLD SOCK-According to Secretary of Commerce Sawyer the average citizen in the home towns of the nation are putting more and more of their money in the old sock and keeping it there. He says savings are greater now than at any time in the last five years.

Sawyer is all for this saving spree of Americans-amounting to an rate of \$22,000,000,000-because he believes it has helped turn the tide against rampant inflation. He warned, however, that if Americans spend these savings in a new wave of buying, inflatary pressures

Personal incomes rose from \$225,000,000,000 in 1950 to \$251,000,000,000 in 1951. Now, in the early days of 1952, the rate is about \$260,000,000,000.

GOP CIRCUS-The race of Republicans to secure the GOP president nomination is taking on the atmosphere of a circus-so many are joining the show that spectators are going to miss some of the acts. The latest is Harold E. Stassen. Already active are Sen. Robert Taft of Ohio and Gov. Earl Warren of California. Remaining to join th show is Gen. Dwight Eisenhower, considered by many the white hope of the Republican party.

The other candidates had this to say of Stassen's announcement: 'Every American has a right to run for President and it's well that the Republicans should have a wide choice."-Taft. "His (Stassen's) candidacy should stimulate discussion of national issues and he will undoubtedly be an important factor in the Republican convention."-War-

Franklin has been reverenced as the patron saint of printing and publishing interests in America, but there is another line of vast importance for which he was the pioneer leader. That line is mutual fire insurance. On March 25, 1752, there was started in Philadelphia a concern called "Contri-butionship." It was the first mutual insurance company in the nation. Its organizers were Benja-min Franklin and a group of associates, mostly Pennsylvania farmers. The idea spread, and now there are 2,616 mutual fire and casualty insurance companies op-erating in this country, into which were paid last year as premiums more than one billion 400 million. Campaign Headquarters

AS THE second session of the 82 congress moved into action in this year of a presidential campaign, and even as the state of the union messages of President Truman still left a question as to his political intentions, presidential campaign headquarters were opening up all over town here in the nation's capital.

Sen. Robert A. Taft of Ohio, of course, has been ensconsed in the Standard Oil building on Constitution avenue for some time; General Eisenhower backers, headed by Senators Lodge of Massachusetts and Duff of Pennsylvania, have opened extensive headquarters in the swank Shoreham hotel; in the less pretentious Willard hotel, Harold Stassen has opened up his headquarters, and just recently, backers of Sen. Estes Kefauver established headquarters for him, also in the Wil-While Senator Kefauver has made no official announcement as to his plans to run on the Democratic ticket, his friends say he is "willing", and might even accept a second spot on the Democratic

Only announced candidate not et opening headquarters here is Gov. Earl Warren of California. However, he is planning to have an eastern headquarters, either here or in New York, his friends say.

Stassen Announcement

Announcement by Stassen that he would make a campaign for the GOP presidential nomination set off a chain reaction in the Eisenhower camp, culminating in filing of General Eisenhower's name in the New Hampshire primary March 11 by Gov. Sherman Adams. The governor also announced that he would head an Eisenhower delegation to the GOP national convention in Chicago from his state. Several politicians and newsmen obtained a definite impression from Stassen's announcement that his candidacy was based on something he learned from General Eisenhower in Paris on a recent visit there, although Stassen refused to say what he talked about.

Of the fifty or more newsmen and women in the room when Mr. Stassen made his announcement, the most enthusiastic was Mr. Stassen himself. Generally his announce-ment was received with a rather amused tolerance. Friends of General Eisenhower now say that if the general does not deny he is a can-didate or ask his friends to withdraw his name from the New Hampshire primary prior to March 11, nitely in the race on the GOP ticket.

Eisenhower Question

There are still those, however, who maintain that Eisenhower will not enter into a fight for the nomination and because of his important job in Europe it would take a full-fledged draft to force him into the presidential campaign. With three active candidates now after the GOP delegate strength there is little possibility of a full-fledged "draft" from the GOP convention. It is possible, but improbable, that the draft might come from the Democratic convention, provided the GOP convention turns him down and his name is placed in nomination by President Truman himself.

Political Mistake

Stassen, who came out of Minnesota four years ago with high hopes and ideals as the leader of a younger, rejuvenated and more liberal Republican party, stubbed his toe somewhere along the line, winding up in the camp of the Joe Grundy organization in Pennsylvania and campaigning against the only lib-eral coming out of the Keystone state in many years-Sen. James Duff. Now, Stassen says he will back "voluntary" profit sharing as a bait for the labor vote, and would fire 200,000 loafers on the federal payroll. The loafers, he said, have been determined out of his own survey to be one in 10.

Stassen, like some other politicians, visualizes the great army of federal employees, some 2,500,000 strong, as all living in Washington and all "non-voting." Fact is only 10 per cent of the so-called bureaucrats live in Washington. There are just about as many in California, for instance, as in the District of Columbia. So it is a political mistake to brand about 2,300,000 folks on the federal payroll as in the loafer class, for these people are voters.

Health Survey

President Truman has named Dr. Paul Magnuson, former director of the medical division of the Veterans Administration, to head a committee of doctors and laymen to survey health needs of the nation. That is the President's answer to American Medical Association's campaign against national health insurance or "socialized" medicine. The com-mission is to report after the elections this year so there is no politics in the President's action.

Simple Tricks with Curtains Add Much Charm and Beauty By Ertta Haley

ARE curtains at your windows used just to have something there, or do they add the interesting note to the room?

One of the most inexpensive ways to decorate any room in the home is to provide a bright accent with curtains, a cheerful note or something so lively as to start conversation just as soon as someone sees your curtains.

Just in case you think curtains haven't changed much, just look at some of the new designs and colors which are available, to say nothing of the new styles in curtaining. All rooms in the home have been exposed to the new things in curtains -kitchens, living and dining rooms, entrance halls, bedrooms and game

Just as refinishing furniture can improve it, so can curtains be used to hide any number of construction faults in windows. They can enhance the view if you have one, or replace a poor view just in the way

the curtains themselves are treated. Remember the days when curtains were mostly white or ivory? These are sometimes used, but the use is quite different from what it used to be. Curtains have plenty of color and design now, and they can be used to bring out room colors by harmonizing or accenting them.

There are even certain types of prints available which will help to carry out furniture or decorative themes. These, used in curtains, can often be the most effective note the

When rooms have sufficient color and design interest, then add no more conflicting accents, and use plain sheer curtains.

Study your rooms and see just what kind of curtains they need. Once this is decided, you'll have fun getting together just what's needed.

Use Unusual Treatments For Sheer Curtains

Sheer curtains aren't always perfectly plain; neither are they always feminine and ruffled. Today's trend shows interesting effects obtained by treating sheer almost as draperies.

Take, for example, the room with a large corner window. If you need the light or don't want to close out the view, then sheer curtains are an ábsolute essential. But, you may say, the room is a living room, and you want something really appropriate.

Sheer curtains for this type of corner window may be strictly tailored. Pinch-pleat them at the top and place on traverse rods so they can be drawn easily. Use closed or open, as desired. Curtains treated in this way should be luxurious for they have no draperies "to help them out." Pinch pleats should be full; have hems at least five inches

High ceilinged rooms usually need a valance at the windows to help cut down the disproportion of the room. Even though the windows may just be average length, they can be made more effective if you use tailored curtains of sheer material, falling to sill or floor length.

At the top, drape generously with a ruffled curtain to give the effect of a valance, though the curtains themselves may be perfectly straight. This is a very effective way to treat windows in old-fashioned there is sufficient color and design interest elsewhere in the room.

Drapes may be used with heer curtains, but they should be full and generous. If they cannot be because of the expense involved, it's far better taste and much more good sense to spend the money on traverse rods.

Curtains for the bathroom can match the shower curtains if they're used. In fact, in a small bathroom, it's best to have them not only of matching material but also in style. Tailored shower curtains naturally call for straight curtains.

If the room is not strictly tailored, ruffled curtains may be used, tied back, as in cottage sets.

Both the shower curtain and the curtains can be made from plastic material bought by the yard, especially if you like the shower curtain especially long and generously

There was a time when kitchen curtains had to be organdie or one of the other sheer materials, and preferably in white. Now that color has been introduced more strongly into the kitchen, curtain materials have a wide range.

Let's suppose that your kitchen is Early American in theme or has an informal peasant theme. What would be more appropriate than some colorful chintz or one of the peasant prints which are often done on natural or gray-white linen? Here, then, is the ideal choice.

If the kitchen has a gay informality and you want a clear view of the outside, why bother with curtains at all? You'll find that a piece of colored ruffle through which you run elastic can be placed to go all the way around the window, thus giving you the color accent and the freedom of view desired.

Solve Window Problems With Clever Curtains

Rooms with small windows can Turn; Follow probably use all the light they can get. Curtains, rather than drapes are the answer. Sheer curtains on double rods will answer the purpose nicely, especially those which are tied back in hour glass fashion.

Views outside the window cannot easily be changed, but you don't have to look out! Treat windows like this with pretty curtains and you can have as nice a picture as you want. Figured lace panels are excellent for living and dining room windows. You might have an attention getting cornice and some striking pattern in the drapes hung at either side to complete the effect.

Informal living rooms with windows, bedrooms and kitchens, too, can have the outside view blocked with gathered sheer curtains. You might try use of three or four rows of these, with the bottom edge piped in a solid color that goes well in the room.

Windows which show nothing at all on the outside, especially those which look right at the wall of another house can have tailored curtains in good colors. Take a cloth of good texture and add some vertical stripes of bright color, and use these at the windows.

Candy-striped curtains are good in many rooms, whether these are tailored or feminine. A girl's room may have frothy organdie bedspread and dressing table. What could be lovelier than red and white candy striped curtains, tailored, but still a good contrasting note to all the femininity?


Children's rooms are excellent with tailored, striped curtains, too. You might select several colors in stripes and sew these on solidcolored material.

Born Again

Lesson for January 27, 1952

IN many places one often hears the expression, "born - again Christians". As a matter of fact, there are no other kinds. If a person is not born again he is not Christian.

The first birth is of the natural self, the awakening, so to speak, to

this natural world The second birth is of the supernatural self, the awakening to the spiritual world, the beginning "living unto G o d." Sometimes this new birth comes very early in life. Dr. Warfield, a very conservative Dr. Foremon



theologian, used to think that the second birth might in some cases actually come before the natural birth. (See Jeremiah

A man may become very distinguished, may be a great scholar, and still not have been born again. Nicodemus is a case in point. He was a man who had everything, as the saying is; he was a judge in the Jewish High Court, a man both wealthy and respectable. But he had not been born again.

God Is the Life-Giver

THE English translation of John 3:7 has given many persons the idea that being born again is a duty. Now a duty is something that you ought to do, and that by your own choice you can do if you will. It's up to you. But (taking the teaching of the Bible as a whole) being born again is not a duty. It is the

What Jesus was saying (as the Greek of John 3 indicates) is that it is necessary, it is in-dispensable, to be born again. There can be no development, no growth, in the spiritual life unless there is somewhere the beginning of that life. You must have been born once in order to see the sunshine. You must be born again in order to see God.

The seed which we sow in field or garden must have the germ of life in it or it will never grow. But no farmer can give life to lifeless seed. God alone is the life-giver, in the first birth or in the second.

SOME people get this far in their thinking and then they become discouraged. "If only God can give life," they think, "what is the use of my trying to obey him? If God takes that first step then all I can do is to wait for him. No matter how much I want to be a Christian in my heart, I may not be able to for God may not see fit to make it possible for me to do what I want to do." This is a mistaken thought.

John Calvin, as is well known, was a very strong believer in predestination. As pastor of a large church, he had numbers of people in his congregation who heard him talking about predestination, the doctrine that we are in God's hands and that spiritual life can come only as he himself begins it in our souls.

They would ask just about this same question: I want to be a Christian, but how do I know that God has chosen me? I want to be a Christian, but how can I know whether I have been born again? Calvin's answer was a simple one: If you really want to be a Christian in your heart, that is a sign, the very best sign, that you have been born again.

Turn; Follow

IN the Bible, the commands are Turn"; "Follow"; "Believe"; "Obey". If we have not been born again these commands fall on deaf ears. If they stir our conscience, if they make us respond, then that is sign we have been born again.

Then can't we tell when we are born again? Certainly we can tell; just by being alive. "We know that we have passed from death unto life, because we love the brethren," said the same apostle who recorded Jesus' conversation with Nico-

We wish very much we knew whether Nicodemus himself was ever born again, but students of the Bible have never agreed on this. And the reason for the uncertainty is that Nicodemus never did come right out

We know Matthew was born again because he turned his back on his former life and followed Jesus. We know that Nicodemus said some kind things about Jesus. We know that after Jesus was dead, Nicodemus came through with a handsome contribution for the funeral. Was
